# **Voting Board Adopts Septic Rule**

#### **VOTING BOARD TRUSTEES**

At the April Voting Board meeting, the Board voted unanimously to require that septic tanks be pumped every three years. Here's a brief history of how the Board arrived at that decision.

Nobody can doubt that the water quality in our lakes has been declining drastically in recent years. For two seasons Lake 4 was shut down entirely, and last year the Main Lake was shut down due to a Harmful Algae Bloom (HAB). Gradually at our monthly and annual meetings the community mandate became clear: Address the lake issues!

Under the leadership of past President Michael Gelfand, the Board undertook three studies which Princeton Hydro had been urging us to do for several years. While the Board waited for the results, the Ecology Committee conducted a broad assessment of factors that could contribute to Highland Lakes' weed and algae problems. They studied everything from global warming to the overabundance of carp in our lakes. We also had the benefit of presentations from Solitude and Princeton Hydro describing issues specific to our lakes.

In June 2022, the NJ Coalition of Lake Associations had a presentation by Dr. Stephen Souza of Clean Waters Consulting entitled "Septic Related to Phosphorus Loading." In his presentation, Dr. Souza encouraged people to "inspect and pump out septic tanks once every three years (as per the U.S. EPA and N.J. DEP) and "Annually inspect your leach field." Knowing there was a possibility that septic runoff might be a contributing factor to Highland Lakes problems, President Gelfand asked our attorney if the Board had the authority to implement septic system rules. Dolan & Dolan confirmed that the Board does have such authority under the Bylaws and should rely on scientific facts and recommendations of its lake management professionals as the basis for determining the regulations.

At the July 15, 2022, Voting Board meeting, the Club manager reported that the results of the Bathymetric, Hydrologic and Nutrient Load studies had been received. The findings were worse than we expected. The estimated percentage of septic impact on the Nitrogen and Phosphorus levels in each of our lakes was OVER 90% in Lakes 1, 3, 4 & 5. The percentage for Lake 2 was 87%. The

- reports included the following recommendations:
- "modeling results overall show that loading from septic systems is the largest contributor of nutrients to all five of the main lakes and should be a priority in management efforts."
- "Septic management should be implemented to help minimize nutrient loading"
- "In general, the inspections and pump outs should be viewed as an insurance policy for the long-term proper operation of the septic system and not an imposition of the property rights of a homeowner."

So that the Voting Board could be completely confident in the findings, in October the reports were sent to a third-party consultant for independent peer review. Also, at that October meeting the Board began discussing ways to encourage residents to pump every three years. A \$50 dues credit was initiated as an incentive. That incentive is still available to members through September 2025.

While we waited for the peer review, the Board began implementation of other means to help resolve the lakes' decline. A stormwater assessment helped identify inlet stream locations that contribute the most sediment and nutrient volume. BioChar filtrations are being installed at those locations. A program to remove the enormous carp population was instituted and is currently underway. Weed harvesting is being done extensively at Lake 4. Hydroraking is being considered to remove submerged biomass, and drainage remediation efforts are underway to address road runoff. Our efforts are ongoing, diverse and extensive.

The independent peer review was received in February of this year. It concurred with Princeton Hydro's findings and, in fact went further. It states:

- "Nitrogen tends to be very mobile in soils of even normally functioning leach fields. It is plausible that some older leach fields still provide 95% removal of wastewater phosphorus, but across many properties, even that amount of nutrient reduction can still be problematic for surface waters. Nitrogen mobility in soils/groundwater is extremely problematic in nearly all scenarios."
- "Even if half of all homes are used only seasonally, septic loads would still be significant to the HLCC waterbodies."

# About Changes in your Recorded Deed

In planning changes to your ownership of property that would be reflected in the recorded Deed, contacting the Club Office before you do so for guidance is advisable and will eliminate any misunderstandings.

The Club's By-Laws, in part, define Active Members as those who own property in Highland Lakes. When persons take title to property in Highland Lakes when they do not own other Highland Lakes property at that time, even when they join in the ownership of property with someone who currently owns property in Highland Lakes, they automatically become an active member and are required to pay the Initiation Fee. If you are considering adding anyone to your Deed, a wife, parent, child, friend, etc., please be aware of these By-Law requirements.

Sometimes members form a living or family trust as part of their estate planning. However, even this type of trust is a different, and therefore new, owner of property, and the payment of the Initiation Fee is required.

• "Regular 2-year septic system pumping and inspections will help identify failing systems."

Cognizant of the Voting Board's fiduciary obligation to care for the Club's lakes and having completed the necessary due diligence, it became apparent that some meaningful effort to address septic issues needed to be implemented.

Highland Lakes was conceived as a summer community, so land plots were small. As the community developed into year-round living, wells were drilled and some septic improvements were made. Today most properties have a well and a septic system squeezed onto these tiny lots. After almost 100 years, the Club's experts have confirmed what we already know, which is that septic issues at Highland Lakes have reached critical proportions. The concern about septic runoff goes beyond the quality of our lakes. It may also be infiltrating our individual wells which we use for drinking and cooking. In the course of our discussions, we wrestled with questions:

- What about residents with financial constraints? To that end we're working to determine if the Goodwill Fund can be expanded in some way to help address that issue. Also, our attorney reports that "grants are available to seniors or people with disabilities or limited financial resources if the septic needs to be upgraded for their own use...These grants are available through the NJ Department of Consumer Affairs."
- What about people with newer systems? Installers of those systems were contacted and they reported that those systems still have holding tanks and accordingly they should be pumped every 2-3 years.
- What about those who live alone or only use their houses on weekends? We referred back to the independent analysis mentioned above, "Even under those conditions, septic loads would still be significant to the HLCC waterbodies."

No proposal was a panacea, a perfect fit for every home and situation. In the end we turned again to the experts. The U.S. EPA, NJ DEP, Princeton Hydro (with 26 awards over the last ten years for excellence in water resource management,) etc. all recommend that septics should be pumped every 2 to 3 years. The Board concluded that that was the right decision to make and it needed to be implemented sooner rather than later.

The lakes are our biggest asset. They define our community and dictate our property values. We invite you to attend our monthly meetings where we continuously discuss our lake management progress and future challenges. We hope you will graciously join us in our efforts to preserve our beautiful lake community.

#### **Lifeguards Wanted**

The following dates in July are the scheduled dates for the 2023 Blended Learning Lifeguarding Certification Class. This certification includes CPR, AED, Lifeguarding and Waterfront. Blended Learning includes online modules to be completed by the student prior to the start of the first class. Please note that the class costs \$100, \$50 due at sign up (this is nonrefundable) and the remaining \$50 due on the first day. Checks can be made out to HLCC marked attention Water Safety. All classes are mandatory and include a lunch break. Students are required to bring an exercise appropriate bathing suit, a notebook and something to write with every day of class. It is recommended that students bring 2 towels, a change of clothes, lunch and snacks, plenty of water and sunblock. Students will be provided with a CPR mask and a textbook. Classes will be held rain or shine, and will meet at the swim lanes at the start of every day unless told otherwise.



# Carp Electrofishing on the Main Lake

You may have noticed some commotion in the shallow portions of some coves on the Main Lake. The fish thrashing on the surface of the water are carp engaging in their spawning ritual. The Fishing and Ecology Committees have been monitoring water temperatures and observing the lake for this event. We had been planning our first-ever carp population assessment and removal for months. An overabundance of carp can be detrimental to other fish species and the quality of water in our lake. Carp compete for some of the same resources that other fish need to thrive. In addition, carp are bottom feeders and stir up nutrients that have settled on the lake bottom, which can contribute to algae blooms.

Many carp were removed from the lake to assess their size and numbers. The removal operation took place on Thursday and Friday, May 18th and 19th. A crew from SUNY Cobleskill Fisheries and Wildlife Department arrived on Thursday with their electroshocking boat. The crew, along with volunteer Glenn Kamp, worked on the boat from Thursday afternoon until midnight and again on Friday morning. The boat entered many coves where the carp gather near the surface. As the boat moved into the cove the carp were shocked to temporarily stun them. Fishermen

with long nets quickly worked to bring them onto the boat before the shock wore off. The carp were then placed into a containment area containing clove (the spice) which humanely caused the carp to expire. When the containment area was full, the boat came ashore (if it was near Beach 3) or tubs of carp were ferried to the beach in the Club safety boat driven by volunteer Steve Luoni. Other volunteers were at the beach, many from the Fishing and Ecology Committees, who put the heavy, slippery fish into bags and placed them in a trailer. On Friday, the Space Farms Zoo truck arrived and took every single fish on the trailer, which will be used as food for the bears at the zoo.

The day and a half operation was very successful with a haul of over 1,000 pounds of carp removed from the lake. Approximately 97 fish were caught and the SUNY Fishery experts said that the average fish was 11 pounds with the largest being approximately double that weight. It was especially interesting to watch the boat and fishermen operate, as one of the biggest catches of the operation was at the shoreline of Beach 3 by the cattails.

We are thankful for the many volunteers who made this effort a success!







# **Aquatic Weed Harvesting on Lake 4**

Aquatic plant cutting and harvesting using specialized boats is a sustainable and effective method for controlling and managing the growth of aquatic plants in water bodies such as our lakes. Harvesting with boats is a natural and safe way to remove unwanted aquatic plants.

One of the key benefits of aquatic plant cutting and harvesting is that it promotes healthy aquatic ecosystems by reducing the density of aquatic vegetation. This can improve water quality and enhance recreational opportunities such as swimming, fishing, boating, while supporting the growth of desirable native plants and wildlife. By cutting the plant, a portion of it remains under the surface where it can continue to supply necessary oxygen to the water and absorb nutrients which can contribute to algae blooms.


In early May, Lake 4 was observed to have an unusually large number of weeds breaking the surface of the water. Soon after, it was decided to utilize harvesting to reduce the weed growth and a vendor was contracted. The vendor brought their equipment to the beach on Lake 4 and got to work. A specialized boat equipped with cutting blades and a skimmer, called a Weedoo, was used to cut sections of the curly pondweed up to 5 feet in depth and then come back with the skimmer to gather up the cuttings. Then the Weedoo brought the cuttings to a tritoon (a triple pontoon boat) where the weeds could begin to dry out. When full, the tritoon was ferried to shore and unloaded into a trailer with an excavator. When the trailer was full, it was driven to the tree farm on Barrett Road for compost. That is a lot of equipment to get the job done!


Many of the residents around Lake 4 were very happy to see their lake get a much-needed weeding. This is our first attempt in recent years to harvest aquatic plants as we look for innovative ways to care for our lakes. Future plans are being developed by Club administration and will be brought to the Voting Board for funding more weed harvesting on our lakes.

Aquatic plant cutting and harvesting using specialized boats is a safe, effective, and environmentally friendly way to manage aquatic vegetation in our lakes. By utilizing this method, we can maintain healthy and vibrant aquatic ecosystems for generations to come.
