Petitions for Trustee Positions Available

Filing Deadline - Monday, July 26

At this year's Annual Meeting on August 15, 2021, elections will be held for full, three-year terms commencing October 1, 2021, for Trustee positions for Sections 2, 9, 10, 11 and Section 5 for the remaining 2 years of the 3-year term.

In order for a candidate's name for Trustee to be on the ballot, the candidate must reside in the section, be a property owner and have been a member in good standing for the three years immediately preceding the election. The candidate is required to file a petition with the Elections Chairperson containing five signatures from members in good standing in the section electing a Trustee. Petitions will be available at the Club Office only, Monday through Friday, 10 am to 3 pm, and on Saturdays, 10 am to 1 pm beginning July 5, 2021. The petition must be received at the Club Office at least twenty (20) days before the election, which means no later than 4 pm on Monday, July 26, 2021.

Once the petitions have been certified by the Elections Chairperson, Absentee Ballots will become available. The Absentee Ballot must be received at the Club Office, either by mail or in person, with your validated 2021 Membership Card enclosed in the provided envelope no later than Wednesday, August 11, 2021, at 4 pm.

Elections will be held at the Annual Meeting on August 15. Please make sure that you attend this meeting and that you have your 2021 Membership Card and badge with you.

Beach Water Testing Results

Below are the results of the most recent E. coli testing at the Club's beaches and swim lanes performed by Garden State Laboratories, Inc. Weekly tests are required by the State of New Jersey, and results must not exceed 320 organisms per 100 milliliter. All samples conformed to NJ State recreational bathing standards. Testing results are also reported by the lab to the Sussex County Department of Health.



Have you ever seen a sign like this? Do you know that Highland Lakes has hundreds of storm drains? So what exactly is a storm drain and why do we have them mounted in our private roadways? If you ever lived in a city or densely populated suburb you may have referred to these structures along the curb as "the sewer". This seems to imply that whatever goes into them ends up being

processed in some "sewer treatment" facility. Unfortunately that is not the case.

In Highland Lakes our storm drains capture road sediment and allow storm water to flow directly or indirectly into our lakes and streams. By capturing the rain they help remove heavier sediments and reduce erosion caused by fast moving runoff during rain storms. If they are blocked by leaves and debris, they no longer perform this function. Any less dense liquids and solids like oil and detergents that float on water and enter the drains will not be stopped from entering our water bodies.

So what should we be doing as cohabitants with our storm drains?

- Observe the storm drains near your home and when you walk.
- Clear leaves/debris yourself if practical or notify the Club office of a blockage or a non-functioning storm drain.
- Avoid using car washing detergents and never dump oils in the road.
- Avoid spreading fertilizers especially near the roadway.
- Do not put any contents of an aquarium into the drain.
- Do not put anything into a storm drain that you wouldn't want to have swimming or floating beside you.

Our HL Road Committee and maintenance staff coordinate the removal of sediment from our storm drains each year. Help them do their job.

The Goodwill Fund

The Goodwill Fund was started in 2005 to help people in our community who were facing financial hardships due to a catastrophic event or series of smaller events that have made life very difficult. In 2018 the Fund recipients were expanded to assist eligible Seniors. Every year members of the community have the opportunity to donate money to this Fund through private donations or through participation in a variety of fundraising activities, like the Community Yard Sale. The money raised in this way is dedicated to the Fund and can only be used to help members in good standing pay their mandatory annual Club dues and assessments or some portion of those fees. To apply for assistance, applications must be received by July 31, 2021.

Eclectic Festival of the Arts Held



Hello HL Sunfish Sailors (continued from p5)

- In case of high winds or storms, the race may be called by the captain earlier in the day. If we can use the hotline, we will, and I will send an email. It would be great if I could text everyone, so please provide me your cell phone numbers that can receive texts. Should conditions change while we are in the middle of a race (e.g., lightning) the race will be automatically be called and any sailors should immediately head for shore and shelter, as is normal safety practice.
- Our race season will include one throw-out for every 4 races (assuming a minimum of 5 races). So, if we sail 16 races, there will be 4 throw-outs.

As always, safety is our number one priority:

- Sailing at Highland Lakes has always been at your own risk. So please remember that ALL RACERS SAIL AT THEIR OWN RISK.
- To maximize safety and minimize the need for rescue, all sailors are highly encouraged to wear life vests, even if you are used to sailing without one. You should certainly have one in your boat even if you do not wear it.
- To prevent turtling, and make it easier to right your boat, you may want to tie a jug (20 oz or milk jug with a top on, or filled with foam like Great Stuff) to the top of your mast.

First pickup - Tuesday, July 6

The Club's summer garbage pickup for ten weeks with Blue Diamond Disposal begins on Tuesday, July 6, due to the observance of July 4 on Monday, July 5. Garbage pickup services continue on Mondays throughout the summer and end on Tuesday, September 7 (due to Labor Day holiday). The schedule is as follows: July 6, 12, 19, 26, August 2, 9, 16, 23, and 30. The last pickup will be Tuesday, September 7. Please remember - your garbage must be out by 6:30 am on collection day.

Household garbage removal services through the Club are limited to one toter (supplied by Waste Management or Blue Diamond to their year-round customers) or the equivalent of three, 32 gallon regular size household garbage cans. Only household refuse will be picked up – no bulky waste, tires, construction debris, etc. and recycling is not provided.

Customers of Blue Diamond or Waste Management will be receiving letters explaining the amount of the credit you are entitled to on your invoice if you have paid your dues and assessments in full before Club services begin on July 5. Please note that both haulers will continue to provide recycling services to you, for which you will be invoiced, during the Club's ten week period of service by Blue Diamond.

Only members in good standing are entitled to credits on their invoice for garbage removal services. Customers paying their Club balances after the commencement of services will receive a reduced, prorated credit on their invoices from Blue Diamond or Waste Management.





Properly Securing Pontoon Boats to Club Dock Spaces

A very happy summer to all HL members from your Boat Dock Committee! As part of our ongoing monitoring and inspection of all of the Club's boat docks and dock spaces, there is a recurring issue regarding the improper securing of pontoon boats to dock spaces/slips at all EZ Dock system locations (e.g., Clubhouse Park, Comet Row). With pontoon boats being a highly popular and fast growing craft type, we wanted to bring everyone's attention to this issue. When parking pontoon boats with the bow facing in towards the dock, if not secured properly, the front (pointy) and sides of the pontoons can do some significant damage to the plastic material that the EZ dock system is made of. We have already observed some scuffs, chips, shavings, and even holes in several dock spaces due to pontoon boat owners not properly securing their boats (Figure 1). The EZ dock components are expensive to repair and even more expensive to replace, so this is a serious concern. To avoid any future damage, please consider the following when docking and securing your pontoon boat:

Don't:


- Use bungee ropes with slack, or that have not been fully extended, to secure your boat (Figure 2). When not set to their furthest extended limits, these ropes are ineffective at preventing movement of the boat as water wake causes the bungee rope to flex. This results in the boat coming into contact with the dock causing damage.
- Leave slack in any rope/line that is securing your boat to the dock (Figure 3).
- Secure the boat only on the sides. This will allow the boat to move frontwards and backwards in the slip causing dock damage.
- Secure only the front of the boat. This will allow the boat to shift from side-to-side causing dock damage.

Do:

- Attach bumpers/fenders to the fronts and sides of your boat in a manner that guards the boat's pontoons and deck from coming into contact with the dock. While the bumpers/fenders on the sides of the pontoons can be hung in a vertical fashion (Figure 4), this method is not effective for bumpers hung on the front of the pontoons (Figure 2). Those bumpers/ fenders hung from the front of the pontoon should be hung horizontally at a height that prevents the pointy/sharp part of the pontoon or the front of the boat deck from coming in contact with the dock (Figure 5).
- With your boat centered in the slip, tie bow lines (Figure 6 Red Lines) and stern lines (Figure 6 Yellow Lines) to each side of the dock slip to prevent side-to-side movement of your boat in the slip.
- Attach a taught line from the boat bow to a dock cleat near the boat stern (Figure 6 Blue Lines). This is called the After Bow (AB) Spring Line. The AB Spring Line helps prevent the boat from shifting forward which is the primary cause of the pointy/sharp part of the pontoons coming into contact with the dock causing damage. This should be done on both the starboard and port sides of the boat.
- Attach a taught line from the boat stern to a dock cleat near the boat bow (Figure 6 Green Lines). This is called the Forward Quarter (FQ) Spring Line. The FQ Spring Line is meant to prevent any aft movement, provide additional stability when the boat is in the boat slip, and aide in boat dock contact prevention. Again this should be done on both sides of the boat.

If your pontoon boat is found not to be in compliance with the above recommendations, your boat may be damaging the dock and you will be held responsible for any damages caused. If you notice a pontoon boat not secured properly, please notify Highland Lakes Security immediately. Please be mindful as you are securing your pontoon boat after a fun day on the water so that our docks always stay in great condition and can be enjoyed for many more summers to come.
