Like so many in our community, Grace and Sam Lewin have been actively volunteering for decades. It began for them when their children were young and involved in swim team. Grace ran Sunday races for a time, handled swim suit orders, served as a weekly timer and was involved in the B Invitational for years. She encouraged Sam to volunteer as a timer, saying the team could use his help and it would make the swim meets more interesting for him. "She was right," he said. As is so often the case, once you step forward to help, you get drawn into many things. In this case, Sam went on to be a timer, a judge and a part of the crew of members who installed and removed the swim docks each year. "As a result of all of those volunteer hours, we came to know a lot of other parents during those swim team years who quickly became friends."

While "those swim team years" came and went in a flash, the volunteer spirit that was fostered never left them. "Volunteering is so important to me," Grace explains. "It enables me to give back to a community I love being a part of and gives me the opportunity to meet others and share in all that is happening here." One of the highlights she recalls is when she decided to join the Goodwill Fundraising Committee. When she went to her first meeting in 2009, she had no idea where it would lead but before she knew it, Grace and two friends of hers, Virginia McNulty and Delores Gaspari, had signed up to be co-chairs of the committee and a community yard sale that now brings people in our community together like few events do. With over 100 volunteers actively engaged in every aspect of this event from intake of items through set-up and sale to breakdown and clean-up, it is a shining example of how vibrant and strong the volunteer spirit is in Highland Lakes.






Grace co-chaired the event for four years and remains actively involved to this day.

While Sam is one of the hundred who volunteer at this event every year, his true gift to the community has focused on governance. Serving as a Voting Board trustee (first in Section 8 and then in Section 7) and officer (1st Vice President), he has devoted countless hours and selflessly shared his professional expertise over the years for the betterment of our community. While on the Board, Sam developed a monthly financial report that clarified Club expenditures and was influential in eliminating a practice of borrowing money during the winter months to meet expenses. This ultimately led to significant savings and brought the community to the secure financial footing it benefits from now. Through the years Sam has also been an active member of the Planning Committee and the Rules and By-Laws Committee and served as the chair of our Buildings and Grounds Committee. When asked why he volunteers, he says, "Volunteers are the backbone and life blood of this community. I realized that shortly after I moved here and from that day on I felt it was my obligation to offer my services whenever I could." He shrugs, then smiles and expresses a sentiment that you commonly hear from volunteers, "I got much more than I gave."

Ecology - At our March board meeting, the Voting Board awarded a contract for three interrelated studies (bathymetric, nutrient load, and hydrology) to Princeton Hydro. The output of these studies will give the Club critical data to help set the course for how we move forward with comprehensive community-wide watershed management plans.

Coupled with road mapping that is already underway, the Club expects recommendations from our various vendors to help guide our decisions around critical storm water management upgrades and improvements to our aeration systems. We'll also rely on these recommendations to help us determine and prioritize appropriate projects and applications—these include better filtration and control of lake inflows from streams and road runoff, the trapping of phosphorous in the water column and along the bottoms of our lakes, limiting hazardous algae blooms and excessive weed growth, and planning for possible remediation of sediment in problem areas.

Communications - The Club welcomes Chastity Cortijo as its new Communications Manager, and Peter Jablonski as the new Athletics Director. Chastity brings lots of insight and hands-on communications experience to the role she'll work closely with the Club's GM, as well as the Voting Board and all of the various committee chairs to regularly communicate with members on our website, via social media, and in our Newsette about important information, events, and updates. Peter is a former lifeguard, swim instructor, and water safety director in Highland Lakes who brings tons of enthusiasm and experience—as an employee and as a member—to the athletics program. Please welcome both of them to their new roles, and help them succeed...

Rules, By-Laws and Policies - At the Voting Board's request, the Rules & By-Laws committee worked hard over the winter on a variety of potential rule and by-law changes. The committee shared its perspectives with the Voting Board in March, and at the upcoming April workshop the Voting Board will discuss those suggestions, including requirements for officer and trustee attendance, and a code of conduct. We'll also discuss a proposal to consolidate our rules and policies with the goal to succinctly combine all of the relevant information and streamline the processes around enforcement when infractions occur.

Volunteerism - As a community, we're into our third year of living with the pandemic, and while the Club still takes the health risks seriously, most members have largely accepted those risks when attending Club-related activities. Regular attendance at Voting Board meetings has been much higher this year than during any of the past 14 years.

About Changes in your Recorded Deed

In planning changes to your ownership of property that would be reflected in the recorded Deed, contacting the Club Office before you do so for guidance is advisable and will eliminate any misunderstandings.

The Club's By-Laws, in part, define Active Members as those who own property in Highland Lakes. When persons take title to property in Highland Lakes when they do not own other Highland Lakes property at that time, even when they join in the ownership of property with someone who currently owns property in Highland Lakes, they automatically become an active member and are required to pay the Initiation Fee. If you are considering adding anyone to your Deed, a wife, parent, child, friend, etc., please be aware of these By-Law requirements.

Sometimes members form a living or family trust as part of their estate planning. However, even this type of trust is a different, and therefore new, owner of property, and the payment of the Initiation Fee is required.



How to Claim a Boat/Kayak Rack and Boat Dock Space

Racks:

There are approximately 13 freeways and 2 beaches on the Main Lake that have kayak/boat racks. They are available on a first come/first served basis. Please follow these rules to claim a rack:

- 1. Any rack with no sticker can be claimed to use for the current year. If, after July 4, a spot with a 2021 sticker is still open, it may be claimed to use for the current year.
- 2. Do not remove any stickers.
- 3. Do not chain boats or kayaks to a tree or leave them on the ground.

Docks:

Members who have an assigned dock space at Club Park, Comet Row, Beach 3 and Beach 4 will continue to have those spaces as long as the conditions of the assignment are met, otherwise the assignment will be forfeited. When a space is forfeited, it will be converted to an "OPEN" space, marked by the color tag that appears in this article containing the word "OPEN".

For OPEN spaces on these docks, the approach to getting a dock space is identical to the methods historically used by members – "first come/first served". Once the docks are in place, members may secure one of these OPEN spaces by placing their boat with 2022 boating permits (each side of the bow) and a third 2022 boating permit on the OPEN numbered tag. No space may be claimed without a 2022 boating permit and a boat.

Dock spaces at Eckhart Sailing Center remain reserved for junior sailors and others participating in the Club's sailing fleets. OPEN dock spaces at Comet Row beginning with an 800 or 900 number are for pontoon boats only.

What My Dues Cover

Here are a few of the items that member dues help to cover:

- 1. Maintain all roads except the County and Township roads passing through the community. This includes winter plowing and sanding, as well as pothole repair and brush cutting.
- 2. Provide weed, algae and bacteria control in all the lakes.
- 3. Maintain the beaches including the hiring of life guards.
- 4. Maintain the Clubhouse including heating, air conditioning and furnishing all equipment.
- 5. Maintain baseball fields, tennis, pickleball and basketball courts; all swimming facilities, floats and swim lanes; park benches, boat docks and racks.
- 6. Provide equipment for HLCC sanctioned sports.
- 7. Provide season t-shirts and trophies for team sports.
- 8. Subsidize all Clubhouse activities for children and adults.
- 9. Pay all employee salaries including General Manager, Administrative Staff, Maintenance Staff, Security Staff, Athletic and Water Safety Directors, and Lifeguards.
- 10. Pay the taxes on all lakes and Clubhouse and acreage used for sports.
- 11. Pay fire and liability insurance on the whole area.
- 12. Pay the electricity for the Clubhouse and numerous street lights.
- 13. Cover the cost of the Newsette.
- 14. Pay the cost of Worker's Compensation and employers share of social security on all Club employees.
- 15. Miscellaneous administrative costs.

A full breakdown is listed in the Treasurer's Report mailed out to all members in July/August of every year prior to the Annual Meeting.
