Our Lives, Our Fortunes, Our Sacred Honor

On July 4, 1776, the most powerful armed forces in the world were on the American continent. They were there to subdue rebels - colonists who believed they were entitled to the full rights of Englishmen. Subdue, indeed. The British Redcoats were paid men; hired to defend the King and his honor. They were not beyond committing atrocities against those who were treasonous. The National Heritage Center for Constitutional Studies asserts that the favored punishment for treason was "hanging to the point of unconsciousness, then being revived, disemboweled, their body parts boiled in oil and their ashes scattered into the wind." So when the fifty-six brave men who signed the Declaration of Independence gathered in Philadelphia and mutually pledged to each other in that document "our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor," they understood that they were taking enormous risks. These were wealthy men of great accomplishment - incredibly gifted men; men who had very much to lose. But they agreed to jump into the frightening unknown together, pledging everything that was precious to them for the prospect of a gruesome and painful death. Why? They did it for something extraordinary. They did it for an idea.

The idea for which they so bravely pledged everything was not just any idea. It was revolutionary. It would bring down a King. It was eternal, and is an idea which is true for every human being ever born. It eventually was one providing a guidepost for American slaves who desired freedom; it was one providing the fundamental philosophical underpinning of Abraham Lincoln's prosecution of the Civil War; it provided the moral force behind Elizabeth Cady Stanton's efforts to get American women the right to vote; it would be the centerpiece of Martin Luther King's "I Had A Dream" speech as he sought civil rights for black Americans; and it would be embraced by brave men and women desperate to loosen the cruel grip of Communism behind the Iron Curtain during the Cold War. It was beyond a grand idea. The American Founders pledged their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor for an idea that was sublime.

The idea was a "self-evident truth." When we are born, we are all the same. We are "created equal" in that at birth, we have the same human nature and nothing else, whether we are born in the finest of palaces or in the gutter on the street. No man can take away our human nature because it is bestowed on us at birth by "Nature and Nature's God." Some of the characteristics that make us equal when unhindered by government are that we will think freely, speak freely, worship or not worship how we wish; we will assemble with friends and those of common interests for our mutual benefit; we will defend ourselves and others; we will acquire property for the betterment and enjoyment of our lives. Indeed, the Bill of Rights would eventually enshrine such characteristics of human nature as being beyond the reach of government. Government cannot take away the nature that God gave us; it can only suppress it. And the signers of the Declaration of Independence radically told the King of England, and the world, that governments are formed by men for their benefit - for the purpose of keeping men free, not for the purpose of ruling them. And when government lost its way, it was the right and the duty of the people to throw off that government and to create a new one for their benefit.

The freedom enshrined on the first July 4th was imperfect as millions in America would remain enslaved. Nonetheless, the principles of the Founding apply to all men and women because they undoubtedly are true for all men and women, and they eventually would be applied more broadly in this nation, though it often took fierce struggles to reach that point. We celebrate the Fourth of July not just because the United States of America was born; we do so because these great men who risked everything did so for the benefit of every human being thereafter, especially for every American thereafter, whose nation was forged in freedom that day in 1776.

Petitions for Trustees for Sections 2, 9, 10 and 11 will be available in the Club office beginning July 10, 2015. The Trustee positions are for full, three-year terms commencing October 1, 2015. Beach Rules of the State of New Jersey

The following are excerpts of applicable rules established by the New Jersey Department of Health governing the operation of bathing beaches. Additional operational rules pertaining to use of floating devices, barbecue grills, etc. have been established by the Club.

- ✓ Any person showing evidence of any communicable skin disease, sore or inflamed eyes, cold, nasal or ear discharges, or any other communicable disease shall be denied admission.

 ✓ Any person with excessive sunburn, open blisters, cuts, or
- ✓ Any person with excessive sunburn, open blisters, cuts, or bandages shall be denied admission.
- ✓ Do not enter the water if you are experiencing or recovering from diarrhea or have had any signs or symptoms of a gastrointestinal (stomach) disease in the past seven days.
- \checkmark All children in diapers must wear plastic pants with snug fitting elastic waist and leg bands. Do not wash out soiled diapers in the bathing water.
- ✓ Children should be encouraged to use the restroom before entering the water. Immediately report any "accidents" you observe in the bathing waters to a lifeguard.
- ✓ Glass containers shall be prohibited in food and drink areas.✓ Conduct which endangers the safety and comfort of
- others shall be prohibited.
- ✓ Outdoor bathing shall be prohibited during an electrical storm.
- ✓ Persons suspected of being under the influence of drugs or alcohol shall be prohibited from entering the water.

Weekly tests are required by the State of New Jersey, and results must not exceed 200. All samples conformed to state recreational bathing standards. Testing results are reported by the lab to the Sussex County Department of Health.










Mark the Date for the Lakeside Musical Showcase

Gypsy Moth Caterpillars - Updated

Some new developments to report after a conversation with Joseph Zoltowski, Director of the New Jersey Department of Agriculture's Division of Plant Industry:

The aerial survey of gypsy moth defoliation will be completed within a week or so.

Vernon Township has filed a letter with the Division requesting a fall ground survey of gypsy moth egg

This ground survey is the first step in determining/predicting gypsy moth problems in 2016. The number of egg masses found per acre determines whether aerial spraying will be recommended.

It is likely that the dry spring prevented the emergence of Entomophaga maimaiga (http://www. dec.ny.gov/docs/lands_forests_pdf/

gypsymoth.pdf) - gypsy moth fungus, and that the recent rains have permitted the fungus to expand, causing the deaths of the caterpillars (many are visible on the trunks of trees.)

The fungus spreads by spores passed from caterpillar to caterpillar and deposited on tree bark, limbs and in soils. The emergence of the fungus is likely to reduce the number of detectable gypsy moth egg masses in the fall, thereby undermining plans for aerial spraying.

The Shelton, CT Herald (http://www. sheltonherald.com/72399/gypsy-mothoutbreak-in-ct-this-summer-concernsscientists/) published a report June 25th on the emergence there of Entomophaga maimaiga after a dry spring and the observed mortality of the caterpillars. Like our area, Shelton was not expected to have a gypsy moth problem this year

based on the aerial surveys last fall. And like our area, it seems the hot, dry spring suppressed the gypsy moth fungus allowing the caterpillars to take hold.

Need more information about gypsy moths? Try this publication (http://www. state.nj.us/ agriculture/divisions/pi/pdf/ GMhomeowner.pdf) from the University of Maryland's Cooperation Extension (thanks to Bob Reffelt for the link).

The bottom line? Widespread emergence of the fungus will kill the caterpillars before they have a chance to become moths and reproduce; tree defoliation will be reduced; trees already damaged will have a chance to refoliate; the number of egg masses found in the fall will be lower, and aerial spraying next spring may not be necessary.




