From the President's Desk

As we collectively gear up for the holiday season, it's easy to overlook the seasonal changes going on around us. Only last week you could hang around outside without a jacket on, but when I walked the dog early this morning— November 23—coats and hats were no longer optional. The sun hangs low in the sky, birds have mostly disappeared except for a few noisy grackles, and ice has started to appear along the shoreline of our lakes. Winter may not have taken hold just yet, but it won't be long before we feel its tight grip. Like it or not, we have to accept it.

Historically speaking, winter is a slow time in our community, but these next few months will be actionpacked for the Voting Board. If you've been to any of the recent workshops and meetings since August, you're well aware of our focus on a number of related watershed management issues. With help from the Ecology Committee, we've begun to explore data and investigate potential solutions to issues such as hazardous algae blooms, sediment buildups, the accumulation of nutrients on our lake bottoms and road runoff, among many others.

It's clear to me, as well as the rest of the Voting Board, that we—as individual members and as a community must take greater responsibility for the things we can control when it comes to our lakes. We need to pull in the same direction and work harder to reverse negative trends so that the health and welfare of our community's greatest natural assets are better protected now and in the future.

While objective data isn't in yet, there are a number of interrelated problems colluding against us. To address them, there's no doubt in my mind that we need to pay closer attention to what the qualified professionals we hire advise us to do. We also need to build greater awareness in our community around the challenges facing us, and the solutions that can help us overcome them. This will ultimately mean we, as guardians of this special place, will need to change some of our own behaviors regardless of the mechanical solutions we install or treatments we embrace if we have any hope of solving these problems.

The Voting Board has identified a number of areas where much more research needs to occur before actions are taken. Three special committees of the Voting Board met over the past few months to conduct preliminary research in three areas—aeration, septic systems, and fertilizer/ pesticide applications. That research continues thanks to members of the Ecology Committee, who are working together in small, targeted groups to focus on narrower but no less important areas of interest, such as dredging, invasive species inundation, weed growth, fertilizer and pesticide use, among others.

The Club also invited two well known firms (Princeton Hydro, a longstanding water resource engineering firm that

already serves our community, and EverBlue, which installs specialized aeration systems) to present their observations and proposed solutions to the Voting Board which occurred on November 30 and December 2.

In coming months, the Ecology Committee will report back to the Voting Board to help us determine the best courses of action. Club members should expect to read and hear much more about our next steps. Some approaches such as performing a bathymetric study of all our lakes—are near certainties and won't be terribly costly, invasive or even very visible, but will be instrumental in informing what issues to tackle first. Other approaches, such as potentially increasing the number of aerators, or pursuing cumbersome lake bottom remediation, will take great effort, lots of time, may be disruptive at inopportune times and will likely be expensive.

The Voting Board will do everything it can to keep you up to speed on all of the key details as we learn more and start to come up with a comprehensive plan. There has never been a more important issue that any voting board in the history of our community has ever faced, and we appreciate your continued support to help us make the right decisions for the place we all love.

www.how2recycle.info/ The heading on the home page of this website reads: "A Cleaner World Starts with Us" and goes on to explain: "How2Recycle is a standardized labeling system that clearly communicates recycling instructions to the public. It involves a coalition of forward-thinking brands who want their packaging to be recycled and are empowering consumers through smart packaging labels." The site offers details on all kinds of labeling and provides local drop-off locations for plastic bags that must go through a different recycling process. I was surprised to find that there are many in our area.

Local waste companies will pick up your recycling for fee, but you can also cart your recyclables down to the recycling center for free. It is located across from the municipal building at 21 Church Street.


Family Holiday Craft Night

Guest Speaker Vinnie Corsello, Butterfly Man

The Senior Club members were treated to a wonderful presentation about butterflies by Vinnie Corsello at their Thanksgiving luncheon orchestrated by Joyce Healy. He explained what bushes and plants, like the milkweed, to raise in our yards to attract butterflies, especially the Monarch. This flyer is toxic to birds and is mimicked by the Viceroy which is slightly smaller. This adaptation keeps many a bird at bay. In spring Vinnie tags Monarchs helping study their migrations. If interested, one can collect eggs from the milkweed plant and follow the cycle from larvae to emerging butterfly. For more info contact Monarch Conservation and their webinars.
