Let Fallen Leaves Lie

Finding yourself knee-deep in leaves? The lovely woods that shade Highland Lakes all summer and display stunning colors in fall, started dropping loads of leaves a few weeks ago. For most folks, that means grabbing a rake, firing up the noisy blower — and then figuring out where to dump the leaves. But maybe it's time to cultivate (literally) a different mindset. Don't think of leaves as a disposal problem. Instead, consider them an organic gift of nature, that can benefit your entire yard!

"Why get rid of it?," asks Jason Tribiano. He's a master gardener, and the proud owner of a wooded lot that slopes down towards the Big Lake. And Tribiano's got big plans for falling leaves: multiple mulch piles. He's actually happy to accept his neighbors' leaves, too. "That was kind of my goal," he explained. "I'll take all the leaves and as they decompose — two years later, you have the blackest dirt to plant with! You can just bring a bucket and dig up unbelievable compost and start planting!" As proof, Tribiano pointed to some young rhododendrons and other evergreen shrubs now thriving in his yard.

For smaller yards, mulch piles might seem an improbable solution — but Tribiano says you don't need acres to make this work. He advises, use a mulching mower to grind up some of the leaves to enrich your lawn. Layer some in your flower and garden beds. And, yes — you can build a scaled-down mulch pile. "You make a small area. You create an area — four by four, five by five. Just pile it up. It's called cold compost and basically, it's just piling up leaf and lawn debris from your property. Just pile it up and let it sit," Tribiano explains. "You don't have to turn it."

Tribiano also stacks fallen branches along the slope, weaving rough hedges that he backfills with leaves. Soil eventually develops, and the new terraces slow down rainwater runoff during big storms. Controlling nutrientladen runoff's critical to keeping the lake clean.

Which brings up a critical item: please don't rake into the lake! Dumping your leaf pile in the lake turns the bottom into an oozy mess, and diminishes water quality. Leaves sink to the bottom, rot and feed the algae, Tribiano says. That's tantamount to consorting with the enemy. The Club had to treat a couple of HABs (Harmful Algal Blooms) this past summer. Nourishing algae with leaf litter just adds to the problem.

Finally, there's a new approach called, "leaving leaves" — taking a step back towards nature, and letting leaf litter cover the yard. Healthy forest ecosystems feature leaf litter filled with life. Moths and butterflies often overwinter in cocoons attached to leaves. Nightcrawlers feast on the detritus (and make terrific fishing bait.) Granted, that's a 180-degree pivot from the clean-lawn culture most folks know, and it simply won't work for everyone (especially

residents whose trees do leave them knee-deep every autumn.) Sometimes, rakers gotta rake. Sussex County does have a Vegetative Waste Facility where residents can drop off leaves, grass clippings and mulch — and they'll take two bags/barrels for free. Otherwise — it's \$45 per ton. (https://www.scmua.org/cit-e-access/webpage.cfm?TID=1 21&TPID=11911#:~:text=The%20Vegetative%20Waste%20 Facility%20consists,collection%20crews%20and%20 commercial%20haulers)

Tribiano also says, he might be willing to spread some of your leaves on his lot. (If you contact him first. He's on the Ecology Committee.) But — here's a thought. After you've wrangled and mulched most of this autumn's leaf crop and that last scattering (usually from oaks) finally flutters down to lightly carpet your lawn? Try this: just leave them.

About Changes in Your Recorded Deed

In planning changes to your ownership of property that would be reflected in the Recorded Deed, contacting the Club Office before you do so for guidance is advisable and will eliminate any misunderstandings.

The Club's By-Laws, in part, define Active Members as those who own property in Highland Lakes. When persons take title to property in Highland Lakes when they do not own other Highland Lakes property at that time, even when they join in the ownership of property with someone who currently owns property in Highland Lakes, they automatically become an active member and are required to pay the Initiation Fee. If you are considering adding anyone to your Deed, a wife, parent, child, friend, etc., please be aware of these By-Law requirements.

Sometimes members form a living or family trust as part of their estate planning. However, even this type of trust is a different, and therefore new, owner of property, and the payment of the Initiation Fee is required.

Article V – Public Health & Safety

BURNING/OPEN FIRES – Fires which are controlled and contained within a fire ring, fire pit or similar structure or device intended for such use are permitted. Bonfires and certain other activities are subject to prior approval by the Vernon Township Dept. of Fire Prevention. If in doubt, check with the Dept. of Fire Prevention first and always have a fire extinguisher or charged water hose nearby. Violation of this rule shall be a Tier 3 offense.




Holiday Tree Lighting




A very special luncheon to celebrate the life of our dear past S/C president, Joy Logan. She called on me to continue her work with the seniors of our community.


November 14 brings our mid-month luncheon and plans for our Christmas dinner/dance with a favorite DJ on December 12 from 6 – 9 pm.








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Ladies Sunfish Recap



Important Notice: Make Your Selection

The 2024 dues and assessment invoices have been mailed. The invoice includes an operating assessment and reserve assessment. An article explaining the changes can be found in the October 2023 Newsette.

You now have three ways to pay, including two monthly payment plan options, making it even more convenient for members to manage their finances. You can pay in full or subscribe to a 6-month or 12-month payment plan.

ALL Members MUST SELECT which payment option they prefer by checking the box on the invoice stub included with your mailing and returning it to the Club Office. Your payment plan selection and first payment must be received by November 15th whether you are paying in person, by mail or online.

Failure to submit a payment plan selection form by November 15, 2023, will result in your account being charged the full annual assessment requiring payment in full with interest accruing at a rate of 1.5% per month (18% APR) for any unpaid balance.

If you owe any amount in arrears, you must pay your prior balance in full or contact the Club Office to discuss an installment plan.

If you previously enrolled in auto-pay, please be sure to login to the portal and confirm your debit or credit card information is correct and your auto-pay selections are still valid.



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Winterizing

Now is the time to plan and act on things we only remember when the cold north wind is blowing.

Windows often provide the biggest impact especially if you have single pane glass. Quality double glazed; low E windows properly installed can reduce heating costs by about 8%. Doors should be tight and weather-stripped.

If you have a floor exposed to the outside or crawlspace, insulate the floor. Be sure to caulk or use low expansion foam anywhere you see daylight. Paint to reduce the effect of weather. If you are losing too much heat through the roof, consider spray foam insulation.

Have your heating system serviced and cleaned every year. If you are considering replacing the heating system, evaluate a direct-vent unit; they are much more efficient and usually don't require a chimney. ETS units are very cost-effective. Multi-zone units (heat pumps) for air conditioning and supplemental heat are being used more frequently; they are cost effective and don't require ducting. Also, clean fireplace flues. Insulate pipes and eliminate any drafts. If you have problems with buried pipes, try installing rigid insulation under the ground surface and over the pipe.

Clear branches from overhead lines. Clean gutters.


