Governance in Highland Lakes

From its inception, Highland Lakes has been structured to encourage active participation from all of its members, but it is the Voting Board that ultimately decides the direction our community takes at any given time.

Information about how Highland Lakes operates, how members can best voice their ideas and concerns, and how they can share their talents to keep our Club thriving is likely old news for many members who are already actively involved. This article seeks to explain how things work for the new members of the community and those who need a refresher. Once you fully understand the governance structure, you are bound to appreciate why you want to know who your elected officials are and what is being decided at Voting Board meetings.

Highland Lakes is made up of twelve geographic sections. Your membership card has your section printed on it. (To get a full view of our lakes, freeways, and sections, take a look at this map https://hlcc.org/ memberresources/#documents that the Communications Committee created in 2019.) Each section elects a member (living in that section) to serve as their trustee. At the Annual Meeting on August 20, elections will be held for sections 1, 3, 4, 5, and 11. Once elected, the trustee is expected to attend monthly Board workshops which are typically held on the second Wednesday of each month, and Voting Board meetings which generally occur on the third Friday of the month. Club members are encouraged to attend these meetings to gain first-hand knowledge of the Club's current business, hear committee reports, and learn about the issues under discussion.

Your trustee is your "government representative." You are encouraged to speak with your trustee if you want to express an opinion about something that is occurring in your section, or the community. It is the responsibility of your trustee to bring this issue up at the next meeting.

Alternatively, all Club members in good standing are invited to attend Friday Board meetings to voice their opinions and share their ideas directly with the full Board. Board workshops and meetings follow a standard format. At the Wednesday night workshops, the Board fully discusses the issues that each officer and trustee will be expected to vote on the following week. At the workshops, only the Board officers, trustees, and Club manager are permitted to join in the discussion. At the Friday night Voting Board meetings, Club members in good standing are permitted to speak on the topics under discussion before officers and trustees cast their votes. An additional open forum, where any matter pertaining to Highland Lakes can be voiced, is offered to members at the end of every Friday meeting. While members are encouraged to attend Board meetings to express their opinions and share their visions, they should do so with the clear understanding that it is the Board that bears the responsibility of deciding what

action to take.

Elections for one-third of the trustees (4), together with elections for any open seats due to resignation, etc., are held at each annual meeting. Every three years the five officers on the Voting Board are also elected. Once elected, each position is held for three years. No position may be held by the same Club member for longer than six consecutive years.

The Club's manager is at every Board workshop and meeting. In addition to managing the day-to-day operations of the Club, and all of the part-time and full-time staff, the manager is responsible for implementing all of the initiatives and special projects that are authorized by the Board.

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Beach Water Testing Results

Below are the results of the most recent E. coli testing at the Club's beaches and swim lanes performed by Garden State Laboratories, Inc. Weekly tests are required by the State of New Jersey, and results must not exceed 320 organisms per 100 milliliters. All samples conformed to NJ State recreational bathing standards. Testing results are also reported by the lab to the Sussex County Department of Health.




Pickleball Scoops

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
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This Week in Sports


All events are susceptible to weather and schedules/ events are subject to change. There is no rain date scheduled at this time.











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Ecology Corner

FIREFLY POPULATION DECLINE IN NJ - taken from an article in the July 16 issue of the Star Ledger by Steve Rodas, NJ Advance Media

"I have qualitatively noticed fewer fireflies in New Jersey" said Matthew Aardema, an entomologist and assistant professor of biology at Montclair State University. Aardema is not alone and there may be a reason for this observation.

Artificial lights can lessen fireflies' ability to see their blinking lights, which can be mating signals. That can then negatively impact reproduction and mean fewer insects. Although most fireflies are predatory, the animals they feed on will do better on diverse plant communities relative to homogeneous grass lawns.

A dip in the number of fireflies could likely translate into a decline in bird and bat populations as well, which can be problematic for the health of other animals and habitats, experts shared. Until we have a better understanding of their population here and can make use of that data, there's plenty that people can do now to help fireflies flourish in New Jersey.

Experts said residents and businesses can:

- Get rid of purely aesthetic and superfluous outdoor lighting (use shielding, timers, stop using or minimize the use of pesticides in backyards, parks and other green spaces;
 - Advocate for local governments to create policy



that reduces light pollution motion detectors, and - where needed - dim bulbs instead;

- Install diverse native plants where appropriate to help fireflies, firefly prey species and pollinators in yards, parks and other outdoor spaces;
- Encourage state agencies to study and conserve fireflies and other at-risk invertebrates;
- Work with tourism groups to establish guidelines to protect fireflies;
- Protect and restore coastal salt marshes and cypress swamps which support threatened species;

Taking such steps is more than worth it experts say. "The decline in firefly and other insect populations is a major concern because it will have negative impacts on nearly every other area of the natural world," Aardema said.





Undertaking A Home Improvement Project Hiring Contractors (part 3 of 6)

Some contractors may prefer charging time and materials (T&M) for a project, others may offer a fixed price. A T&M approach may make it easier to modify the scope and facilitate the contractor's ability to respond to the unexpected. On the other hand, you may feel that the work is progressing too slowly, as there seems to be no incentive for the contractor to finish. A firm contract price successfully locks in a price, but you may feel that the contractor is rushing and cutting corners to make a greater profit.

Either approach may be suitable for your project. Whatever course you take, allow a fair profit for the contractor. If the contractor starts the project, but can't afford to finish, what is the value of a great price if the work is never completed?

If you are bidding the work, request pricing in a comparable format. Ask for a total price as well as the cost for discrete elements. These prices can help you compare pricing and understand progress. Ask for a payment schedule. Don't agree to make too large an initial payment; frequent smaller payments are better than fewer large payments. Whatever you agree, pay promptly. Check references for the contractor(s)!



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

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


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Annual Meeting Minutes August 21, 2022

Art Dawson, Elections Chairman, asked for members to hold up their membership cards to be counted toward a quorum.

President Michael Gelfand called the meeting to order at 2:06 pm and led the members in the Pledge of Allegiance. He reviewed the Order of Business as determined by the By-Laws: 1. Approval of the Minutes of the 2021 Annual Meeting as previously published in the Newsette; 2. Reports of Officers and Trustees; 3. Privilege of the Floor to Membership; 5. Election of Officers and Trustees.

President Michael Gelfand thanked all members present and introduced the members of the Voting Board in attendance: Section 2, Lyle Timpson; Section 3, Patricia Thompson; Section 4, Janice Fajardo, Section 5, Julia Campbell; Section 6, Melissa Hardin; Section 8, Dominick Beninati; Section 9, Thomas Castiglione; Section 10, Madeline Hollingsworth; Section 11, Suzanne Maher; Section 12, Len Bogdon; Secretary, Climeen Wikoff; Treasurer, Mike Gillooley; Second Vice President, Ray Zimmerman; First Vice President, Judy Norton. He also introduced General Manager Dave Martin and General Counsel Eileen McCarthy Born, and acknowledged the past Club Presidents in attendance: Adelle Huttner, Rich Spoerl, and Sue Ross. President Michael Gelfand presented recognition plaques to Len Bogden, Mike Gillooley, and Judy Norton and Judy Norton presented a recognition plaque to Michael Gelfand.

President Michael Gelfand asked for a motion to approve last year's minutes. Chris Mann, Section 1, made a motion, seconded by Bill Miklovic, Section 12, to approve the Minutes of the 2021 Annual Meeting. The motion carried unanimously.

President Michael Gelfand reviewed projects and initiatives from the past year that included awarding a contract to install a generator capable of providing emergency power to the Club, revising the short-term rental policy, renewing commitments to new member events, and hosting a Board Member and Committee Chair meeting to further the relationship between the two groups. He stated the Club acquired an empty lot to protect Club boundaries, implemented a number of road drainage projects, authorized the licensing and installation of a new community management software platform for the Club office that includes an Owners Portal, and authorized the hiring of a new Communications Manager.

President Michael Gelfand stated the Board approved the new Consolidated Rules and Regulations document which provides clarity around existing rules by categorizing them into tiers with applicable fines, and adopted a Code of Ethics for the Voting Board. He also noted that the infected ash trees removal project on Club property continues.

President Michael Gelfand reviewed the contracts awarded to vendors for studies that will provide the data needed to create a watershed management plan. He stated the studies included a bathymetric study, hydrology modeling, a nutrient load study, as well as stormwater inventory, mapping, and assessment. He stated in addition to the above studies, the Board contracted an independent limnologist, repaired and expanded our existing aeration

systems, authorized the use of new chemical lake treatments, is working with the township to address known drainage issues on town-owned roads, hired a vendor to address our lakes' carp population, and will request a revision to our water monitoring contracts that will allow the vendors to increase the frequency of visits and provide more urgent on-premises care as needed. President Michael Gelfand noted the ways to pay for remediation are to work with the township, pay out of pocket, and/or apply for grants.

Mike Gillooley, Treasurer, stated that inflation in the economy may cause a challenging time economically and the Club will factor that into the budgeting process. He stated that part of the Club's ability to sustain itself so well is due to the Club setting aside funds to use for emergencies. He reported that the Club is close to what was budgeted for from a revenue standpoint for this time of year, but as inflation occurs in the economy, costs rise for the Club as well. Mike Gillooley anticipates a rise in Club dues for the year due to this.

General Manager David Martin provided the members with a brief update on TOPS One, the Club's new accounting and community management application, the Consolidated Rules Document and Compliance process, the Emerald Ash Borer project, the 2022 Road Paving project, and Lake ecology challenges and opportunities.

General Counsel Eileen McCarthy Born addressed the members regarding legal matters handled by her firm in the past year. Eileen Born reviewed the litigation against Vernon for the Municipal Services Act and how it affects the Club's reimbursements for the snowplow services, noting that the Club had joined with other lake communities in the town in order to do this. She also briefly reviewed the 2006 case that went to the New Jersey Supreme Court that allows HLCC to collect owed dues even in the event of a foreclosure and how a recent case may affect that judgment in the future. Eileen Born stated she is hopeful the new Club Rules and Regulations with the tiered fines will cut back on the time and expense of Rule 22 case hearings. Eileen Born provided an update on the renewed/ revised easement granted to Veolia Water Technologies & Solutions (formerly SUEZ Water Technologies & Solutions). She reviewed the purchase of a lot made by the Club in order to protect Club boundaries. Eileen Born provided an update on 6 Mondamin Road. She also stated the Club re-recorded the 1983 judgments regarding HLCC being a mandatory dues-paying community. Eileen Born reviewed forming a foundation to apply for grant monies for watershed management. She stated future by-law change recommendations will need to be made to stay compliant with Planned Real Estate Development Law.

Privilege of the Floor to Membership:

Al Coldon, Section 2, stated that the people need to be more respectful of Badge Checkers and reminded members to wear their badges at all times and to honor the community's rules.

Brian Morton, Section 12, asked for clarification on the line item in the Treasurer's report labeled as "Architectural Plans for Changes to the Clubhouse." President Gelfand



responded that the budgeted line item was to gain confirmation from licensed architects about what could and could not be done should the Board decide to expand the Club's facilities.

Glenn Kamp, Section 7, expressed appreciation for the current Board and their efforts toward the lake's health.

Bob Taffer, Section 11, requested that the annual minutes be published sooner, rather than waiting for the next annual meeting. President Gelfand responded that the minutes are published closer to the annual meeting because they need to be approved by the members soon after they are published and suggested that a member could report on the annual meeting.

Bob Ulmer, Section 7, asked if the contract for the remediation of the Emerald Ash Tree was exposed to requests for competitive bidding and if it was advertised. President Gelfand responded that requests for competitive bidding were solicited, and the Club will follow up with further details. Bob Almer also asked why the report from Princeton Hydro has not been released to the general membership. President Gelfand responded that the report

was not released because the Board had not yet had the opportunity to review the report with the vendor in preparation to field questions from the membership. He added the report will be uploaded into the TOPS Owners Portal

Doreen Edwards, Section 2, asked if the Club could consider meeting with Planet Networks which is a company that could offer better cable and internet connection.

Sue Ross, Section 7, expressed appreciation for the current Board and the officers for their efforts over the past 3 years. She also expressed concern about lake health and asked if the Club has the authority to require septic testing of anyone who purchases a home here. President Gelfand responded that has been a topic of discussion and will continue to be until a decision can be made. Sue Ross also asked the Club to explore leaf pick-up services.

Rafael Davis, Section 7, expressed appreciation for the current Board for their efforts over the past 3 years. He stated while lake quality is the number one concern, there are other maintenance items that need to be addressed, specifically mentioning the tennis courts and requesting that the Club perform the appropriate repairs.

Joe DeLorenzo, Section 2, expressed appreciation to the current Board for their efforts around lake quality and stated that the discussions around lake quality continue to take priority over the next couple of years.

Knox Strube, Section 10, requested that the gates at parking lot beach 1 remain open due to safety concerns.

Lisa Hunt, Section 7, asked about the criteria the Club uses to decide which ash trees to remove. President Gelfand responded that it depends on whether or not the tree is on

Club property. General Manager, David Martin, added that each tree on Club property is inspected on a case-by-case basis.

Al Coldon, Section 2, shared a story of being thanked for being a badge checked after expressing gratitude towards members following the rules and showing their badges.

Nicole Kruck, Section 1, noted that not all members place their membership stickers on their vehicles and asked members to remember to do so.

Lynn Kaplan, Section 7, stated that Canistear Road is a township road so Vernon Township should address dead the ash trees on Canistear Road, expressed gratitude for the Board reinstating the New Member Party, and requested that the Club mail printed material for important announcements. She also stated she feels requiring members to show proof of septic pumping would be a good idea.

Owen Hyland, Section 4, shared a positive story about a member returning his wallet, commended the Board on handling the short-term rental issues, and expressed faith in the Board's ability to address the lake quality issues.

Doreen Edwards, Section 2, requested the Board show discretion on spending to minimize increasing membership dues and expressed appreciation for the Board.

Carol Fortenbach, Section 7, shared a memory of the lake dues being \$12 before the roads were built.

Michael Gelfand closed the floor to members and the meeting proceeded to the election of Officers and Trustees.

Ecology in the Home

GLENN KAMP, ECOLOGY COMMITTEE MEMBER

There are many things that residents can do to help the ecology of our lakes and community, and at the same time help manage their septic systems and conserve their well water. Obviously, any liquid that goes down the sinks, the toilets, the shower, or the washing machine ends up eventually in your septic field, and then at some point into the water table. The EPA has a Septic Smart campaign that we highlighted at Lake Appreciation Day and is outlined below.

Think at the Sink. Avoid using harsh chemicals and use cleaners and detergents in moderation, always checking for the label that says no phosphates. Don't pour cooking oil or grease down the drain and dispose of your food waste properly, not down your sink. Make sure your sink drain has a small mesh strainer to catch food scraps because the only thing that should go into your septic system from your kitchen sink is water.

Don't Strain the Drain. Use your water efficiently and stagger use of water-based activities, such as running washing machines and dishwashers, bathing, etc. Fix plumbing leaks quickly and install low flow showerheads in your bathrooms. Showers use much less water than baths and dishwashers use less water than washing by hand. Encourage your family to turn

off the faucet when they are brushing their teeth. Making these changes can save up to 1000 gallons of water a year. Don't use pods in your dishwasher or your laundry as part of them can remain and can clog your system. Sharing first-hand experience, when my dishwasher was not draining, I found a piece of a pod in there.

Don't Overload the Commode. Don't flush anything but toilet paper and bathroom waste. Despite claims that wipes and other products are safe for septic systems, they are not. When you replace toilets, purchase a brand that offers two different levels of flushing, for number one and number two. It will save a tremendous amount of water.

Pump your Tank. Be sure you pump your septic system every three years and if you take advantage of discount coupons and a credit to your dues offered by the Club you can reduce that cost to approximately \$250 every three years. Pumping regularly protects your septic field, which is a most critical part of your septic system.

There are many other ways in the home to conserve water and help the ecology of our lake. If we all do our part, we can definitely make a difference.

After the conclusion of the ceremony, the swimming events kicked off, and Highland Lakes raced out to an early lead via the breaststroke events. Highland Lakes breaststrokers were victorious in 8 of the first 10 contests - an outstanding team performance! The 8/u Boys team of Laudenberger, N. Fahmy, and Berg swept their event to open proceedings, while the 8/u Girls team of Olsen. Schwarz, and Brennan quickly followed up with a 1-2-4 performance of their own. 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A Fabulous Day to "B" a Highland Lakes Swimmer

On Saturday, July 29, the Highland Lakes Swim Team hosted another installment of its annual "B" Invitational swim meet. Much like the rest of our summer, thunderstorms were threatening, but could not dampen the spirit of our swimmers, families, and volunteers. Prior to the arrival of the over 240 swimmers from 8 different teams, and during the entire 5-hour meet, it took nothing short of a herculean effort from a formidable army of volunteers to make the event a success. The remarkable people that make Highland Lakes so special and the spirit of volunteerism were on full display as everyone dove in headfirst to help.

Planning and prepping for the "B" happens several weeks in advance. The concessions team (Louise Staley, Lisa Entwistle, Christine Fleming, Bryan Fleming, Cathy Cefaloni) plans out what food will be served, orders, and arranges the delivery and receipt of all food and beverages. The "B" Program team (Caitlyn Kutzman and Jade Beebe) starts soliciting advertisements and arranges for the creation, printing, and putting together of the Program. The entries coordinator, Barry Brantner, aggregates all the teams' entries and finalizes the meet program. The meet Referee and Chair of Officials, Jeanette Emmerich, assembles a team of trained officials (Maureen Cherichella, Eileen Brantner, Heidi Howes, Christine Fleming, Don Taylor, John Laudenberger, Caitlyn Kutzman) who will enforce all USA Swimming rules and regulations. The Chair of Timers, Lucelia Zamborlini, recruits a team of 36 timers to ensure fair and consistent reporting of results for every event. The officials' luncheon, an event that is highly touted in the Lakeland Swim Conference as setting the standard for swim meet luncheons, is organized by Nicole Puccio who has contributions and donations made by many HL families. The delicious dishes are enjoyed by over 50 of the meet's officials and coaches.

Then in the days leading up to the meet, the rubber really hits the road. Our Chair of Facilities, Dennis Dalelio, organizes a facilities team (Tom Howes, Brian Fleming, Dominick Beninati, Don Taylor, Chris Burns, Jonathan Laszloczky, Bret Reiser) to raise the marshalling tent, set-up the concessions tent, grill, tables, and other critical meet-related equipment. The concessions team (Christine Fleming, Bryan Fleming, Cathy Cefaloni, Cheryl Hastie) gets back at it in the kitchen prepping trays of pasta, meatballs, and breakfast items. Many such activities happen late on Friday evening and as early as 6 am on Saturday morning.

Once Saturday morning arrives, it's all hands on-deck! The parking team (Rob Wisniewski, Craig Bernier, Steve Randazzo, Nick Salomonsson, Randy Staley, and Ray Mann) maneuvers hundreds of cars into the Clubhouse parking lot, which would draw the envy of a world Tetris champion. The facilities team prepares the starting and timing systems while the kitchen and grill teams get the coffee percolating and breakfast sandwiches hot and ready to serve. By 7:30 am, our admissions team (Lorayne Castiglione, Jessica Castiglione, MJ Kresic, Chris Annunziata, and Lisa Wisniewski) are monitoring the gates. Coaches report to the Lake Room at 7:30 am to check in and final scratches and



deck entries are handled by the entries coordinator.

Visiting families roll in and set up their tents and chairs quickly as swimmer warm-ups start promptly at 8 am. Teams attending this year's Invitational were Erskine Lake, Fayson Lakes, Lake Mohawk, Packanack Lake, Pequannock, Wayne Township, and Sussex County YMCA.

Final heat sheets are printed and sent to the marshalling team (Lynette Prince-Bernier, Ann Studer, Kerri Bednarick, Sophia Contreni, and Jessica Castiglione with the help of junior marshallers Megan Emmerich and Isabella Cherichella) who spend their entire morning tirelessly organizing herds of swimmers into their correct events/ heats/lanes. After an officials' meeting at 8 am, and a timer's meeting at 8:30 am, all take their spots as the Invitational is opened by the beautiful voice of Jenna Brennan singing the national anthem. Our announcer, Sara Werner, then announces the first event on the starting blocks and we're off!

The pressure is then on the scoring table (Shane Schwarz, Barry Brantner, Heidi Howes, and Mike Cordes) who ingest the meets results with speed, precision and accuracy to appropriately calculate scores for each event. Those results are then sent up to the awards team (Amy Buchney and Justine Duffin with Junior Volunteers and Runners Landon Howes, Cody Kutzman, Owen Buchney, Ben Fahmy, and Nate Fahmy) who attach the results to all the teams' ribbons, medals, and trophies.

Meanwhile, the grill team (Kelly Uschnig, Mike Annunziata, William Dignan) get going on cooking all lunch items for the concessions sales team (Louise Staley, Veronica Corbutt, Jana Randazzo) to plate up for the hungry swimmers and families.

As the volunteers continue to run the meet, the coaches get the swimmers focused on their races. Michael Buchney coaches the Highland Lakes team again this year with Catie Lovett and Sofia Staley returning as assistant coaches.

For those swimmers who have already qualified for the "A" championship meet in a particular stroke, they swim in the open events. One of the great things about the "B" is that it lets other swimmers, who have not yet achieved an "A" time, shine in the official events. The Invitational is concluded with a fun, non-scored step-up relay where swimmers, coaches, lifeguards, and families can compete against each other for bragging rights. The event was so
