If you want to submit an article to be published in an upcoming issue of the Newsette, please adhere to the following rules:

Feature articles should be 400-600 words and must include a headline, subheads (where necessary) and an author byline. (Your computer's word processing application likely keeps a running word count, but if you don't know how or where to find it, please refer to the Help tool within that application. To manually calculate the approximate word count for your article, count the number of words in a single paragraph and divide that number by the number of lines in the paragraph to determine the average number of words per line, then multiply that number by the total number of lines in your article.)

All other submissions (including committee meetings, club events, activities, and miscellaneous news) should be 150 words or less, and must include a headline and an author byline.

All submissions must be sent via email to hlcc@warwick.net. The *Newsette* is published

on Saturdays, and every effort must be made for articles to be submitted on the Friday before the week of publication. Under no circumstances will submissions be accepted after noon on Monday. The Newsette is published on the first Saturday of each month (see the production schedule at http://hlcc.org/about-hlcc/newsette-archive/newsette-production-schedule/). If you do not have access to a computer and/or the internet, it is your responsibility to coordinate with someone else on your committee or within your group for assistance. Concert Series at Highland Lakes Coming Soon

We may still be deep in the middle of what seems to be an unrelenting winter, but spring is on its way (in theory), and with it comes some exciting news for Highland Lakes music fans. The Voting Board recently approved a proposal initiated by members of our community to host a concert series at the Clubhouse.

Although the concert series is still in the planning stages, here's what we already know: The first concert is expected to be scheduled for June, but exact dates have not been determined just yet. The performers will be well-known national touring acts across a variety of genres that are stylistically accessible to young and older members of the community alike. Tickets will be available for purchase exclusively by Club members on both a per-show and entire-series basis at a discounted price—a much smaller number of tickets will be made available to members and the general public at a higher fixed price once Club members had been given an exclusive opportunity to purchase tickets. (Ticket pricing has not been determined yet.)

The organizers of the concert series are currently in the process of purchasing equipment to support the acts that will perform here. Once the gear has been purchased, we will contact representatives of the artists we expect to book, and the schedule will be announced thereafter. Stay tuned for more updates.

No Parking on Roads During Snow and Ice Operations

Please be aware that Rule No. 16 of the Club's Rules and Regulations, adopted April 22, 1994, reads as follows:

Whenever snow has fallen or roads become covered with ice and the accumulation is such that it covers the roadway, an emergency shall exist and no vehicle shall be parked on any roadway or portion thereof. This parking prohibition shall remain in effect after the precipitation has ceased until the roads have been plowed and/or sanded sufficiently and to the extent that parking will not interfere with the normal flow of traffic.

Any unattended vehicle in violation of this Rule will be deemed to be parked without the consent of the Club and may be summonsed and towed in accordance with N.J.S.A. 39:4-56.6 and Vernon Township Ordinance 99-12.

Your cooperation is needed to make the winter as easy as possible on your neighbors and the Club. Thank you.



A little information about our little 2 year old fighter...

Massimo was born May 5, 2012 weighing only 1 pound 6 ounces and not even 12 inches long. His gestational age was at 23 weeks, where as a full term baby is 40 weeks. From the beginning Massimo showed us he was a fighter. Early on his body developed a blood clot, which eventually lead

to the loss of all five toes and a deformity on one foot with the

length of his lower leg to be shorter than the other leg. Massimo needed heart and



abdominal surgery. Massimo spent many weeks on a ventilator to help him breathe. He'll see a specialist at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia for evaluation of his foot and leg where they are planning on numerous surgeries in the future to lengthen his leg and repair his foot. Massimo wears an orthosis boot (AFO) to help him stand and he is learning to walk. This boot has to be checked and adjusted monthly. As he grows he will be in need of a new one every 4-6 months. He requires physical and occupational therapy on a weekly basis. He will be starting speech

therapy shortly. Massimo is a happy baby with a wonderful temperament and personality. He is a fighter!

Diving the "Logging Train" of Highland Lakes

One persistent legend of Highland Lakes concerns the logging train submerged in the Main Lake since the time eighty years ago when the wooded valley that now forms the lake was being cleared of trees. Like anyone who has heard of this relic, I imagined it might be the kind of steam locomotive with a tall smoke-stack and big, iron spoke wheels that we see in pictures chugging through the redwood forests of the Pacific Northwest pulling cars laden with lumber while belching sparks, smoke and steam.

There is a vehicle underwater but it's really a small tractor, probably dieselpowered. It did indeed run along rails. Ron Dupont, owner of the General Store and local historian has written about it and he has an iron wheel recovered from the vehicle in the back of the store. When I wanted to find out where it might be located in the lake, Ron referred me to a local resident by the name of Bob Meichsner, who had dived the tractor and recovered the wheel. I called him up and he kindly gave me directions to find it, about 100 feet southeast of the end of the island opposite our house. We call the island Bali-Hai for a sign that used to hang on the only house located there. According to our dear, departed neighbor Bud Buell, it was previously called Livingston Island from the original builder of the house.

I suggested to my dive-buddy Dennis, companion of many offshore adventures diving shipwrecks up and down the coast of New Jersey, New York, North Carolina and other farther-flung places that we should dive the locomotive of the lake. We had tried to find it ten years earlier without success although we had been in the general area. The visibility of the lake is little better than zero in August so unless you know exactly where you're looking you could be within arm's-length of it and never know. So one Saturday in August 2010 we asked our good friend, the artist Philip Pearlstein if he would take us on his pontoon boat to find and dive it.

Our equipment was the same as we had used to dive torpedoed freighters, German submarines, wrecked radar towers and the liner Andrea Doria, which lies at 240 feet south of Nantucket. To call it serious overkill would be a serious understatement. However a set of twin steel tanks was all I had available and so Dennis and I set out to do what turned out to be not much more than a ten-foot deep dive clad like "weekend warriors" aboard



This photograph may give some idea of the original appearance of the Highland Lakes quarry tractor. It ran on rails and had a diesel (or gasoline) engine, like this one restored in England. The tractor was used to pull logs when clearing the valley for the lake. It may have been a little smaller than this although its lower part and wheels have settled into the mud on the lake bottom, lowering the profile. One possible theory is that it was a repurposed quarry tractor or locomotive from one of the stone quarries in this area of New Jersey, maybe even the abandoned quarry behind the A&P store in Vernon.

an offshore dive-boat, my favorite pastime before we bought our house.

After splashing about in the shallow water off Bali-Hai for a while, getting entangled in the fishing line that Philip's young companion kept casting, Dennis appeared head and shoulders above the surface and announced that he might be standing on the wreck. I followed his legs down into the murk and felt a large, complicated object with odd protrusions all covered in rust and soft growth. It was what Dennis and I had come to know from our offshore adventures as a "Braille dive," where we feel the wreck rather than see it. Down in the soft muck I felt a vaguely round object that came away in my hands. It was heavy. I lifted it up and between us we hauled it onto Philip's boat.

Back at our house I chipped away the encrustation and uncovered a well-preserved cast-iron wheel about twelve inches in diameter that would have run on a rail. It was different from the one Ron has in the General Store. That one is pierced with apertures; this one is solid. It's not unusual for locomotives to have differing wheels but it has led to some conjecture that there could be more than

one vehicle at the bottom of the lake, maybe the locomotive and one or more of the cars it pulled? In trying to identify the locomotive I went to various sources and did some research online. There are old mining trains at the nearby Sterling Mining Museum but they have electric motors and were powered by banks of accumulators, like car batteries as there could be no exhaust fumes underground. My best guess is it might have been a repurposed quarry train as there were many quarries in this area.

So the "logging train" in Highland Lakes is most likely a diesel-powered tractor about five feet in height and eight feet long that ran on a track that could have come down from the direction of Alturas Road, running diagonally across the south end of the lake in a roughly eastwest direction and culminating in a rise in the ground that now forms the island. To see it you don't need scuba equipment. Choose a calm day in spring when the lake water is still very clear, before the algae clouds it. Keeping to the eastern side of the island, take a bearing south-east from the bleached-out, fallen tree off the southern tip of the island and without causing ripples, slowly float around in your boat or kayak about 100 feet out. Keep looking down carefully. Polarizing sunglasses may help you see a bright, rust-red rectangle approximately two feet by four just a few feet below the surface. It's the top of the engine and if you look carefully you'll see a bent pipe and various engine parts sticking

About Boating Safely Course Offered

US COAST GUARD AUXILIARY

Representatives of the U.S. Coast **Guard Auxiliary** will be conducting their "About Boating Safely" program at the Clubhouse on Saturday, June 21, 2014. The 8-hour

course includes all



New Jersey-specific material as required by law, and upon successful completion, each participant will receive a U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary card that entitles them to operate a motorized boat legally in any state that has a mandatory education requirement (the course is approved by the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators). In addition, participants will receive the New Jersey Boating Safety Certificate, which is required to obtain a boating license or a boating endorsement on a driver's license.

The course is only open to Highland Lakes members

PROOF OF IDENTIFICATION so please register with MUST BE BROUGHT TO CLASS the Club office as soon as possible (no later than June

6) by providing a check for \$45 payable to Highland Lakes Country Club--registrations will not be accepted after June 6.

Please be aware that a boat license is a separate document from a boat safety certificate and is required for operation on non-tidal water (water where the tide does not change) in the State of New Jersey. The boat license is not a replacement for a boat safety certificate, it is an additional requirement. Regardless of the type of boat (pontoon, canoe, row boat, etc.), if it has a motor the operator must have their boat license with them at all times. To obtain a boat license, go to your nearest NJ Division of Motor Vehicle Commission Facility. Persons must bring their NJ Boat Safety Certificate with them to apply for a boat license.

Doors open at 8 am, and the course begins promptly at 8:30 am.

Hikers will meet at the Clubhouse parking lot at 10:30 a.m. We will either


