Highland Lakes is a Winter Wonderland

As much as we love the recreation offered by our lakes in the summer, there's a lot to be said for winter recreation as well. Skating, ice fishing, and ice boating are frequent sights as we look over the frozen lake during the winter months. This year, without a Winter Olympics, many of us are watching closely for the figure skaters, hockey players, and fun seekers to skate or slide past our house.

Some of us wait all year for the ice to be thick enough to hold up. Growing up, our house rule for when the ice was ready was always "Whenever Uncle Don says it's ready." Experts are a bit more specific however, and recommend anywhere from 3 - 7 inches of thickness before venturing out onto the ice safely.

Before going out it is suggested that you use an ice pick, spud bar or cordless drill to make a few holes that will enable you to measure the actual thickness.

Even after you've measured (or gotten the "OK" from your beloved uncle), it is important to remember that ice does not freeze uniformly. Recreational ice-goers should keep a few things in mind:

- Clear, black ice is stronger than white or bubble-filled ice.
- Sub-surface currents and fresh-water springs can make ice thickness variable.
- Once on the ice, you are safer if you don't stand in large groups.
- It's not a good idea to drink alcohol while outside on a cold



day. It increases your chances for hypothermia and affects your ability to react to dangerous conditions.

Take some easy precautions once you've determined the ice to be safe:

- Bring a buddy but put some distance between you. If either of you were to

fall in, the other may be able to help.

- Dress for cold weather. Wear your hat and gloves. Layer up and wear an outer layer that is both wind- and waterproof.
- A pair of ice picks or screw drivers with a sturdy length of rope between them is easy enough to carry along and could be used to pull yourself out of open water if the ice were to break.
- Bring your cell phone wrapped in a watertight bag so that you could call for help if needed.

As hard as it is for some of us to imagine, winter is one of the prized times of year for fishing enthusiasts. It only takes a quick glance at our frozen lakes to see the number of people who venture out into the cold for the exhilaration of a good catch in the dark days of February. Each year, the Fishing Committee

sponsors an Ice Fishing Contest for interested HLCC members. This year it will coincide with the Winter Carnival on February 7 (assuming the lake is still frozen!). The lake was thoroughly stocked in the fall with both gamefish and baitfish, so anyone looking for a nibble in either the winter or summer will have a good shot at success. If you're more of a warm weather person, the Fishing Committee has plans for you as well, with a Kids' Fishing Derby and a Catfish Derby coming up this summer. Keep watching the Newsette for dates.

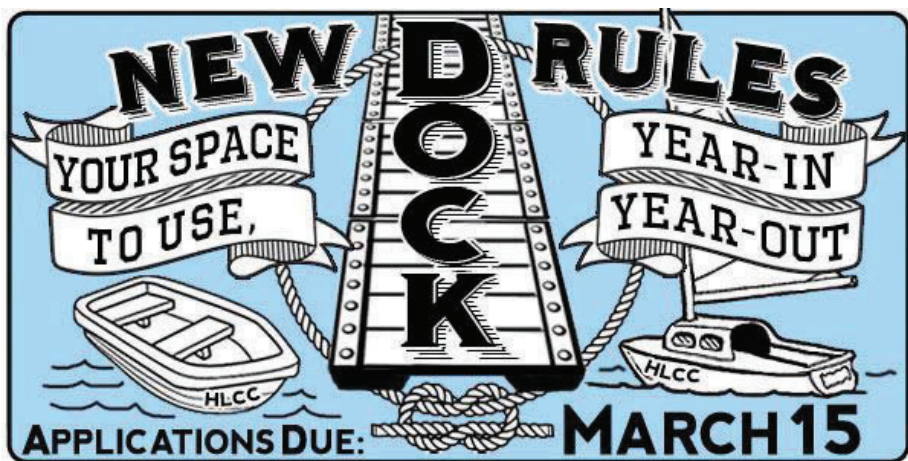
Over the years, more and more ice boats have shown up on the lakes. On a windy day, the boats zip past the shore line and give both riders and watchers a thrill. Both skippers and skaters should stay aware of their surroundings to prevent unwanted collisions.

Have fun this winter on the ice,

and think about trying something new. Drill a hole and drop a fishing line if you haven't done it before. Incorporate some new tricks into your skating routine – can you skate backwards or spin? When a neighbor invites you for a speedy trip in the ice boat, accept with enthusiasm. As long as you've taken the proper precautions for the ice and the cold, there's a world of fun in Highland Lakes in all seasons.

Boat Dock Lottery News

The Highland Lakes Voting Board has voted to revamp the boat dock lottery process as demand for docking space has changed. The Club will no longer conduct an annual boat dock lottery and will instead hold a one-time lottery in the spring of this year to assign docking space to members on a permanent basis.

The change was motivated in an effort to streamline the process as a more efficient use of staff and volunteer resources and to limit the uncertainty for members who use the dock space each year. In addition, it has been noted that there are currently more dock spaces available than are being used, limiting the need for a lottery process.

At its January 17 meeting, the Voting Board voted to permanently assign spaces at the following docks via a one-time lottery:

- Club Park (North of the Clubhouse)
- Comet Row (South of Beach 2 at the Clubhouse)
- Beach 3 (at Lookover Lane)
- Beach 4 (Lakeside Drive East near Island Drive)

Note: Junior sailors and members with special needs will have priority at the Eckhart Sailing Center dock.

To be eligible for a dock space at the locations above, members must complete the application that will be sent in the annual dues invoice mailing. The application is also available on the website (<http://hlcc.org/oldsite/wp-content/uploads/2015/01/Boat-Dock-Lottery-Application-2015.pdf>) and at the Club Office. Applications must be received no later than March 15, 2015 at the Club Office.

Only members in good standing will be eligible to be assigned boat dock space in the lottery. Members who have a balance for calendar year 2015 will be advised of the results of their lottery application, but not authorized to place their boat in the assigned space until their dues and assessments for calendar year 2015 are paid in full. If the member is not in good standing by June 1st, the application and boat dock assignment will be withdrawn.

Once a member is assigned a boat dock space, that member will not need to re-apply for the space again at any time, so long as he/she remains a member in good standing and the space is being used. It is your space to use, year in/year out. If applications exceed the number of available spaces at a particular location, the member will be given a choice to temporarily choose a different location and/or be placed on a waiting list for space at their preferred location.

For any members who would like to reserve boat dock space after this spring's one-time lottery takes place, there will be a process to apply on a first come-first served basis to reserve a boat dock space if available or otherwise be placed on the waiting list. A small number of spaces are grandfathered to members whose spaces predate the original docks purchased by the Club in 1989. Those spaces will remain grandfathered.

Hargrove, Groove Collective), includes trombonist-violinist Lewis Kahn (Tito Puente, Eddie Palmieri), vibraphonist Bill Ware (Steely Dan, Jazz Passengers), pianist Pablo Vergara (Gato Barbieri, Paquito D'Rivera), singer Jorge Maldonado (Sonora Matancera), timbalist Jimmy Delgado (Ray Barretto, Willie Colón), conga player George Delgado (Celia Cruz, Santiago Ceron), and bassist Ray Martinez (Hector Lavoe). Tickets to Azucar will go on sale exclusively to members-in-good-standing on February 14.

Avalon prides itself as musical archaeologists. Anyone who attended Avalon's first show at the Club back in September of last year fell under Eva-Marie's spell, and her magic remained just as powerful when the Newsette recently sat down with her to find out what makes the band tick. "In France, a lot of bands that play jazz mostly play an American repertoire, but the French repertoire is beautiful and interesting, and we wanted to bring it to the U.S. much like the U.S. version was imported in France," she says. "We look at what we do as a cultural exchange. There's such an important history between our countries when it comes to jazz, I think we need to honor this link and keep it alive... pop culture is taking a step back in time, and people are getting interested in this type of music again."

Eva-Marie, who has been a performing musician since the age of 8, takes her inspiration very seriously. "I'm always researching songs, it's my passion to uncover hidden gems to give them a second life. We're archaeologists for songs that time has forgotten, she says, and the band's 400-song repertoire, which spans the 1920s to the 1960s, is proof. "We go through phases where we play some songs more than others, but I never call for the same songs," she says. "One moment it's Django Reinhardt and the Hot Club of France, or Jean Sablon, Juliette Gréco, or someone from the newer generation, like Nellie McKay. You never know, because every concert we do is improvised. That's what adds to that atmosphere. It's not like pop music, where everything is written in stone," she explains. "What we do is more casual and more intimate."

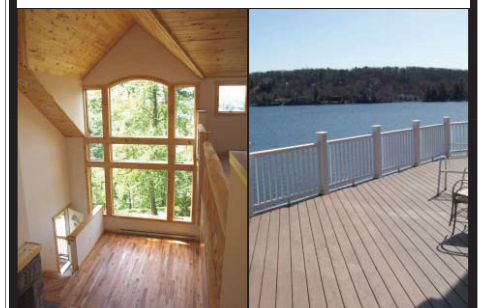

An Important Notice to Our Members

Vehicles will be towed during Snow and Ice Operations!

As a result of some difficulties in past winters, the Voting Board adopted a revision to its rules governing parking on the private roads of Highland Lakes Country Club and Community Association during snow and ice operations. All members are urged to become familiar with the Rule below. It will be strictly enforced.

Rule No. 16 of the Club's Rules and Regulations, adopted April 22, 1994:

Whenever snow has fallen or roads become covered with ice and the accumulation is such that it covers the roadway, an emergency shall exist and no vehicle shall be parked on any roadway or portion thereof. This parking prohibition shall remain in effect after the precipitation has ceased until the roads have been plowed and/or sanded sufficiently and to the extent that parking will not interfere with the normal flow of traffic.

Any unattended vehicle in violation of this Rule will be deemed to be parked without the consent of the Club and may be summonsed and towed in accordance with N.J.S.A. 39:4-56.6.
