Fighting Algae Blooms with Rain Gardens and Shore Buffers

The Club is focused on long term approaches to make our watershed healthier, but there are things you can do yourself. Homeowners can take some smaller, individual actions to help starve the algae and inhibit Harmful Algal Blooms, by creating rain gardens and shore buffers, to divert stormwater runoff that carries nutrients into the lakes.

RAIN GARDENS

Highland Lakes' Ecology Committee collaborated on the rain garden at our Clubhouse. Workers dug down four or five feet and built a large drainage field, with a lot of rocks and soil to absorb the water slowly. Runoff sits and soaks through the soil. That way, whatever's not absorbed by the plants gets filtered before it goes into the lake. But it's a scaled-up version of the typical private rain garden.

"Homeowner rain gardens are much smaller than that. You could have one by each major downspout, if you want. But you need to design it well," says former Ecology Committee Chair Bob Reffelt, who worked on the Club's rain garden. He advises folks to consider carefully whether their yards can accommodate a rain garden, and to consult a landscape expert. "It's not a simple design, as some might think. It's not like just planting tomatoes in your backyard. You need to do some analytical work to figure out: how big it should be, how deep it should be, where it should be placed, and what kind of soil you have — that has an influence on it," Reffelt explains.

Average rain gardens can be 200 square feet. And Highland Lakes presents a specific challenge, Reffelt says, because everyone's got a septic system. "You don't want to put a rain garden on top of your septic system. You don't want to put it too close to your house. And you don't want to put it too near large trees." For folks who can situate a rain garden properly, Reffelt suggested using river rocks to



create a pathway that slows runoff and lots of mulch. Rain gardens four to eight inches deep should drain within 24 hours after a storm, to avoid standing water — so don't put one where rainwater collects and puddles. Plant native flowers and bushes in your garden to help soak up the runoff. Reffelt recommends blooming plants that attract pollinators like bees and butterflies.

But while rain gardens help protect the lakes, "The potential for rain gardens in this community, I'd say, is somewhat limited," Reffelt says candidly.

"People can try to capture runoff at their homes and have nice-looking plants. That's a good idea." But he added, "In terms of the ecological value, it's limited, because the size of the lots are very small" in Highland Lakes.

For folks lucky enough to live along

the shoreline, Reffelt has another suggestion: plant buffers. They're easier to create than rain gardens, but possibly even more impactful. Homeowners can also add rocks to help buffer the waterline.

"I think it would be very beneficial if people with lakefront homes planted dogwoods and different kinds of plants — like we have in the rain garden along the water's edge," he says. "They don't have to plant the whole shoreline. But rather than have the lawn sloping into the lake, it would make a lot more sense for lakefront owners to put buffer plants." Needless to say, Reffelt recommends homeowners also stop using fertilizer on their lawns. After all, if it feeds the grass — it will also feed the algae that's now blooming in the lakes.

Beach Water Testing Results

Below are the results of the most recent E. coli testing at the Club's beaches and swim lanes performed by Garden State Laboratories, Inc. Weekly tests are required by the State of New Jersey, and results must not exceed 320 organisms per 100 milliliters. All samples conformed to NJ State recreational bathing standards. Testing results are also reported by the lab to the Sussex County Department of Health.



Annual Jogathon





Voting Board Approves Consolidated Rules Document with New Tiered Warning/Penalty Assessments

At its May 20, 2022, Voting Board Meeting, the Board approved a tiered system of prescribed penalties for violation of the Club's Rules and Regulations. The existing rules are now consolidated into a single document which includes a process for enforcement, review, and application of penalties, when necessary.

This restatement of the rules is meant to ensure that the rules and penalties are readily accessible to members, and to establish a consistent and transparent process of review and enforcement. In nearly every instance, a member can expect to receive one or more notices and an opportunity to respond before any penalty is assessed.

Our goal is to ensure that all members remain well informed about Club rules and policies and to promote voluntary compliance without resorting to heavy-handed enforcement.
