# Beach 1 Bus Stop Information

Friday, September 8 marks the opening of school and the school bus stop at Beach 1. On Thursday evening, September 7, the parking and traffic pattern at Beach 1 will be changed to accommodate school buses, and will be in effect over the Labor Day weekend and until the end of school next June.

Here are the key points to these changes:

- ✓ Parking for those who enter the Beach 1 site from Breakneck Road will be restricted to the parking spaces in the "loop road" there will be no access into either of the two parking aisles along the ball field or children's playground area.
- $\checkmark\,$  Stopping/Standing is prohibited at all times within the school bus loop road.
- ✓ Access into both parking aisles will be available from the rear of the site – the Lakeside Drive entrance. You will be able to pass from one aisle to the other in the area at the loop road and at the rear of the site.
- $\checkmark$  Designated handicapped parking spaces are restricted under all circumstances to those drivers authorized to use them summonses will be issued for unauthorized use.
- ✓ Parents are reminded that the tennis courts are for tennis only children are not permitted to play in these areas at any time.

Parents who live north of Breakneck Road should use the Lakeside Drive entrance, leaving the spaces in the loop road available to others.

Your cooperation is essential in making the school bus stop safe for all children and the drivers of the school buses. Thank you.

#### Lisa Loeb to perform in HL on October 21

Even when you start your career off like Lisa Loeb did with a massive hit, there's no guarantee that your fame and fortune will last forever. But when Loeb followed her breakthrough platinum-selling hit (1994's "Stay" from the movie Reality Bites) with two back-to-back gold-certified albums (Tails, and the Grammy-nominated Firecracker), notice was served far and wide that she had the talent, songwriting chops, and artistic drive to remain a vital artist for the long run.

In the time that has passed since her startling debut Loeb has remained hard at work on her craft, and it shows—she has enjoyed a steady stream of hits on the pop charts ever since. Today she remains true to the emotional alt-rock she first became synonymous with decades ago, but her artistic horizons have expanded to include "kids" music in addition to acting and writing. With her highly anticipated October 21 performance in Highland Lakes creeping up, the Newsette caught up with Loeb for a quick chat about success, creative maturity and songs about disappointing pancakes.

# Your life has changed a lot since your early achievements. How has success and maturity changed your approach to songwriting today?

I've been doing this since I was a kid, and had my first hit in 1994, which is 23 years ago. Ten years ago I felt pressure to get my songs on the radio, but it was a different climate for musicians back then. Now I'm on the other side of that pressure. I have a good national following, and can play in nice theaters—which was always my goal. I wanted to be like Shawn Colvin, who's a great singer-songwriter and storyteller, and someone with popular status who's connected with people but still has her roots. I get to do that now.

#### What do you hear now when you listen back to yourself and evaluate your songwriting compared to what you're writing now?

When I hear my earlier recordings, it was so important to me for everything to be perfect. But now when I write and record, there's a very different passion and intensity then when I was writing about relationships in my twenties. For me, it's about finding the Zen of sitting down and

writing. In your job as a creative person, you just have to set aside time, space, and materials to write and create things. But you have to have a lot of fun, too. I find a lot of purpose performing for kids and their families. I like playing songs that tell slightly whimsical stories.

I also think it's fun to play kids songs in my grownup shows. It's a sophisticated but slightly silly feeling to hear a whole crowd listening and laughing together. When I play songs from my early records it sometime feels like I'm making a presentation standing in front of a piece of art. But when people gather around to hear a new story about a

disappointing pancake, that's different. Summer camp songs are a part of who I am, and performing that music in small theaters is where I can make a magical connection.

Tickets for Lisa Loeb's upcoming October 21 show at Seckler Stage are available now in the Club Office 973-764-4366, or by calling 973-271-9780. Prices are \$25 for members-in-good-standing and their guests, \$30 for non-members. Doors open at 7 pm, and the show starts at 8 pm, all seats are on a first-come basis. 



# All boats must be removed by Labor Day, September 4.

The drawdown is real and will start on or about September 15. The <u>lake will be lowered three feet</u> from its normal level.

- ➤ In order to store the docks safely during the drawdown ALL BOATS MUST BE OFF CLUB DOCKS BY LABOR DAY.
- ➤ If the Club needs to remove your boat, <u>there are significant penalties</u>.
- ➤ LAKEFRONT OWNERS, you need to plan to get your boats out of the lake by Labor Day as well. This is especially important if you use a marina to handle your pontoon boat. Same for your docks if you normally remove docks and floats for the winter, you need to do it before Sept. 15, and that includes contacting whatever contractors you use.

#### Highland Lakes Finishes Third at LSC "A" Championships

The Highland Lakes Swim Team capped off a historic 2017 season at the LSC "A" Championships taking home another trophy, finishing third place overall, and the highpoint winner within their division. The team sent 58 "A" swimmers and eight relays to Pequannock ready to battle their way onto the team podium. After an undefeated dual meet season and an impressive showing at Coaches Choice, Highland Lakes coaches set a target of third overall at Championships, a finish which would cement their place amongst the league's elite swim clubs this year.

With 57 of Highland Lakes' 101 individual swims breaking into the top-16, Highland Lakes amassed points by the fistful throughout the meet. 
#### **Never Be Short Enough!**
