

The Seniors Club is a flourishing organization for our burgeoning senior citizen population, which meets monthly for discussions about local area concerns. On occasion, speakers of

interest are invited to speak to the group about issues of interest, and the group also goes on bus trips, tours, conducts a dinner/dance theme gala, and visits one of the better area bistros for a year-end luncheon.

Events to look forward to include the Fall Craft Fair and Bazaar in November; tree lighting and gingerbread house decorating and the fabulous New Year's Eve Gala in December; the Winter Carnival in January; a spaghetti dinner in February; and the very popular St. Patrick's Day dinner in March. Club breakfasts happen most months and we are hoping for another Seckler Stage Concert soon. The Concert Series organizers are keeping their ears to the ground about potential acts to bring in before the end of the year, and are actively speaking with artists about potential shows in the spring. Three wonderful events for Halloween just passed (Pumpkin Carving, Trunk-or-Treat, and the Adult Halloween Party) but make a note to put them on your calendar for next year.

Another way to engage in our community is to join one of the many committees, such as Clubhouse (someone has to organize all these wonderful events), Ecology or Roads. Go to the <u>Highlands Lakes website</u> to learn more about the committees, what they do and how you can help.

Whether you are new to Highland Lakes or have lived here forever, clubhouse activities and events are a great way to meet new people or see old friends. There is something for every age and inclination. Come on down and give it a try.

The Highland Lakes Hiking Club would like to extend an invitation to residents of all ages who enjoy hiking in the great outdoors to join us on one of our upcoming monthly hikes. We are an informal, friendly group who look forward to our moderate Sunday hikes along local trails, some of which offer spectacular, or at least picturesque, views.

Hikers will meet at the clubhouse parking lot at 10:30 am. We will either walk from the clubhouse or drive a short distance to the starting point of the hike. It is important that each hiker bring water and lunch and wear appropriate hiking shoes. Most hikes will last an average of 4 - 5 hours, which includes waiting, lunch break and/or driving time. Anyone capable of hiking at least 5 miles at a steady, moderate pace is welcome. Hikers may bring their well-behaved dogs, which must be on a leash whenever we walk on a roadway. 


# Tricks and Treats on Halloween

# Rules and Regulations

- 1. All activities within the Highland Lakes community fall under the jurisdiction of the Club including, but not limited to, team and other competitive sports. Clubhouse programs and activities, fishing, facilities, etc., and current badges must be worn, plainly visible, at all times when engaged in any of these activities or when using any of the Club's facilities. Guest Badges may be purchased only by members in good standing and are valid only for the use and enjoyment of the Club's recreation facilities. (Amended June 21, 2002)
- 2. All the Club's facilities, services and activities are totally supported by the payment of the initiation fees and assessments which are established by the Club's Voting Board, from time to time, pursuant to the By-Laws and such fees and assessments must be paid in full in order to obtain current badges. A copy of the initiation fees and assessments currently in effect may be obtained at the Club Office.
- 3. Membership materials, including but not limited to Badges and Permits (boating, docking, garbage, and parking), are not transferable and their unauthorized use is prohibited. For the purpose of this Rule, the term "unauthorized use" shall include, but shall not be limited to the purchasing, lending or distributing of badges for use by any person who is not an active or associate member in good standing of the Club, or by any member of such person's family or by any guest of such person. (Amended December 16, 2005)
- 4. Adults must accompany all children requiring supervision while on Club property.
- 5. All boats must be registered with the Club and have a current Highland Lakes permit affixed to both sides of the exterior bow before use on any of the lakes or the lagoon. (Amended September 18, 2015)
- 6. The presence of combustion engines of any type, whether designed to power a boat, vehicle or mechanical device such as an ice auger or snow thrower, are prohibited on any of the Club's lakes unless needed by the Club for rescue, safety or maintenance, or as authorized by the Voting Board.
- 7. The main propulsion motors of electric powered boats used in Highland Lakes may not exceed 10 horsepower and may not be operated above 10 miles per hour. An additional trolling motor(s) may

- also be used but not simultaneously with the main propulsion motor. On a lake this size your speed should be based on polite boating etiquette and every effort should be made not to create an excessive wake. You should be adjusting your speed so as not to disrupt others on the water, including those paddling kayaks, canoes, paddleboards or boats of any kind, as well. (Adopted September 18, 2015)
- 8. All docks must be registered with the Club and display a current Highland Lakes sticker.
- 9. Applicable fishing and fire prevention laws of the State of New Jersey must be complied with at all
- 10. Children are constantly using the roads - everyone must drive slowly and otherwise comply with the New Jersey motor vehicle laws.
- 11. No air rifle or air guns of any type may be discharged anywhere within the Highland Lakes community and applicable New Jersey laws governing the use of firearms must be strictly observed.
- 12. All animals must be kept on leash while on Club property and are prohibited from all beach and play areas. Special assessment for violations: First violation: Warning; Second violation: \$15; Third violation: \$25; Fourth and subsequent violations: Rule 22 disciplinary complaint. (Amended September 23, 2009)
- 13. No house trailers or mobile homes of any type shall be used as residences anywhere in the Highland Lakes community.
- 14. Unless special permission is first obtained for use during later hours, the Clubhouse curfew shall be 11 pm Sunday through Friday and 12 midnight on Saturday.
- 15. Since the width of the right of way of the Club's roads generally exceeds that of the actual road bed, no obstruction shall be placed nor structures built beyond any individual property line so as to extend into the right of way.
- 16. In order to obtain parking permits, all licensed motor vehicles must be registered with the Club and display a current parking permit at the rear of the car on the drivers' side while parked at Club beaches, the Clubhouse, athletics facilities, dam, playgrounds, boating areas, playing fields and courts, and parking lots. (Complimentary guest parking permits are available with the purchase of Guest Badges at the Activities Center or at the beaches.)

- Special assessment for violations: Each violation: \$10.00. (Amended September 23, 2009)
- 17. No member shall post or inscribe any signs on Club property. Any such signs or inscriptions will be removed or eradicated at the Club's convenience.
- 18. Whenever snow has fallen or roads become covered with ice and the accumulation is such that it covers the roadway, an emergency shall exist and no vehicle shall be parked on any roadway or portion thereof. This parking prohibition shall remain in effect after the precipitation has ceased until the roads have been plowed and/ or sanded sufficiently and to the extent that Highland Lakes Country Club and Community Association Rules and Regulations as of March 19, 2010 parking will not interfere with the normal flow of traffic. Any unattended vehicle in violation of this Rule will be deemed to be parked without the consent of the Club and may be summonsed and towed in accordance with N.J.S.A. 39:4-56.6.
- 19. No Club facility shall be used for purpose of personal profit. Any exception shall be by approval of the Voting Board.
- 20. Any member who blocks a fire lane with a parked motor vehicle shall be liable for a twenty-five (\$25.00) special assessment payable no later than 15 days following the occurrence. Any such assessment outstanding after 15 days will be subject to the Club's current late payment penalty.
- 21. Bicycles are prohibited from all beach areas. Bicycles brought to the beach must be stored in designated areas.
- 22. No Active or Associate member, or member of the immediate family of such Active or Associate member shall conduct themselves in such a manner as to disrupt the permitted activities of any member, group of members or any organization authorized by the club to conduct such activities on Club property. Any person in violation of this rule will be subject to removal from the premises, as well as further disciplinary action pursuant to Rule 22. Members are responsible for activities of their family members, guests and invitees and violations committed by family members, guests and invitees may result in disciplinary action against the member pursuant to Rule 22.
  - 23. In the event that a written

- complaint is made to the Voting Board by any Active or Associate Member of the Club, or an employee of the Club, or any volunteer of the Club, alleging that another Active or Associate Member, or a member of the immediate family of such other Active or Associate Member, has violated any of the By-Laws or Rules and Regulations of the Club and the Voting Board has reasonable grounds to believe that such violation has occurred, the Voting Board may, by an affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds (2/3) of its members present and voting at any regular meeting of the Voting Board or at any other meeting specially called for that purpose, take such disciplinary action against such Active or Associate member as it deems appropriate, including, but not limited to, the imposition of a monetary fine and/or the temporary suspension of membership privileges, provided that written notice of the details of the alleged violation and of the proposed disciplinary action shall have been mailed to such Active or Associate member at least thirty (30) days prior to the time of the meeting, which notice shall also apprise such Active or Associate Member that he may be heard and represented by an attorney at such meeting prior to the time of the taking of the vote on such disciplinary action.
- 24. Trailers (boats, RV, etc.) are not permitted to be stored or parked overnight on any property owned by the Club unless special permission is first obtained from the Club Office.
- 25. These Rules, in six parts, constitute the Club's Rules pertaining to the storage of boats, kayaks, windsurfers, etc. on Club lands, boat racks and docks.
- A. HOLD HARMLESS: The member agrees to indemnify and hold the Club harmless from any injury, damage or loss resulting from the use and storage of the member's boat anywhere on Club property, including but not limited to lands, docks and boat racks. The member, by keeping their boat on Club lands, docks or boat racks, acknowledges that the Club shall not be responsible for any injury, damage or loss whatsoever resulting from the removal, transport and storage of the boat, and use of the Club's lands, docks and boat racks.
- B. IMPROPER STORAGE: Improper storage is defined as storage on lands owned by the Club other than on docks and boat racks,

- storage anywhere on Club properties without a current membership permit, and storage in violation of Rule 24 (C.), (D.) and/or (E.) below. Boats improperly stored will be removed to storage immediately. C. STORAGE ON DOCKS and RACKS AFTER OCTOBER 15: All boats must be removed from Club docks not later than October 15 of each year. In alternating years, all boats must be removed from boat racks by October 15, as determined by the Boat and Dock committee and as published in the Newsette. Boats
- stored after October 15 in violation of this Rule will be removed to storage immediately. D. UNAUTHORIZED USE OF SPACE ON ASSIGNED DOCKS: Space on certain Club docks is restricted to assigned use only. These docks are located at Club Park, Comet Row, Eckhart Sailing Center, Beach 3, Beach 4, and such other, future locations as may be authorized by the Voting Board. Docks subject to this assigned space requirement are marked with appropriate signs. Dock space assignments are managed by the Boat and Dock Committee upon receipt of applications from members in good standing and are assigned by the committee through the use of a lottery system and other methods. Boats not authorized by the committee on these docks will be removed to storage immediately. E. DOCK MODIFICATIONS AND UNCOATED WIRE PROHIBITED: Members may not drill holes in any dock or fasten any device without the authorization of the Boat and Dock Committee. Only ropes, chain and plastic coated wire are authorized to attach a boat to a dock. Uncoated wire is specifically prohibited. Members are responsible for all damages caused by unauthorized drilling or fastening to the dock or excessive wear or chafing caused by the use of unauthorized attachment methods. Boats stored on docks in violation of this Rule will be removed to storage immediately. F. REMOVAL TO STORAGE, PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS: Boats, kayaks, windsurfers, etc. of members stored in violation of these
- Rules shall be removed to storage, and will be subject to a special assessment of \$100.00, and a daily storage charge of \$5.00, calculated from the date the boat was removed to storage up to November 15, Continued on Page 10

when a special winter storage fee of \$250.00 will be imposed. After June 15, a disposal fee of \$250.00 will be imposed. Boats may not be retrieved between November 15 and April 15. Members whose boats are identifiable through the boating permit shall be provided notice by regular and certified mail that the boat has been removed to storage. The Club may, in its sole discretion, elect to acquire title to any boat that has been determined to be abandoned, in compliance with the "Abandoned Vessels Disposition"

Law," N.J.S.A. 12:7C-7 et seq. (Adopted May 16, 2014)

26. No person shall: a. feed any waterfowl; b. create any condition, or allow any condition to exist, which results in a congestion of waterfowl that causes: (a.) an accumulation of waterfowl feces or droppings, (b.) damage to flora, fauna, private or public property, (c.) a threat or nuisance to the public health, safety or welfare, or (d.) a threat to the health, safety or welfare of said waterfowl.

27. No branches, leaves, snow or other materials shall be placed beyond any individual property line so as to extend into the road right

of way. Members in violation of this Rule shall be contacted by telephone using all telephone numbers provided by the member on the most recent badge pickup form numbers on file at the Club Office. The member shall be provided two hours from the time contact has been made to clear the right-of-way. Failure to reach the member by telephone shall not absolve the member from their responsibilities. After two hours, the Club shall clear the problem, and the member shall be subjected to a special assessment of \$250.00 and a charge of \$100.00 per hour or part thereof, or the Club's actual cost, whichever is greater for labor and

equipment, and the Club's actual disposal costs. Special assessment for violations: First: \$250.00 and a charge of \$100.00 per hour or part thereof, or the Club's actual cost, whichever is greater for labor and equipment, and the Club's actual disposal costs. Second and Subsequent: Special Assessments as for first offense and Rule 22 disciplinary complaint. (Amended September 23, 2009)

28. Skateboarding and roller blading are prohibited at Beach 1 except for the Utility Court.


29. Persons under the age of 18 are prohibited from using any and all tobacco products while on Club property.

30. Personal watercraft (sometimes called PWC or by brand names such as Jet Ski, Wave Runner, Sea Doo, etc.) are prohibited from all the lakes and the lagoon at Highland Lakes. A PWC is defined as a boat with a motor powering a jet pump or by an outboard or propeller driven motor as its primary source of propulsion, and is designed to be operated by a person or persons sitting, standing or kneeling on the craft, or being towed behind the vessel, rather than in the conventional manner of sitting or standing inside a boat, and includes vessels that are similar in appearance or operation. (Amended March 19, 2010)
