### From the President's Desk

As noted in my last column, the concept and practice of short-term rentals (STRs) in our community continues to be a hot-button issue. I previously invited members who wanted their opinions heard to attend the Voting Board's February meeting. There was a strong turnout of members who shared their concern about how the Club regulates and enforces its rules regarding rentals and associate memberships, especially with the expansion of STRs, and how the interests of members on both sides of the issue need to be protected.

The Club is planning at least one weekend "STR discussion" at the Clubhouse to give members another public opportunity to share ideas and concerns with the Voting Board. We expect to schedule it on a weekend during March, and that date/time will be broadly communicated so that everyone who's interested is aware. A survey on STR perspectives will be distributed via hardcopy (available in the Clubhouse office) and online (via the Club's email blast) to more closely gauge what the membership thinks. Your opinions will help inform how the Voting Board moves forward with STRs, and I will continue to update you as this issue progresses.

Another hot button issue we're addressing has to do with Vernon Township, both in terms of how the town reimburses the Club (and other private lake communities



- PLCs - in Vernon) for snow removal, and how the town seems to turn a blind eye toward homes that violate Township ordinances.

Regarding snow reimbursement, Highland Lakes has been meeting for months with leaders of other PLCs in Vernon who are similarly frustrated by the Township's inconsistent approach as well as its inexplicable methodology. We have a planned meeting with Mayor Burrell and members of his administration to determine whether reimbursement as required under New Jersey law will be satisfactorily addressed once and for all. With regard to houses that violate Township ordinances, we believe Vernon must be much more aggressive in addressing these blights on our Highland Lakes neighborhoods and other neighborhoods throughout Vernon. Working with other PLCs, we will press our Mayor to aggressively enforce Township ordinances that protect our rights and property values as home owners and serve the greater good of the town.

The Club is also grappling with serious environmental issues in the form of an invasive beetle known as the emerald ash borer (EAB)—the EAB's only purpose in life is to eat under the bark of the ash tree, thereby killing nearly every ash tree the EAB finds. The EAB has already arrived in Vernon, which puts all of Highland Lakes' ash trees in jeopardy. The Club has engaged Bartlett Tree Experts to perform an inventory of ash trees along the Club's roadways and on Club properties, after which the Club will weigh the best approach for addressing the issue - either through preservation treatment or removal.

Left unaddressed, most ash trees in our community will die from EAB infestation, creating a dangerous and unsightly issue for both the Club and members who have ash trees on their property. The cost of treatment is high, as is the cost of removal, but the potential risk to members on Club property—as well as members' own properties—is no less significant. In other words, it's a complicated issue without any attractive options, but the Club is aggressively working through those options to arrive at the one that best serves the community.

That is, after all, what the Voting Board exists to do.

## 2020 Badges and Permits

### **Available for Pickup April 13**

Starting Monday, April 13, 2020, members who have paid their dues and assessments in full may pick up their 2030 membership badges and permits at the Club Office. Office hours are Monday through Friday, 9 am to 4 pm, and on Saturday, from 10 am to 1 pm.

# **Ecology Committee Report**

### February 20, 2020, Meeting

Chris Mikolajczyk, Certified Lake and Senior Project Manager with the Club's lake management consultant, Princeton Hydro, LLC, delivered its 2019 Annual Water Quality Report to the Ecology Committee on February 20. In addition to members of the Ecology Committee, members of the Fishing Committee and the Board of Trustees were also present along with Jack McLaughlin, General Manager.

Chris Mikolajczyk explained that overall the lakes are in good shape. Storm water sampling was recommended within the Lake 1 (Upper Highland Lake) watershed in order to identify areas of the watershed from which excess nutrients may be originating. Destratification (aeration) systems in the Main Lake (Highland Lake) will be checked to ensure that they are functional by late April. No changes are recommended for Indian Lake (East Highland Lake). Field personnel removed one invasive water chestnut and water lettuce from Lake Four (Upper East Highland Lake). Alum treatment is recommended as an experiment to control phosphorous in the lake. Club members are asked to photograph any possibly invasive weeds in any of our lakes and report to the Club. Lake Five (Upper West Highland Lake) might also benefit from storm water sampling.

Weather is the biggest factor in lake management. Heavy rainfall followed by a period of hot sunny weather will contribute to algae blooms. As per and Chris Mikolajczyk, together with General Manager Jack McLaughlin, published the following information in the July 2019 issue of the Newsette:

Algae occur naturally in all fresh and marine water environments. According to the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection's (NJDEP) HAB webpage: (//www.state.nj.us/dep/wms/HABS.html):

"A bloom is a rapid increase or accumulation in the population of algae and algae-like bacteria in a water body. These "blooms" often result in a thick coating or mat on the surface of the water, which can also result in lowering the dissolved oxygen in the water column. In turn, low dissolved oxygen can be detrimental to aquatic organisms, particularly fish. Certain environmental conditions, such as sunlight, high nutrient concentrations, warm temperatures and calm water can favor the development of a bloom.

A harmful algal bloom (HAB) is an algal bloom that can be dangerous to people, animals or the ecology. Some, but not all, HABs produce chemicals that can be toxic to humans and animals if ingested, inhaled, or if contacted by skin or mucous membranes. These toxins can also accumulate in fish and shellfish which can cause illness when either are consumed. Cyanobacteria, also known as blue-green

algae, are responsible for the majority of freshwater HAB occurrences. These are called CyanoHABs. Cyanobacteria are naturally present in lakes and streams and, can form both toxic (harmful) and non-toxic blooms. The toxic blooms can cause health effects when people and animals come in contact with them.

A member of the Fishing Committee asked if cyanobacteria can be toxic to fish. Chris responded that if toxic cyanobacteria are present in the lake it would be wise not to eat the fish.

However, not all algal blooms are harmful. Some are merely called "nuisance blooms" because they result in discolored water and/or offensive odors. While they are not dangerous, they can result in people choosing not to swim or recreate in water that is experiencing the bloom.

Data collected by Princeton Hydro are used to guide HLCC and Solitude Lake Management, Inc. (the contracted herbicide/algaecide treatment company) in the day-to-day management of the lakes. The objective of the monitoring programs to use the date in a pro-active manner to maximize the lakes' recreational usage, aesthetic attributes, and ecological services and functions. For this reason the monitoring program is focused on the collection of water quality data from May to September, commonly referred to as "the growing season".

The ability to effectively control most of the lakes' problems and minimize lake user impacts is the direct result of HLCC's pro-active management approach, which is guided by the lakes' water quality data and a strong line of communication between HLCC, Princeton Hydro, and Solitude.

This annual reporting and ensuing discussion is always informative, and I would strongly encourage all to attend these meetings in the future.

SAVE THE DATE: on April 25 Ecology Committee member Bob Taffer will run our annual Cleanup Day. Details will be posted in the April issue of the Newsette.

Clark Beebe's addition to last month's article on the red fox: Red foxes can be any color (silver and gray are common) and can have no red at all. The only coloration characteristic that absolutely defines the animal as a red fox is that the tip of the tail is white. Thank you Clark for this clarification.

NOTE: Please make sure to use environmentally friendly ice melt products. Keep storm drains in the vicinity of your property clear of debris, and PLEASE pick up and dispose of any trash that might have accumulated during the winter months. Pet waste should be disposed of properly in your trash, not left by the side of the road.





# Help Wanted Athletics Director

Recruitment is underway for the position of Athletics Director for the 2020 summer season. The ideal candidate will be an enthusiastic leader of the Club's athletics programs, and be highly organized in planning and conducting the summer athletics activities. The Director must have a generalized knowledge of competitive sports, rules and equipment requirements, and be able to solicit advice from various participants regarding rules, procedures and equipment needs. The ability to successfully interact with children and their parents, adult and youth volunteers, and Club officials and staff is essential.

Duties include but are not limited to the following:

- Plans and implements program and activity schedules.
- Develops and publishes program highlights, schedules, rules, rosters, etc. for the Highland Lakes Newsette on a weekly basis.
- Arranges for the inspection of Club athletic facilities during late April with the Maintenance Superintendent; issues work order requests to rectify any issues identified during the walk-through.
- Develops activity sign-up books for placement at the Activity Center; identifies volunteers from the sign-ups; communicates with parents and children as to scheduling.
- Ensures that all participants are members in good standing of Highland Lakes by working with the Club Office, and that all participants have submitted satisfactorily-completed Parent Permission Forms prior to participation.
- Conducts, where appropriate, drafts of players to ensure the proportionate assignment of skilled players to various teams; prevents the manipulation of rosters for competitive advantage.
- Conducts inventory of uniforms and equipment in late April; prepares order for approval by the General Manager; continually reviews uniform and equipment needs based on sign-ups and enrollments; ensures sufficient stock for late enrollments.
- Maintains the Athletics Hotline, leaving up-to-date messages on scheduling, schedule changes, and rainouts.
- Ensures appropriate team discipline; instructs coaches and volunteers on procedures to clear litter from areas at the conclusion of activities.

# Plant a Tradition: Create a Living Legacy

Check if you are near a septic line. Tree roots can destroy septic lines.

Allow the tree sufficient room. Remember that the small root ball you plant will grow to have a canopy 30 feet or more. You don't want branches damaging your house. Take the projected final height, crown diameter, rate of growth and life expectancy into consideration. Some species like birch or aspen start to die after 50 to 60 years. You will want your legacy tree(s); your new family tradition to stand a greater test of time than that. So, do your homework and go plant a family tradition. Open a young mind. Create that special intergenerational go-to spot in nature.

Now, to all of HLCC, I have a request. I will try to publish this article in a magazine for outreach beyond this Newsette. What I ask is if you have a photo of a smiling child hugging a tree, planting a tree, standing beside a tree--preferably with you smiling alongside, please send those photos to me. I will need to add a few photos for any magazine article. (If your photo is selected, you will be contacted for a release.)


As we age, we think of our children, our grandchildren, our legacy. And most of us want to create family traditions and intergenerational bonds that will continue long after we are gone.


I was at the NJ State Fair staffing The American Chestnut Foundation booth when a five year old boy came up to talk about trees. But he had no interest in hearing about chestnut trees. He wanted to tell me about his tree; the one he had personally planted. His excitement and pride of ownership were palpable, contagious, inspiring. As I listened he provided details on the species, its growth rate, and its eventual full size. I suggested that his parents start a tradition. I proposed they take a photo of the boy and his tree every year and then make an album to record their mutual growth.

I now encourage each of you to do the same, start a tradition, plant a tree with each child or grandchild when they hit the age of five or six. (Maybe, just to be safe, plant two or three because not all trees survive and thrive.) If you have room, let them become a grove as more children plant more trees. Make it a family gathering site; even when someone who planted one of the trees is no longer around. Make it an outdoor refuge of peace to grieve, to mourn; and eventually to fondly remember, to celebrate. Get the child involved! Let him/her help pick the species and the site. Discuss the pros and cons of different species such as the seeds creating a mess on the lawn beneath. Make sure they get their hands in the dirt during the planting. Let them take ownership. Teach them about such trees. Peak their interest in nature, create a bond with Mother Earth.

Do your homework. Don't plant a tree that does not thrive or even dies. Check with a forester about what native species will do well on the site. I stress native because you do not want to plant an exotic that could be invasive. (Believe it or not, many such species are sold by landscape suppliers all the time). Decide what type of seeds or fruit the tree will produce. Do you want to attract particular animal species? Will the tree's pollen be an issue?

There are other aspects you should check to ensure a successful planting. Is the soil right? Is it clay or sand? Some trees need an acidic soil; some won't tolerate acidic conditions. (Once established, some trees will create an acidic soil. Will your lawn or garden tolerate that?) Will it get enough or too much sun? Some trees can't tolerate direct sun; others require it. Is the soil hydrology appropriate? Some trees require dampness; others want their feet dry.


