Waking Up Your Garden

"Well, of course, I'm a 'putterer'; I'm always out there doing something depending on what time of year it is," Murt Meltzer replied when I asked her what she did during the growing season to keep her gardens looking so beautiful. In addition to being a 'putterer', Murt, a member of Highland Lakes, is also a master gardener. In preparation for writing this article, I had contacted her, Cathy Spoerl and Barbara Jaggi (two other HL members whose gardens I have admired through the years) to see if I could get some tips from them about how best to nurture a garden along on this mountaintop of ours. "It's not easy in Highland Lakes," Cathy says with a knowing smile. "You're contending with poor soil, rocks, boulders, shade and of course, the animals (deer, rabbits, chipmunks and groundhogs, to name a few.)"

Still, every year at around this time I see the three of them and others in our community out "playing" in their yards even though they all mentioned to me that it is too early to plant anything. "The last frost for this growing region is about May 21st, but I never consider planting anything until Memorial Day," Murt says. Barbara and Cathy agree, and the three of them go on to explain that there is still plenty to be done to prepare the earth. They

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Tips from these gardeners:

- Plant a tree. Serviceberry or Sugar Maple will add beautiful color to any property.
- Use potted plants to bring colorful flowers to areas of your property that are inhospitable planting locations.
- Strive for a green lawn, not green grass. Even weeds are green and look good when they are mowed.
- Stick with native plants. Plants thrive in their natural environment. No fertilizers needed.
- Whatever you do, protect our lakes by eliminating the use of fertilizers. If you use a lawn service, be sure to insist that fertilizers are NOT in the mix!

From the President's Desk

I was recently at a party where a friend asked me how things have been going as president of our voting board. (Yes, I get invited to parties; and no, I don't like talking about the Club outside of meetings if I can help it.) I get asked this question frequently, and my response is usually the same: "It's going great... deeply rewarding, with incredible pay."

In all seriousness, I appreciate that people ask. The Club's business is constantly rattling around inside my head, so it's good to have people who are willing to discuss certain issues or simply listen to me vent. But if you understand the meaning of the saying, "You don't want to see how the sausage gets made," you also understand why I usually stick to the political truth, which goes something like this:

"Everything's fine, we're addressing some major pain points, making progress in several key areas, refining some policies, processes, and approaches, planning for the future, and I feel good about the general direction the Club is headed." Obviously, the complete version is more complex. It's loaded with tons of details that require a more intricate narrative to explain what's at stake, the history, the characters, and the challenges involved.

To be blunt, if you ask me how it's going and I start reeling off the whole story, you'll likely be sorry you asked. (Not because it's bad news—in fact, the news is quite good, we're doing good work and pushing through on new issues that no previous board has had to confront.) You'd be sorry because explaining things properly requires lots of time.

Issues evolve, so when I'm not talking about them to myself, I'm talking about them with our general manager, or other board members. This helps me prepare to confidently lead conversations about the various issues with the entire voting board. But if I were to suddenly dump all that info onto someone who innocently asked, "how's it going, Mr. President," their head might explode. Not because it's so hard to understand, but because it's too much to take in.

My term ends on October 1, and former presidents tell me my life will return to normal very quickly. As time passes, they say, I will reflect back and feel good about

what was accomplished during my tenure. The meetings and issues du jour will no longer be my problem. The shouting lunatics and chronic complainers will have new people to focus their insanity on. All that will be left behind is a profound sense of satisfaction, gratification, and accomplishment. To that, I say "alevei." (It's Yiddish. Look it up.) When that day comes, feel free to ask me how it's going. I'll tell you.

A similar question I often get asked is what it's like to be on the voting board. It's slightly easier to answer, and quite relevant today even though it's still early spring and our Annual Meeting on August 21 is months away. Here's why...

Members are duly elected as officers or trustees of the voting board at our annual meeting. Once elected, they are essentially signing on for a three-year term. They are expected to regularly attend monthly workshops and meetings and to show up fully prepared to discuss agenda items and new business items that arise. They also serve as liaisons on two committees, both of which have their agenda items and meeting cadences.

It's a lot of work, and most—but not all—board members take the commitment to heart. It's far from a cakewalk, and I'd be lying if I said it wasn't a grind at times. Ask anyone else who's ever served on the board and they'll all tell you the same thing—doing it right requires showing up, paying attention to tedious details, and reviewing lots of background info to stay on top of everything. And that kind of work, especially when it's in addition to the job you get paid for, can often feel frustrating, especially during the darkest and coldest winter months. But it's ultimately rewarding, and I can say with absolute certainty that it's much easier to appreciate how great this community is, and easier to understand its challenges and idiosyncrasies, when you are part of the engine that helps keep it running.

At this year's upcoming annual meeting, there will be four trustee positions on the ballot, and all five officer positions, as well. Nine out of 17 board positions will be filled by some mixture of familiar faces and/or entirely new board members. It's a great opportunity for experienced

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start by cleaning up the debris from the fall and winter, pulling out any invasive weeds that are trying to make a home, raking any lawn you have to remove dead grass, and then focus on nourishing the soil. All of this needs to be done with a bit of care as plants are already starting to grow and you don't want to be inadvertently pulling these plantings out.

Nourishing the soil without the use of chemical fertilizers is where my conversation with each of the women centered, because that is what their focus is during these last few weeks of cold weather. All of them lean heavily on composting in one form or another, making good use of dead leaves, plant cuttings from years gone by, soil from potted plants that have been discarded, etc. Barbara adds food scraps to her compost as well, although she warns that she never adds anything other than vegetables, for fear of attracting the bears. No fruit, meat, oil or milk products, she insists. They all turn the compost a few times a year, which eventually leads to decomposition resulting in nutrient rich soil that can be spread in the garden to nurture plants naturally. Cathy uses wood mulch (not chips) to keep moisture from evaporating and deters weed growth by laying newspaper (which naturally decomposes) under the mulch. Murt has a leaf grinder, which she admits is a bit labor intensive, but also provides her with an abundance of ground covering that is nutrient rich and, when mixed with the dirt already in her garden or quality top soil, gives her plantings exactly what they need without endangering our lakes.

About Changes in your Recorded Deed

In planning changes to your ownership of property that would be reflected in the recorded Deed, contacting the Club Office before you do so for guidance is advisable and will eliminate any misunderstandings.

The Club's By-Laws, in part, define Active Members as those who own property in Highland Lakes. When persons take title to property in Highland Lakes when they do not own other Highland Lakes property at that time, even when they join in the ownership of property with someone who currently owns property in Highland Lakes, they automatically become an active member and are required to pay the Initiation Fee. If you are considering adding anyone to your Deed, a wife, parent, child, friend, etc., please be aware of these By-Law requirements.

Sometimes members form a living or family trust as part of their estate planning. However, even this type of trust is a different, and therefore new, owner of property, and the payment of the Initiation Fee is required.

Lifeguards Wanted

The following dates in June are the scheduled dates for the 2022 Blended Learning Lifeguarding Certification Class. This certification includes CPR, AED, Lifeguarding and Waterfront. Blended Learning includes online modules to be completed by the student prior to the start of the first class. Please note that the class costs \$100 due at the start of the first in-person class on June 27. Checks can be made out to HLCC marked attention Water Safety. All classes are mandatory and include a ½ hour lunch break. Students are required to bring an exercise appropriate bathing suit, a notebook and something to write with every day of class. It is recommended that students bring 2 towels, a change of clothes, lunch and snacks, plenty of water and sunblock. Students will be provided with a CPR mask and a textbook. Classes will be held rain or shine, and will meet at the swim lanes at the start of every day unless told otherwise.

The signup deadline is June 6.

PLEASE NOTE: You must be 16 years of age in order to be hired to work at a waterfront, however the course is open to anyone who will be 15 by the completion of the course.

In Water Pretest: swim 300 yards continuously using front crawl or breaststroke, tread water for 2 minutes, swim 20 yards and dive to a depth of 7-10 feet to retrieve a 10lb object then exit the water without ladder.



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officers and trustees to continue serving our community in existing roles or progressively more responsible positions. It's also a great opportunity for conscientious members with fresh ideas who aren't currently involved to step up. But getting onto the voting board isn't a snap decision you should make after sucking down a six-pack or reading some nonsense on social media. And it's not going to happen if you don't seriously pursue it. (That is, not unless you have great neighbors like I do who think it'd be funny to vote for you as a write-in candidate without telling you beforehand.)

Maybe you're someone who has been on committees and would like to get more deeply involved to drive the Club's agenda in one direction or another. Or perhaps you attend board meetings from time to time and leave them often thinking you could do a better job than your current trustee...or the current president. If that's your take, stop thinking or talking about it, and do something about it. Step up.

Whatever your motivation is, express your interest and get onto the ballot for the election at the annual meeting. Let your fellow members know what you think about the issues, what you stand for, and what you'll work to accomplish on the board. Getting elected is the way you steer the voting board's conversations and decisions about capital improvements, policies, and the philosophical trajectory our community governance travels. You can't do that effectively or consistently from the sidelines.

For anyone interested in learning more about our governance, as well as the process for getting elected, and what is expected from voting board members—the requirements to get on the ballot, as well as the responsibilities, obligations, and behaviors that come with the territory—there's lots of good information to help you figure things out. Start by attending some workshops and meetings to get a sense of what our agenda is, and how we work through the agenda.

For more specifics about how the voting board works, call your trustee or reach out to an officer with some questions. Or go to https://hlcc.org/members-information/governance on our website. You can also read our By-Laws for more information about our governance (Article V) and the duties of the Voting Board (Article VII). A copy of our By-Laws is available to all members in the Club office.

If you're seriously considering running for an open position this August you should be aware of a few things. Petitions to get onto the ballot must be submitted by August1 for trustee and officer roles; trustee candidate petitions need 10 signatures from members-in-good-standing from their section, officer candidate petitions need 60 signatures of members-in-good-standing from the community-at-large.

Officer candidates who submit valid petitions will be interviewed for the role of their choice by the Nominating Committee. This committee is made up of seven appointed members-in-good-standing who have served the Club in past years either as an officer, a member of the voting board, a standing committee chairman, or any member who through their particular association with the Club is knowledgeable of officer responsibility and duties. The committee must collectively select a qualified officer candidate for each office and obtain the candidate's agreement to accept such nomination before the selection of all nominees shall be made final. The names of the candidates chosen are submitted to the Chairman of

Elections no less than 30 days before the election.

If you're interested in becoming an officer but aren't selected by the Nominating Committee, you can still get onto the ballot as long as you file with the chairman of the Elections Committee no less than 20 days before the election (which also includes submitting a petition of candidacy signed by at least 60 active members in good standing). The chairman of the Elections committee announces the names of the prospective officer candidates to the membership in the Newsette and posts them on the bulletin board outside the Club office no less than seven days before the election.

All candidates selected by the Nominating Committee are identified in these publications, but no candidates are anointed with the committee's endorsement on the election ballot. Write-in candidates can run for the trustee role in their section or any open officer position, as well, without any petition requirements.

Finally, if you're considering running for an opening position—and even if you aren't—please be aware that the current Voting Board is making headway toward the adoption of a code of conduct that will apply to all voting board members. Being elected to serve on the voting board is a privilege as well as a serious commitment. Having an approved code of conduct in place will clearly define what is expected from our individually elected officials by their fellow voting board members as well as on behalf of the community each board member was elected to represent and serve. It will also create an unbiased enforcement mechanism that enables the removal of voting board members who are unwilling or unable to abide by the approved standards. The final document will be posted on our website and published in the Newsette upon approval.

Committees and club meetings, which had gone mostly remote from 2020-2021, are now meeting in-person with greater frequency. Similarly, you'll see many more events being announced in coming weeks as spring slowly unveils itself and the temperatures outside get warmer. This is all great news for our community—the more we're engaged with each other, the better this place gets.

With engagement in mind, the Voting Board strongly encourages new members who joined the Club over the past three years to take advantage of everything that's happening in our community. Attending voting board workshops and meetings is the best way to understand what's happening here—and how the community is governed.

Joining a committee is a great way to participate in activities and discussions where your job or interests can help make a difference in how our community operates. Similarly, joining one or more of our many clubs will give you new ways to expand your network around areas that interest you. And as you consider these options, please keep in mind that volunteerism is what makes Highland Lakes different from many other private lake communities in the area. Our talented and dedicated employees do a great job taking care of operations, security, and maintenance, but most of the activities and events that occur here (breakfasts, dinners, dances, concerts, etc.) throughout the year happen through the hard work of volunteers. Be the change you want to see.

Season Starts June 27

Fellow Highland Lakers, summer '22 is right around the corner! It is time to start thinking about the activities in which you would like to participate. The 2022 athletic season will start on Monday, June 27. The schedule will be changing back to that of summer 2019. Please see the schedule included below. 



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The Sailing Fleets of Highland Lakes

MARK BURUCHIAN, SAILING COORDINATOR



We are fortunate to have 5 active sailing fleets in Highland Lakes: Sunfish, Force 5, Flying Junior "FJ", Windsurfing, and Hobie. The boats sailed represent different experiences for those interested in sailing. In order to help members find out which boat best fits the needs and wants of their desired sailing experience, here are the fleets:



Sunfish - Highland Lakes Sunfish Fleet #23 with the International Sunfish Class (http://www.sunfishclass.org) One sail. Is raced either with one person or two. Current builder is Laser Performance in Rhode Island. The Sunfish is the most popular recreational sailboat in history. Its classic design, unmatched stability, and sailing ease are enjoyed by all ages. Owners appreciate the lightweight hull, which easily travels on the top of a car. The ultra-durable construction ensures years of maintenance-free enjoyment. Sailing trips are a breeze, just load the Sunfish on your car and go!

This is the classic boat you grew up with. The Sunfish has two easy to rig lines and easy-snap sail rings. A racing sunfish can have an outhaul, cunningham, race-sail with window, and quick-release gooseneck upgrades. The International Sunfish Class sanctions more than 1,000 racing events

each year. In Highland Lakes, we sail four fleets of Sunfish: Junior - Singles (under 19) on Weds @ 11:00 am; Junior - Doubles (two under 19) on Fridays @ 11:00 am; Ladies (19 and over) as a singles race on Thursdays @ 11:00 am; and, Seniors (19 years of age men and women) on Sundays @ 2:30 pm. We also are part of SANJL (Sailing Association of North Jersey Lakes) that holds four Championship regattas at various local lakes. We annually host one of the SANJL regattas and in various years have held the prestigious SANJL Junior Championship Regatta.

Fleet Captains are: Mladen Kresic, Senior Fleet; Sue Buruchian, Ladies Fleet; and, Krissy Amato, Kevin Murphy, and Justin Murphy as Co-Captains of the Junior Fleets.



Force 5 - Class Fleet #27 (http:// force5class.org) The Force 5 is a small one-design racing sailboat that is similar to the more well-known Laser, but with a hard chine aft. Although it is designed for single-handed racing, two people can easily fit into the large cockpit. The boats are currently built in Long Island, New York by Weeks Yacht Yard. This is a competitive, sleek boat that is sensitive to the wind, making for exciting sailing. This 14-foot craft has a 91-foot mainsail, rolled deck, and an adjustable rig. It can be car topped. Force 5 races are held Saturdays @ 10:00 am from the Eckhart Sailing Center. Erika Rodger is the Fleet Captain.

Flying Junior "FJ" - Fleet started 2012. (http://www.cfjclass.org) The current builder is Laser Performance in Rhode Island. The Club Flying Junior is a tough, agile performer for beginners to elite sailors.



The FJ is a fantastic choice for clubs and junior programs looking to introduce young and less seasoned sailors to double-handed sailing with a spinnaker. The collegiate version of the FJ (no spinnaker) is the most popular boat in college sailing and is the type we sail in Highland Lakes; more collegiate sailing teams in North America sail FJ's than any other double-handed sailboat. The Highland Lakes FJ races are sailed on Sundays with two races starting @ 11:00 am. Come enjoy this growing energetic fun fleet. James Sullivan is the Fleet Captain.



Windsurfing (http://uswindsurfing.
org) Windsurfers are simplicity in design
– one board, one sail, and one sailor.
The lightweight foam core boards also
make for a quick and painless transport
to your favorite launch site. Loading and
unloading can easily be done by one person.
Manufacturers produce everything from
stable beginner designs with stand-up
paddle options to planning hull race
boards. We utilize two basic classes for
racing – Sport and Open. The Sport Class

is designed for beginner to novice racers. The maximum allowed sail sizes for racing are 9.5 square meters for the Open Class and 7.5 square meters for the Sport Class. Both classes can use any type manufactured board and sail. US Windsurfing sanctioned events run throughout the year at various locations with points counting toward national rankings at the end of each year. We sail on Saturdays @ 3:00 pm. Kevin Gaston Fleet Captain.



Hobie – Most of the catamarans on the lake are made by Hobie. The Hobie 16 is made of fiberglass, has 2 sails with 20m of sail area, a 27' mast, and weighs 320 lb. Hobies are fun boats to sail, especially in higher wind. We sail Saturdays @ 1:00 pm so come join us if you can. We'd love more of you to join in. Let's show all how these big boats fly! Chip Ehrhardt and Rick Thompson are Co-Captains for this fleet.
