Carry In Carry Out

The Club's Carry In Carry Out policy was adopted by the Voting Board in 2019 and implemented the summer of 2020. Although this policy is not unique to us, it was a new concept for our community. Like many new ideas, it takes some getting used to. Pre-planning for your events or time spent in public areas such as freeways, ball fields, recreational courts, and beaches is a must (garbage cans can still be found at the Clubhouse and Beach 1). The idea is simple and easy to follow – if you bring it in, you take it out.

Like our community Clean Up Day, it's all about keeping our shared outdoor spaces clean and beautiful, and pest-and odor-free. It also helps to keep all of us mindful of the other Three R's: Reducing waste, Reusing whenever possible, and Recycling.

This policy reminds us to bring reusable containers, cups, plates and utensils to our events and get-togethers, as well as to use cloth napkins and tablecloths. And of course, make sure to bring garbage bags with you so you can bring home and dispose of any refuse.

Don't forget to separate recyclable cans and glass from the rest of your trash, and dispose of them properly at home. For a bigger impact, you can also research and purchase products that are made from or packaged in recycled materials.

The Carry In Carry Out policy is a small step that encourages us to cut down on waste. Look for and invest in durable, quality outdoor items such as chairs and sports gear (and indoor items as well) that will last longer and

save money and resources in the long run. Repair used equipment and other items instead of discarding them. Think about what you could donate or reuse somewhere else, or even sell. Think Highland Lakes Yard Sale! Or have a yard sale of your own; there is always someone out there who will see your unneeded or unwanted item as a treasure. Ultimately although some may find it inconvenient, there are many benefits of Carry In Carry Out, including:

- Elimination of overflowing garbage containers
- Increased safety due to the reduction of stinging insects, rodents, bears, and other wildlife that is attracted to garbage
- Reduction of odors from garbage
- Encouraging people to reduce, reuse, and recycle

My grandmother had a great plaque in her kitchen and I remember her repurposing many things so as not to be wasteful. I believe the saying originated during World War II and is still relevant today:

Use it up

Wear it out

Make it do

Or Do without!

Our parents and grandparents were reusing and recycling long before it became popular. In the long run though, we are all responsible for keeping our community clean and beautiful. It's a wonderful place to live; let's keep it that way!

From the President's Desk

By-Law Change Proposed at Upcoming Annual Meeting

At the upcoming Annual Meeting, members are being asked to vote on proposed changes to an existing By-Law that currently limits the Voting Board's spending authority for property acquisition at \$10,000 in the aggregate, per year. As of today, any property that costs greater than that amount cannot be purchased by the Club without a two-thirds approval by the entire Voting Board, then a two-thirds majority vote of members at a properly scheduled special meeting with a quorum present.

Why is this a problem, you wonder? When the By-Law in question was written—in 1936, the year Highland Lakes was founded—\$10,000 was equivalent to the purchasing power of nearly \$194,000 today.

Understandably, our community needs safeguards in place to prevent the Voting Board from irresponsibly spending. But the current By-Law's spending limit has

never been adjusted for inflation and is no longer sufficient for many potential real estate acquisitions. This is highly problematic for the Voting Board of today and tomorrow, making it impossible to move quickly or decisively when such opportunities arise.

To put things into a real-world context, an undeveloped, 65-acre lot just outside the border of Highland Lakes recently sold in May 2020 for \$235,000. When it came on the market, a special committee was created by the Voting Board to perform a preliminary analysis of the property's strategic benefits and potential risks for the Club. We considered the utility of the parcel in the context of long-term planning goals, including maintaining a buffer on our border, relocation of existing storage and maintenance facilities, or even hiking/nature trails. Serious concerns about remediating known property hazards as well as inherent limitations on the property's use led that committee to eventually recommend against the purchase.

Beach Water Testing Results

Below are the results of the most recent E. coli testing at the Club's beaches and swim lanes performed by Garden State Laboratories, Inc. Weekly tests are required by the State of New Jersey, and results must not exceed 320 organisms per 100 milliliters. All samples conformed to NJ State recreational bathing standards. Testing results are also reported by the lab to the Sussex County Department of Health.

Petitions for Trustee Positions Available

Filing Deadline - Monday, July 26

At this year's Annual Meeting on August 15, 2021, elections will be held for full, three-year terms commencing October 1, 2021, for Trustee positions for Sections 2, 9, 10, 11 and Section 5 for the remaining 2 years of the 3-year

In order for a candidate's name for Trustee to be on the ballot, the candidate must reside in the section, be a property owner and have been a member in good standing for the three years immediately preceding the election. The candidate is required to file a petition with the Elections Chairperson containing five signatures from members in good standing in the section electing a Trustee. Petitions will be available at the Club Office only, Monday through Friday, 10 am to 3 pm, and on Saturdays, 10 am to 1pm beginning July 5, 2021. The petition must be received at the Club Office at least twenty (20) days before the election, which means no later than 4 pm on Monday, July 26, 2021.

Once the petitions have been certified by the Elections Chairperson, Absentee Ballots will become available. The Absentee Ballot must be received at the Club Office, either by mail or in person, with your validated 2021 Membership Card enclosed in the provided envelope no later than Wednesday, August 11, 2021, at 4 pm.

Elections will be held at the Annual Meeting on August 15. Please make sure that you attend this meeting and that you have your 2021 Membership Card and badge with you.

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Building Dreams

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If the Voting Board had wanted to bid on the property at that time, it would have been unable to do so without first receiving approval from the membership. And in the time it would have taken to receive that approval we may have missed out on the opportunity altogether. This specific opportunity arose in the late fall and early winter, which is a notoriously difficult time of year to plan and notify members of a special meeting with any hope of having a quorum present to vote.

The benefits of property acquisition are varied. Sometimes there are property tax advantages achieved for the Club by consolidating lots. Other times we've purchased lots where the deed covenants and restrictions weren't in the title and the acquisition helped protect the community's neighborhood scheme. Back in the 1990s the area that is now Beach 1 was going to potentially be turned into a strip mall, and may have eliminated buildings, road access, and a bus stop. Can you imagine our community today with a strip mall in place rather than the Beach 1 facility? In this case, the Club was only able to purchase the property to prevent what was being planned when the court forced the property in question (along with others) to be sold, enabling us enough time to get the necessary approval from members to thwart disaster.

In each and every instance, when such opportunities arise, we assess potential benefits, risks and threats to the community with input, as needed, from legal counsel, the Planning Committee and/or the Buildings & Grounds Committee, and from paid subject matter experts (examples of which might include a Highlands Acts lawyer, a geologist, a forester, or an endangered species specialist).

In order to move forward on any acquisition—whether it's less or more than \$10,000— two-thirds of the entire Voting Board (12 or more votes whether the entire 17-member Voting Board is present or not) must vote in favor of the purchase. That means it takes a lot of hard work to build a strong consensus around any decision and get the votes to support it—it doesn't happen without lots of due diligence, transparency, and serious discussions over the course of multiple meetings.

In other words, no big-ticket real estate deal is ever going to receive the necessary votes unless a two-thirds majority of dedicated Voting Board members analyzes it thoroughly, discusses it to death, concludes it serves the Club's—and, therefore, members' interests, and votes to support it. And if you've been paying attention to projects that past Voting Boards have been considering—such as whether or not to install drinking fountains at the Clubhouse—you know that the Voting Board sweats details and doesn't take any decision lightly, particularly those that might justifiably raise eyebrows or incite members to come to a meeting with pitchforks and torches.

There will always be properties in, contiguous to, and within relative proximity of Highland Lakes that are not currently for sale today but will be someday. The Voting Board has identified a handful of such properties that would be strategically attractive and highly beneficial additions to our community if they were available. With the current By-Law in place, we would be unable to quickly act on any of them if they went on the market—we researched their fair market values and found that they range between \$180,000 - \$1.4 million.

If and when one or more of those properties becomes available, this Voting Board—or, more likely, a future one—will need greater financial flexibility to quickly bid and negotiate with a seller before another interested party can act. This doesn't mean that it will buy for the sake of buying, that it will do so without careful consideration, or that it'll even be authorized to spend what it might take without a vote by members to approve it. But right now the Voting Board's hands are tied behind its back. Without this proposed By-Law change, we would be unable to move forward on any of these prospects, and would find ourselves on the outside looking in at a time when serving the Club's purposes—to acquire, hold, own and provide for the care, maintenance and control of property commonly used by members—remains paramount.

At this year's Annual Meeting, please support the proposed By-Law amendment and empower future Voting Boards to responsibly serve and preserve the best interests of our community.

THE PROPOSED BY-LAW

Here's the proposed By-Law (the underlined words are the modifications to the existing By-Law):

Purchase vacant land or improved properties lying within the boundaries of, contiguous to, or in relative proximity to the Highland Lakes community when, to do so, would better effect the fulfillment of one or more of the Club's purposes and objectives; provided, however, that such purchase be first approved by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds (2/3) of the entire Voting Board and provided further, however, that the total dollar amount of all of such purchases shall not exceed, in the aggregate, fifteen percent (15%) of the Club's reserve funds at the end of the preceding fiscal year per year. Reserve funds are defined as Operating Reserve, Capital Reserve, and the Long-Term fund.

In my next column I'll go into a detailed explanation of what these Reserve funds are, how they work within the greater scheme of our overarching annual budget, and will provide you with a few hypothetical examples that show the budgetary impact—year over year—of a real estate acquisition.



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Ecology Corner

We have been experiencing a weather pattern that has contributed to poor water quality in our lakes recently. Periods of extremely hot weather followed by heavy rain washes nutrients into the lake which encourage algae growth. Every homeowner here in Highland Lakes can help prevent storm water runoff containing nutrients and harmful chemicals from washing into our lakes.

Septic Systems:

We all have septic systems to treat waste. Caring for your septic system involves five key elements:

- Inspect and pump your tank regularly. Depending on household usage, every three to five years is recommended. Most pumpers will include a tank inspection.
- Use water efficiently. Every time you turn on a faucet, shower, wash clothes or dishes you are adding water to your septic which puts added stress on the system. Encourage your family to minimize water usage.
- Avoid using bleach and use septic safe detergents and soaps (avoid anti-bacterial soaps). Your tank needs some bacteria to function properly.
- Properly dispose of waste. Your toilets should be used for human waste and toilet paper only. Do not put food scraps, grease, or cooking oil down the sink drain. Do not install or use a garbage disposal unit in the kitchen sink.
- Maintain your drainage field. Determine where it is located by checking your survey. Do not plant anything but grass or plants that die down in winter (flowers, no trees or bushes) on it. Do not drive or park vehicles on it or plant trees near it. Have the field inspected when you have your system pumped. If there is an odor coming from it or it gets soggy it may indicate that the field needs replacement.

Driveways:

When living in a lake community, a major consideration for driveways and walkways is to make sure they are permeable to assist with proper drainage and water flow.

Ecologically, the best driveway materials are natural or crushed stone. They are inexpensive, easily replenished, readily available, allow for water permeation and, as a natural material, fit nicely with our lake community aesthetic. An attractive but more expensive alternative is permeable pavers. Concrete is ecologically better than

asphalt, but neither is permeable. If you already have an asphalt driveway and need to reseal it, your safest option is an asphalt-based sealer. Although they contain carcinogens, the amounts are viewed as negligible and considered environmentally safer than coal based sealers.

Never Use Coal Tar Based Sealers:

Coal tar is a known human carcinogen. Unfortunately, once these harmful toxins are used on your driveway, they do not stay put. When it rains or snows the contaminants from coal tar sealants leach into the drainage system, and the surrounding soil, streams and lakes where they are also toxic to wildlife.

Ecology Tips For Homeowners:

To gain a better understanding and appreciation of the ecology and management of our lakes and streams, the Ecology Committee invites members to join their discussions once a month at their meetings held on the third Thursday of the month at the Clubhouse. Check the Club calendar in the Newsette for details. We welcome your ideas and your help.

Members can now share their love for their animals with their fellow cooperative members by submitting either new or preexisting photos of their pets and/or farm animals keeping cool or beating the summer heat. This can include animals swimming, lounging by cooling equipment, at the beach, or in a variety of other scenarios. No animal should be put in danger for a photo and if we receive photos featuring animals in positions that are potentially dangerous or posed in unnaturally coerced ways, such as in a refrigerator, we will forward them to proper authorities.

By submitting photos, participating members agree to allow Sussex Rural Electric Cooperative to share their photo for voting purposes and grant permission for the Cooperative to use submitted photos in future "Summer Energy Savings" messaging campaigns with photo credit provided.

Entries are open as of Thursday, July 15 and will be accepted until Thursday, August 26. You must be a member of Sussex Rural Electric Cooperative to submit a photo in this contest. Finalists will be selected by SREC staff and during the week of August 30 the general public will have the opportunity to cast a vote online for their favorite photo. After voting is concluded, the member who submitted

the winning photo will be awarded a deluxe gift basket that includes prizes for the member as well as their pet. In addition, the winning member may choose from a list of local animal shelters or sanctuaries and Sussex Rural Electric Cooperative will make a \$250 donation in the winning member's name.
