

Beach Water Testing Results

Below are the results of the most recent E. coli testing at the Club's beaches and swim lanes performed by Garden State Laboratories, Inc. Weekly tests are required by the State of New Jersey, and results must not exceed 320 organisms per 100 milliliters. All samples conformed to NJ State recreational bathing standards. Testing results are also reported by the lab to the Sussex County Department of Health.

Summer Garbage Pickup

First pickup – Tuesday, July 3

The Club's summer garbage pickup for ten weeks with Blue Diamond Disposal begins on Monday, July 3. Garbage pickup services continue on Mondays throughout the summer and end on Tuesday, September 5 (due to Labor Day holiday). The schedule is as follows: July 3, 10, 17, 24, 31 and August 7, 14, 21, 28. The last pickup will be Tuesday, September 5. Please remember – your garbage must be out by 6:30 am on collection day.

Household garbage removal services through the Club are limited to one toter (supplied by Waste Management or Blue Diamond to their year-round customers) or the equivalent of three, 32 gallon regular size household garbage cans. Only household refuse will be picked up – no bulky waste, tires, construction debris, etc. and recycling is not provided.

Customers of Blue Diamond or Waste Management will be receiving letters explaining the amount of the credit you are entitled to on your invoice if you have paid your dues and assessments in full before Club services begin on July 3. Please note that both haulers will continue to provide recycling services to you, for which you will be invoiced, during the Club's ten week period of service by Blue Diamond.

Only members in good standing are entitled to credits on their invoice from their garbage hauler. Customers paying their Club balances after the commencement of services will receive a reduced, prorated credit on their invoices from Blue Diamond or Waste Management. On the day of garbage collection, if your house has been missed, please notify the Club office as soon as possible so arrangements can be made for pick up.

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About Changes in your Recorded Deed

In planning changes to your ownership of property that would be reflected in the recorded Deed, contacting the Club Office before you do so for guidance is advisable and will eliminate any misunderstandings.

The Club's By-Laws, in part, define Active Members as those who own property in Highland Lakes. When persons take title to property in Highland Lakes when they do not own other Highland Lakes property at that time, even when they join in the ownership of property with someone who currently owns property in Highland Lakes, they automatically become an active member and are required to pay the Initiation Fee. If you are considering adding anyone to your Deed, a wife, parent, child, friend, etc., please be aware of these By-Law requirements.

Sometimes members form a living or family trust as part of their estate planning. However, even this type of trust is a different, and therefore new, owner of property, and the payment of the Initiation Fee is required.

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Julia Crafton on the Seckler Stage

On June 10, Seckler Stage and the Open Mic series hosted Julia Crafton in concert to celebrate the release of her second album, Nothing. At just 17 years old, Julia has been a "Featured Artist" at the Metropolitan Museum of Art's Balcony Bar from Home Series in New York City, performed at various venues in New York, Massachusetts, and New Orleans and has had her songs played on radio stations all over the US including WFMT in Chicago, WMNF in Florida, and KMUZ in Oregon. Her latest recorded project features legendary musicians including drummer Bernard "Pretty" Purdie (Aretha Franklin, Steely Dan), guitarist Mitch Stein (Cyndi Lauper, Bill Evans), keyboard and pianist Dan Rieser (Norah Jones, Martha Wainwright, Marc Cohn), guitarist Walter Parks (Richie Havens, The Nudes), bass player Dave Richards (Indigo Girls, Dayna Kurtz), the ETHEL String Quartet (Joe Jackson, Todd Rundgren), guitarist Sam Schumann, drummer Morgan Parker (MJ The Musical), and pianist Ted Baker (Steely Dan, Art Garfunkel).

The HLCC community came together for a great night of music, food, drinks, and a surprise opening guest, Maren Stubenvoll (Crafton's cousin visiting from Montana), who set the tone for the show with her smooth, folksy voice and acoustic guitar.

To begin the set, Crafton came on stage with guitarist Michael Carapella to sing an acoustic version of the title track of her album Nothing. The show ran over an hour and a half and included energy driven pop/rock songs such as "Thoughts from a Bubble" and "Perfect Plan" as well as thought-provoking ballads such as "Beautiful Girl" and

"Hiding Place," bringing the crowd to a place of emotional rawness. The evening was powered by Crafton's band, Emily Davies on bass, Morgan Parker on drums, and Michael Carapella (mentioned earlier) on guitar with Maren Stubenvoll joining on back-ground vocals. When asked what made her decide to perform a concert in Highland Lakes, Crafton responded, "I played a show in New York last night at The Bitter End in the West Village to celebrate the release of Nothing, it was wonderful, but I will always be a Highland Lake's kid. This is home. I am grateful to so many people in this community for supporting me and my music over the years as well as my friends and teachers at Vernon High School. It's a different type of love when the people you're playing for have watched you grow up."

Crafton, who is graduating VTHS this June, will be taking a gap year starting this fall to live in New Orleans and study the music and jazz culture down in the Big Easy. 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Planning for Tree Succession Around Your Home

Most of us love the trees in our yards. They provide both summer shade and leaves to rake in the fall (except for the conifers). They seem to be permanent parts of the landscape. But most of our hemlocks are gone or being treated and all our ash will soon be gone. We all know the damage from hurricanes and ice storms but there are also more subtle changes to trees we need to recognize.

Assess the current health of your existing trees. Are there hollow cavities? Is bark missing exposing the heartwood to rot (eventually leading to cavities)? Have limbs come off providing entry points for decay? Do mature trees have new branches coming out of the sides of the trunk (called epicormic branching)? If so, it is a sign of major stress. That tree will not be long for your yard. And all these conditions can become safety hazards when they impact the tree's structural integrity.

With any of these conditions, the wise approach is to plan for a replacement now. Maybe the existing tree will last another five, ten, even 20 years. Great! Plant a replacement now so that it will be ready when needed.

Check out the site for the new tree. Are there overhead wires or other competing tree limbs? What size and shape tree do you want? Leaf size and density affect flowers and lawns below. Do you want edible fruit or nuts? Do you want spring flowers, summer bloom, fall colors? Do you prefer smooth, shiny, rough or peeling bark?

How long will the tree live? How quickly will it grow? Some species require full sun; others are shade tolerant. Some need lots of water; others want well drained soils. Some like acid soils; others don't. Some trees make messes on lawns or have sharp burrs potentially harmful to children. The point is that you need to plan for tree succession and you need to do some homework before

deciding which species to plant.

And in NJ, all tree species need to be protected from deer browse. If you intend to plant a tree and do not intend to put a five-foot tall wire cage around it, don't bother planting it at all. And use a wire cage, not a tree tube.

When is the best time to plant a tree? As the old adage goes, the best time is 20 years ago but the second-best time is now. If you are planting a replacement tree for an existing tree that may last another 20 years, you essentially have the opportunity to plant a tree 20 years ago today!






Due to the invasion of the Emerald Ash Borer and necessary removal due to construction, septic replacement, etc., we have lost and will be losing many of our old trees here in Highland Lakes. The native ash accounts for one third of all at the trees in our community. This is a good time to look into planting a tree native to our part of the country.

Consider planting a red maple (Acer rubrum), a medium-sized tree from 40 to 60 feet high at maturity with a rounded or irregular crown spreading to 40 feet. Young bark is smooth and gray, turning rough and darker with age.

Red maple transplants easily and grows very fast in moist soils, but it can also do well on dry sites.

Red maple is one of the best named of all trees. There is something red in all seasons - buds in winter, flowers in spring, leafstalks in summer, and brilliant foliage in autumn. This pageant of color, along with red maple's relatively fast growth and tolerance to a wide range of soils makes it a widely planted favorite.

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Lake Conditions Update

The mild winter resulted in very little ice-over and snow cover on our lakes. As a result, much more sun light has been available for underwater plants and algae to get an early start on spring growth. We have observed higher than normal early growth of curly leaf pondweed and filamentous algae in Highland Lakes and our lake consultants have confirmed similar conditions in many other NJ/NY/PA lakes. We expect that the impact of the mild winter will be mitigated to some degree because of more frequent inspections, expanded water quality testing and alternative treatment options which have been approved by the Voting Board in recent months.

In addition to our standard testing of temperature, dissolved oxygen, pH, clarity (secchi depth) and conductance, beginning this season our agreement with Princeton Hydro (PH) now includes more frequent comprehensive testing including two forms of nitrogen, multiple forms of phosphorus, total suspended solids, and planktonic surveys. This enhanced testing will be done consistently across all lakes and the lagoon. In addition, PH will be performing several nutrient reduction treatments in Lake 4. Because Lake 4 has experienced recurring HABs in recent years, PH will be applying three treatments of EutroSORB, a new product which has been shown to be environmentally safe and more effective in removing phosphorus from the water column. Also in Lake 4, they have installed buoys containing filtration "socks" or "sleeves" containing biochar, another chemically inert treatment found to be effective in removing phosphorus.

And finally, thanks to the efforts of the Ecology Committee and Trustee Bob Reffelt, a firm was hired to perform weed harvesting on Lake 4. Weed harvesting removes biomass (vegetation) rather than allowing it to die in place and contribute unwanted nutrients to the lake. Physical removal of weeds and algae on or near the surface and along shorelines can enhance the recreational use and appearance of our lakes as well as reduce phosphorus levels. It might be especially helpful to those members who often experience heavy accumulations of wind-blown algae in coves and along the shoreline.

The weed harvesting project was approved as a trial to assess its cost-effectiveness and practicality. Approximately 80 cubic yards of biomass was removed and is being converted to organic mulch at a local tree farm. There is no doubt that weed harvesting has several clear advantages over chemical treatments, but the process can be very time consuming, significantly more costly, and may temporarily impact aesthetics and recreational use. The Ecology Committee and management will continue to explore ways of conducting weed harvesting more efficiently with the possibility of implementing it on a wider scale next season.

Also new this season is an agreement with Lake Management Sciences (LMS) of Branchville, NJ. LMS is a highly respected, award-winning firm which has been serving public and private lake communities in NJ, NY, and PA for many years. LMS is well-qualified and equipped to perform all the services previously provided by Solitude Lake Management. The staff is knowledgeable and experienced in the latest products and research available for lake treatment and will be working closely with the Club and Princeton Hydro to maintain a more coordinated and effective approach to managing our lakes.

While we have no control over mild winters, excessive summer heat and sun or varying amounts of rainfall, all of which affect the health of our lakes, we have made some significant changes in those things which we can control - monitoring, testing, treatment, and prevention. The initial spring growth has now receded in response to treatment. Service reports detailing inspection and treatment of all lakes are available in the "Documents" section of the member's portal.

Please be assured that we will continue to explore every option available to protect and preserve the health and beauty of Highland Lakes.
