Beach 1 Bus Stop Information

Friday, September 8 marks the opening of school and the school bus stop at Beach 1. On Thursday evening, September 7, the parking and traffic pattern at Beach 1 will be changed to accommodate school buses, and will be in effect over the Labor Day weekend and until the end of school next June.

Here are the key points to these changes:

- ✓ Parking for those who enter the Beach 1 site from Breakneck Road will be restricted to the parking spaces in the "loop road" there will be no access into either of the two parking aisles along the ball field or children's playground area.
- \checkmark Stopping/Standing is prohibited at all times within the school bus loop road.
- ✓ Access into both parking aisles will be available from the rear of the site – the Lakeside Drive entrance. You will be able to pass from one aisle to the other in the area at the loop road and at the rear of the site.
- ✓ Designated handicapped parking spaces are restricted under all circumstances to those drivers authorized to use them – summonses will be issued for unauthorized use.
- ✓ Parents are reminded that the tennis courts are for tennis only – children are not permitted to play in these areas at any time.

Parents who live north of Breakneck Road should use the Lakeside Drive entrance, leaving the spaces in the loop road available to others.

Your cooperation is essential in making the school bus stop safe for all children and the drivers of the school buses. Thank you.

All boats must be removed by Labor Day, September 4.

The drawdown is real and will start on or about September 15.

The lake will be lowered three feet from its normal level.

- ➤ In order to store the docks safely during the drawdown ALL BOATS MUST BE OFF CLUB DOCKS BY LABOR DAY.
- ➤ If the Club needs to remove your boat, there are significant penalties.
- ➤ LAKEFRONT OWNERS, you need to plan to get your boats out of the lake by Labor Day as well. This is especially important if you use a marina to handle your pontoon boat. Same for your docks if you normally remove docks and floats for the winter, you need to do it before Sept. 15, and that includes contacting whatever contractors you use.

Weekly tests are required by the State of New Jersey, and results must not exceed 200. All samples conformed to state recreational bathing standards. Testing results are reported by the lab to the Sussex County Department of Health.

Election News

A recount of election results at the Annual Meeting on August 20, 2017, determined that a tie vote occurred between Judith Norton and Patricia Thompson for Section 3 Trustee.

On August 30, 2017, the Voting Board authorized a special run-off election for Section 3 Trustee on Sunday, September 17, 2017, at the Club office to decide the election. The polls will be open from 12 pm to 2 pm. The ballot will include only the two run-off candidates, Judith Norton and Patricia Thompson.

Members in good standing of Section 3 desiring to vote in absentia shall obtain an absentee ballot and a preaddressed envelope addressed to the Chairperson of the Board of Elections from the Secretary of the Club at the Club office. You may obtain the ballot (and a replacement membership card if requested) by stopping by the Club office, by calling and asking that one be sent to you, or by contacting the office providing the name of a person authorized to pick up the ballot for you. Office hours are Monday through Friday, 9 am to 4 pm, and on Saturday from 10 am to 1 pm. The ballot must be received by the Secretary of the Club at the Club office at least four days prior to the date of the election, which is Wednesday, September 13, 2017, not later than 4 pm, together with the member's membership card.

Summer Garbage Pickup

The Club's summer garbage pickup for ten weeks with Blue Diamond Disposal ends on Tuesday, September 5 (due to the Labor Day Holiday). Please note that the Club's services do not include recycling. Please remember - your garbage must be out by 6:30 am on collection day.

Boat Removal Notice from Boat Docks and Racks

Remove boats from all docks by September 4

Notice to Boaters: All boats on Club docks must **be removed by September 4.** Any boat removed by the Club will subject the member to the \$100.00 special assessment for removal, storage fees of \$5.00 per day and \$250.00 if the boat is not retrieved from storage by November 15. These assessments are in accordance with the rules adopted by the Voting Board. Any boat that cannot be identified through a Club permit, NJ registration, or hull identification number will be declared abandoned and disposed of in accordance with New Jersey law.

Boat racks will be inspected this fall. The program requires the removal of all boats stored on boat and kayak racks on the eastern side of Highland Lakes by October 15, 2017. Once the racks and areas are clear, necessary maintenance and landscaping can be performed late in the fall and in the early spring.

Requiring removal every other year helps to eliminate the excuse members have that there is "no rack space and storing my boat on the ground is the only choice I have."

flaunt his position or wealth.



All Dog Owners

Be advised Security has received many calls regarding dogs running loose, barking dogs and feces NOT being picked up. If you own a dog, it is YOUR RESPONSIBILITY to ensure that you take care of your animals.

Vernon Township Ordinance states:

- that any dog shall not be permitted off your premises without a leash.
- no person shall allow any dog in his keeping, custody and control to bark continuously for any period longer than one half hour.
- any person owning a dog which defecates upon any property that is not their own must remove all feces immediately and dispose of it.

BARBARA JAGGI, CHAIRPERSON, ECOLOGY COMMITTEE

To keep our property values up our lakes and watershed must be in good hape.

- Maintain your septic system.
- Be aware that any chemical used on your property eventually reaches the lake as run-off. Trees and vegetation act as a natural filter. Preserve them.
- If you must use fertilizers, use environmentally sound products.
- Remove any accumulated debris from the top of storm drains in front of your property pick up after your dog and dispose of the collection bags in YOUR TRASH.

Bringing the suburban lawn mentality to the lake has also brought more opportunities to degrade the quality of our lakes. Limit the amount of lawn and keep as much natural vegetation as possible, or replant natural vegetation especially near the lake. Not only will you reduce run-off, you will reduce the amount of yard work.
