From the President's Desk

Happy Spring everyone. I'd like to report on what the Voting Board has been working on since October 2022.

Lake management has been our top priority. Both the previous and current Voting Boards have spent countless hours reviewing virtually every option available to protect and preserve the health of our lakes. No other topic has been researched or discussed more thoroughly.

Routine septic pumping has been cited repeatedly by our consultant, Princeton Hydro, and highly recommended by independent consultants and environmental regulators as an important step in reducing phosphorus in ground and surface waters. Earlier this month, the Board voted unanimously to enact a mandatory 3-year septic pumping requirement for all Highland Lakes households. The pumping mandate follows the approval in October of a limited, one-time \$50 account credit for septic pumping as an incentive to encourage responsible septic ownership. Proof of pumping is required, and the incentive program will end on September 30, 2025, or if the Township of Vernon enacts a septic pumping mandate.

The Princeton Hydro watershed modelling reports were sent to Applied Watershed Sciences, an independent third-party consultant. The consultant confirmed much of what was contained in the reports and suggested that the nutrient loads might be somewhat higher based on their own modelling and analysis. At the urging of management and with the full support of the Board, Vernon Township has applied for and received grant funding from the Highlands Council for the development of a township watershed management plan. All five of our community lakes will be included in phase one of the plan, scheduled to begin in the coming weeks.

Lake treatment and consulting contracts have been revised to include more thorough testing which is consistent across all lakes and schedule coordination between contractors will ensure that each lake will be inspected every week, with few exceptions. Specific locations and opportunities for manual weed removal are being identified to help reduce our dependence on chemical treatments. When chemical treatments are needed, alternative newer

What a Day!

This year the Ecology, Communications, and Clubhouse committees joined forces to offer Highland Lakes members a chance to participate in an expanded Earth Day celebration that was both informative and fun. In the morning, members took to their sections and participated in a community wide roadside cleanup spearheaded by Barbara Jaggi. We had a wonderful turnout with over 70 members showing up to help. Four intrepid members, including Club President, Ray Zimmerman, cleaned up fish in the eastern cove near Glen Road on the Main Lake. They bagged several hundred fish that were the result of the recent fish kill – a very smelly job!

At noon, members gathered at the Clubhouse in the Seckler Room for a lunch of taco bowls (complete with all the fixings) and roasted vegetables. Special thanks to Clubhouse Committee Chairperson, Louise Staley, who organized and executed this scrumptious meal from start to finish with the help of members Jana Randazzo and Christine Annunziata who assisted the night before with all of the chopping, cooking prep and set-up and Louise's daughter, Sofia and her friend Katya Sucher for serving on the day of the event. They fed close to one hundred members in an hour's time and made it all look effortless. After the event, Louise simply said with a smile, "We all had a good time. Thanks for the opportunity."

A presentation by Lisa Chiariello, from Rutgers Cooperative Extension, followed in the Lake Room. Her topic: Landscaping Design Tips for Lakeside Communities – Protecting Water Quality while Benefiting Wildlife was both informative and entertaining. Close to one-hundred Club members, young and old, listened attentively as Lisa shared tips about how to design and create what she called, "a plant community". She discussed the importance of including only native plants and identified several ways to manage water-flow in your yard to eliminate destructive stormwater runoff, among other topics. You can find many other related resources on the Club's website. While this was underway, Communications Committee member, Karen Dolci, Clubhouse Director, Lauren LaRocca, and Teen Council member Kylee Hardin engaged our youngest Club members with Earth Day related arts and crafts.

Following this, the audience broke into small groups to learn more from our own Club members. Barbara Jaggi, Glenn Kamp, and Jason Tribiano answered questions about their gardening methods – Barbara on composting, Glenn on country yards, and Jason on water runoff management. Stuart Blank shared a model he created that demonstrated how rain gardens slow down the flow of water and allow nutrients to be absorbed. Jake Chromcik, a Boy Scout in Vernon Troop 912 who is working towards his Eagle Scout rank, presented his project to build birdhouses to be placed on Club property and Bob Reffelt gave tours of the Rain Garden that sits between the Clubhouse parking lot and the front lawn.

It is hard to count the number of volunteers and staff who came together to make this day so successful. The Ecology Committee has years of experience running our community clean-up in celebration of Earth Day, and it shows. At an August Communications Committee meeting last year, Stu Blank (Voting Board Trustee for Section 7 and a member of the Committee) voiced his interest in creating an educational event that could be

Memorial Day Holiday Schedule

Extended Office Hours

The Club Office and the Activity Center Office will be open Saturday, May 27, Sunday, May 28 and Monday, May 29, for your convenience from 9 am to 3 pm for payment of dues and badge pickup over the Memorial Day weekend. Please make sure to bring the necessary paperwork if required for proof of residency and copies of vehicle registrations to the Club Office in the event you need to add/change badge and parking permit information.

During weekends in June, regular Club office hours will be Saturdays and Sundays from 10 am to 3 pm. The Activities Center Office will begin opening on Saturdays and Sundays starting June 3 from 10 am to 3 pm and weekdays starting June 26 from 9 am to 3 pm.

If you are a new property owner, require additional family badges, or a property owner registering your property as a rental and/or your tenants/lessees as Associate Members, the Club Office staff only will be able to assist you on Saturday, May 27, and every weekday from 10 am to 3 pm thereafter.

About Changes in your Recorded Deed

In planning changes to your ownership of property that would be reflected in the recorded Deed, contacting the Club Office before you do so for guidance is advisable and will eliminate any misunderstandings.

The Club's By-Laws, in part, define Active Members as those who own property in Highland Lakes. When persons take title to property in Highland Lakes when they do not own other Highland Lakes property at that time, even when they join in the ownership of property with someone who currently owns property in Highland Lakes, they automatically become an active member and are required to pay the Initiation Fee. If you are considering adding anyone to your Deed, a wife, parent, child, friend, etc., please be aware of these By-Law requirements.

Sometimes members form a living or family trust as part of their estate planning. However, even this type of trust is a different, and therefore new, owner of property, and the payment of the Initiation Fee is required.

Volunteers Needed



low-dose and low-impact compounds will be substituted when appropriate. For example, alum which is used to strip nutrients from the water, will be phased out in favor of products like Phoslock and biochar which have virtually zero negative impact on water chemistry. And finally, new aeration systems and technology are being reviewed and will be deployed where needed.

All of which shows that the Board clearly recognizes the need for an "all of the above" approach to managing our lakes and the surrounding watershed.

In addition to improving our lake management efforts, the Club has also made progress on several other projects and initiatives.

Kipcon Engineering has been chosen to prepare the Club's first 30-year reserve study and preventative maintenance schedule. A reserve study is part engineering and part financial analysis which determines funding and cash flow requirements to replace all major assets at or near the end of their useful life. Reserve studies are a long-term planning and budgeting tool and considered "best practice" in large scale private communities everywhere. They nearly eliminate the need for special assessments or deferred maintenance and provide members with assurance that Club assets and amenities are protected for decades to come.

Hundreds of damaged or dead ash trees have been removed from Club property and plans for additional removal will be implemented as the need arises.

The Shadow Lane Drainage Project is near completion, including new stormwater treatment technology which has a median removal efficiency of more 90% for total suspended solids and 75% for phosphorus. Members have shared positive comments on the professionalism and quality of the work by the contractor.

Plans and permits are in the works for replacement of the culvert pipe and restoration of the road surface near the Clubhouse entrance at 2240 Lakeside Drive West. Additional stormwater improvements are expected following completion of the watershed management plan and reserve study.

The ductwork and carpeting were professionally cleaned in the Clubhouse and the Lake Room and hallways received two fresh coats of paint and polyurethane on the windows and trim. New ceiling light fixtures and dimmers were also installed in the Lake Room.

At the April Voting Board meeting, the Board adopted rules addressing three recurring problems.

ATV/Off-road Vehicles - The language of the rule was strengthened and the penalty assessment for anyone caught riding an ATV or other off-road vehicle on our roads was raised from a Tier 3 (\$100) to a Tier 4 (\$500) offense and no warnings will be issued.

Tree Preservation - Members are not allowed to cut down any healthy tree larger than 4" in diameter (at a height of 4 feet) without prior Club approval, except as necessary to carry out building plans.

Exterior Lighting - A rule and penalty assessment was put in place regarding exterior lighting which shines onto lake and/or neighboring properties and is determined to be a nuisance or offensive to the neighborhood.

Do you know folks who are humble, kind and strong or those


who look for the tallest pedestal to place themselves? I think I can safely say most of our HL Volunteers can celebrate a day being humble

Register Your Rentals

Thinking about renting your home? Don't forget to register your tenants with the Club Office and pay the required fees. Long-term rentals are classified as a stay for ninety-one days or more. Members must own their home for at least two years before they can rent it on a short-term basis (limited to 180 days per year). Tenants can obtain daily guest wristbands at the Club Office. No Mow May

Last year was the first time that I heard of No Mow May and when I mentioned it to my husband, he was pleased to participate in something that took no effort on his part and happily agreed to postpone mowing our lawn until June. No Mow May is a campaign that was started by Plantlife https://www.plantlife.org.uk/, a United Kingdom organization, in 2019 to help early season pollinators survive and thrive by allowing flowers that grow in lawns, like clover and violets, to blossom instead of being mowed down. You can also help native bees access such flowers throughout the growing season simply by raising your mowing height or mowing less often. Raising your mowing height also helps your grass to thrive.

More beneficial than not mowing, or mowing less frequently, would be to convert portions of lawn to perennial beds filled with native plants or wildflowers meadows or changing your lawn to include more flowering species.






Monday and Wednesday: 6 pm and Friday: 10 am


TOPS Portal Important Info



Protecting the Main Lake Through Carp Removal

As we enter the warmer months of the year, many of us look forward to enjoying the beauty of our lakes. Unfortunately, the presence of carp, a non-native fish, in our lakes has had a detrimental impact on the quality of our water, contributing to issues such as algae blooms.

In recent years, we have seen an increase in the population of carp in the Main Lake, which has contributed to a rise in nutrient levels in the water and a decrease in oxygen. Carp eat aquatic plants which can reduce beneficial oxygen levels in the lake. Carp are also known for disturbing the lake bottom and stirring up sediment, which releases nutrients like phosphorus and nitrogen back into the water column. These excess nutrients can then feed the growth of algae, leading to unsightly and even hazardous blooms that can negatively impact the health of our lake.

To help overcome these challenges, we are planning to remove a portion of the carp population from our lake. By doing so, we can reduce the amount of nutrients in the water and prevent the growth of algae blooms. Removing carp from the lake will also benefit other species of fish that call our lake home, as carp are known to compete with other fish for resources.

While the process of removing carp from the lake may seem daunting, there are many effective methods available. These include using nets, traps and electroshocking to catch carp, as well as introducing natural predators such as pike or musky to control the carp population. The benefits of these efforts will not only improve the water quality of our lake, but also provide a healthier and more diverse ecosystem for all species of fish and wildlife.
