The Afro-Cuban Sounds of Azucar Come to Seckler Stage on Sat., April 4

On April 4, eight of New York City's finest jazz musicians will perform together on Seckler Stage under the name Azucar. With numerous international awards and significant critical acclaim under their belts, each of the band's players is renowned for his musicianship, but what makes their collective appearance anywhere—let alone in Highland Lakes—so special is not only their shared reverence for an old genre from a bygone era, but the rarity of such an event in today's pop-centric universe.

"The idea for this band is something I grew up with, and something that doesn't really happen anymore," explains saxophonist/flautist and bandleader Jay Rodriguez. "This type of band—what people commonly call 'Latin Jazz'—has its roots in Cuban and Puerto Rican rhythms that migrated to New York City and melded with jazz," he says. "It's a

before life became chaotic. Our retirees have social clubs, exercise groups and special events. We offer dances, music, community breakfasts and other events for everyone in between. movement that started with legends like Dizzy Gillespie and Art Blakey, and it influenced other great jazz legends, like Ray Barreto, Celia Cruz, and Hector Lavoe, who carried the Afro-Cuban torch farther and influenced younger musicians who created a sound that became specific to New York, specifically Spanish Harlem and the Bronx, just like the blues of Chicago or Texas are specific to those regions.”

“This music has a romantic, jazz-oriented sound, with beautiful chords and rhythms, and it’s influenced so much of what we continue to hear in soul, disco, and even rock,” says Rodriguez. “This idiom isn’t about giant trumpets. It takes elements of jazz, soul, be-bop, blues, and R&B, and even some doo-wop, and it’s melded together these different sounds happening in New York City from a Cuban perspective. Latin music became a very indigenous sound in New York City that kept drawing on itself, eventually causing a cultural revolution for whites, blacks and Latinos alike.” (A Yankees Stadium concert back in 1971 called “Our Latin Thing” [www.pbs.org/wgbh/latinmusicusa/index.html#/en/wat/02/05] captured the movement during its heyday. Lewis Kahn, Azucar’s trombonist and violinst, performed at that event.)

“We don’t hear enough of this music anymore,” says Rodriguez. To his ears, the closest cultural reference that most casual music fans would be familiar with is “that mambo thing” seen on HBO’s Sex and the City. “That show’s approach to it was a little corny. This band and its

welcome. We encourage ideas from all generations; families with young children, older kids, teens, seniors, working parents, everyone! repertoire are classic, but it’s more than just the music—it’s about the feeling of the show, the soulful aspect of all these legendary guys playing together.”

“There once was a time that going to shows like this was the way people socialized. We’re far away from that now, but it’ll come full circle,” says Rodriguez. “Back in the day when our grandparents would go to the Palladium to hear this music, there used to be a ‘hang’ after the set because you wanted to hear what people had to say. Today, people leave after the last note. Back then, people met each other dancing in church gymnasiums. It was like West Side Story, and it was swinging. People weren’t just dancing to dance, they were listening with their heart and soul. It was about dancing, joy, and storytelling,” he says. “Like all good music, whether it’s Bob Dylan, Issac Hayes, or Eddie Palmieri, there’s a human story behind it, with deep content. And in our case, a lot of clave.”

Azucar, which is led by Grammy Award nominated saxophonist and flautist Jay Rodriguez (Miles Davis, Roy Hargrove, Groove Collective), includes trombonist-violinist Lewis Kahn (Tito Puente, Eddie Palmieri), vibraphonist Bill Ware (Steely Dan, Jazz Passengers), pianist Pablo Vergara (Gato Barbieri, Paquito D’Rivera), singer Jorge Maldonado (Sonora Matancera), timbalist Jimmy Delgado (Ray Barretto, Willie Colón), conga player George Delgado (Celia Cruz, Santiago Ceron), and bassist Ray Martinez (Hector Lavoe). 2015 Badges and Permits

Available for Pickup April 20

Starting April 20, 2015, members who have paid their dues and assessments in full can pick up their 2015 membership badges and permits at the Club Office. Office hours are Monday through Friday, 9 am to 4 pm, and on Saturday, from 10 am to 1 pm.

Please pay particular attention to the emergency information section on your badge pick-up form. Having emergency contacts and telephone numbers on file at the Club Office makes it much easier to contact you in an emergency.

Parking permits are valid only for those vehicles listed in the records at the Club Office. If you have replaced any vehicles, please bring copies of the appropriate vehicle registrations.

About Changes in Your Recorded Deed

In planning changes to your ownership of property that would be reflected in the recorded Deed, contacting the Club Office before you do so for guidance is advisable and will eliminate any misunderstandings.

The Club's By-Laws, in part, define Active Members as those who own property in Highland Lakes. When persons take title to property in Highland Lakes when they do not own other Highland Lakes property at that time, even when they join in the ownership of property with someone who currently owns property in Highland Lakes, they automatically become an active member and are required to pay the Initiation Fee. If you are considering adding anyone to your Deed, a wife, parent, child, friend, etc., please be aware of these By-Law requirements.

Sometimes members form a living or family trust as part of their estate planning. However, even this type of trust is a different, and therefore new, owner of property, and the payment of the Initiation Fee is required.

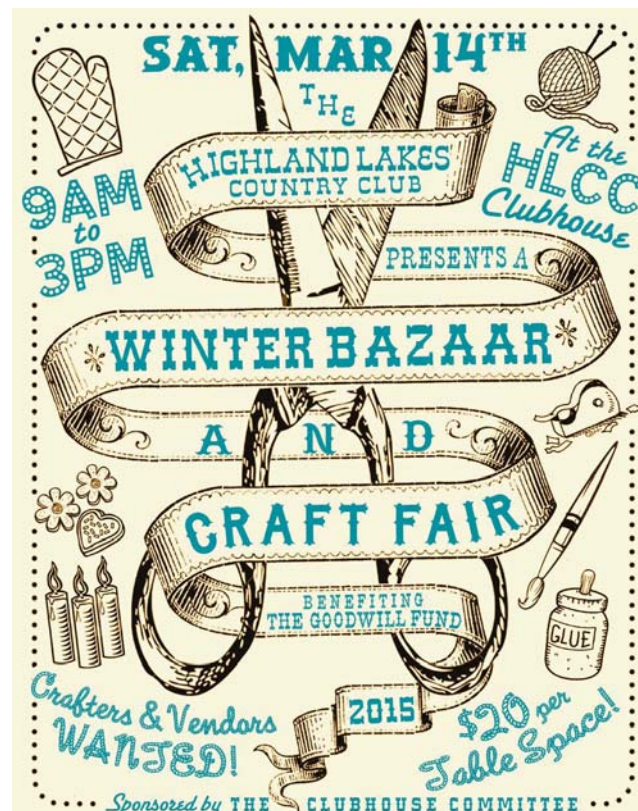

Boat Dock Lottery News

MAX MAGEE, COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

The Highland Lakes Voting Board has voted to revamp the boat dock lottery process as demand for docking space has changed. The Club will no longer conduct an annual boat dock lottery and will instead hold a one-time lottery in the spring of this year to assign docking space to members on a permanent basis.

The change was motivated in an effort to streamline the process as a more efficient use of staff and volunteer resources and to limit the uncertainty for members who use the dock space each year. In addition, it has been noted that there are currently more dock spaces available than are being used, limiting the need for a lottery process.

At its January 17 meeting, the Voting Board voted to permanently assign spaces at the following docks via a one-time lottery:

- Club Park (North of the Clubhouse)
 - Comet Row (South of Beach 2 at the Clubhouse)
 - Beach 3 (at Lookover Lane)
 - Beach 4 (Lakeside Drive East near Island Drive)
- Note: Junior sailors and members with special needs will have priority at the Eckhart Sailing Center dock.
- To be eligible for a dock space at the locations above, members must complete the application that will be sent in the annual dues invoice mailing. The application is also available on the website (<http://hlcc.org/oldsite/wp-content/uploads/2015/01/Boat-Dock-Lottery-Application-2015.pdf>) and at the Club Office. Applications must be received no later than March 15, 2015 at the Club Office.

Only members in good standing will be eligible to be assigned boat dock space in the lottery. Members who have a balance for calendar year 2015 will be advised of the results of their lottery application, but not authorized to place their boat in the assigned space until their dues and assessments for calendar year 2015 are paid in full. If the member is not in good standing by June 1st, the application and boat dock assignment will be withdrawn.

Once a member is assigned a boat dock space, that member will not need to re-apply for the space again at any time, so long as he/she remains a member in good standing and the space is being used. It is your space to use, year in/year out. If applications exceed the number of available spaces at a particular location, the member will be given a choice to temporarily choose a different location and/or be placed on a waiting list for space at their preferred location.

For any members who would like to reserve boat dock space after this spring’s one-time lottery takes place, there will be a process to apply on a first come-first served basis to reserve a boat dock space if available or otherwise be placed on the waiting list. A small number of spaces are grandfathered to members whose spaces predate the original docks purchased by the Club in 1989. Those spaces will remain grandfathered.
