Celebrate July 4th the Way it Was Celebrated in 1776

On July 4th at 10:30 am, all Highland Lakes residents are encouraged to attend a reading of the Declaration of Independence in the Lake Room. Refreshments will be served.

It once was said: "Freedom is never more than one generation away from extinction. We didn't pass it to our children in the bloodstream. It must be fought for, protected, and handed on for them to do the same, or one day we will spend our sunset years telling our children and our children's children what it was once like in the United States where men were free."

While the 4th of July is a great national kick-off to summer in our nation, it was approval of the Declaration of Independence by the Second Continental Congress on July 4, 1776, that provided us with the well-deserved reason for this celebration of freedom. Listen to the famous words

of Thomas Jefferson and the other Founding Fathers, who risked everything to make the United States the first nation ever to be founded on universal principles of human rights and individual freedom. Learn why the Declaration of Independence expresses truths about mankind that people throughout the world have looked to as a beacon in their quest for freedom from oppression ever since and which, like an earthquake, jolted the foundation of every single government to come before it and after it.

Highland Lakes resident Ron Berutti, an attorney and a published author on topics of constitutional history, will read the Declaration of Independence and provide some historical context for the Declaration of Independence. Afterward, an open discussion will take place as to the Declaration's meaning, its important role in the eternal struggle for freedom, and its continued vitality in today's world. Younger residents of Highland Lakes who may not know much about the story of the American Revolution or who question the relevance of the Declaration of Independence to their lives today are particularly encouraged to attend. Adult residents who can share their American experiences are also encouraged to attend, so that we can learn from one another about how the torch of liberty has been carried forward to this day, and how we can help carry it forward into the future so that freedom may be preserved for future generations of Americans.

This is the third year for this event. The first two years' readings were well-attended and well-received by residents of all ages, and a lively and civil discussion took place among those in attendance. If you missed the prior presentations and discussions, make sure you don't miss the opportunity to attend this year! You won't regret it.

Philip Pearlstein Living in Realtime

"I get my highs from using my eyes," says Philip Pearlstein, the celebrated artist and resident of Highland Lakes and New York City, who recently celebrated his 90th birthday with numerous friends at the Highland Lakes Clubhouse this past May.

Pearlstein's unflinching visions of reality have brought him respect from the established art world. His works have a place in the permanent collections of more than 70 major international art institutions including the Met, MOMA and the Whitney, regular show openings at art galleries in New York, Chicago and Detroit, as well as exhibitions in England, France, Germany and Italy. During the 70 years of his art career, he has received numerous awards and accolades, including serving as president of the prestigious New York Academy of Arts.

Pearlstein was considered a reactionary and a traditionalist when he steadfastly stuck to his personal vision of realism while the art world he came of age in during the Fifties and Sixties. This may seem hard to appreciate now in our age of "reality" TV shows and special effects, however to many of his contemporaries in the New York art world of the Fifties, the artist's emotional response mattered more than faithfully recording an accurate visual representation of the subject upon canvas. "There will always be those who want to make paintings of the human form with all its parts all where they should be," says Pearlstein, "in spite of progress."

Life with Dorothy and Andy

While Pearlstein might not have seemed "cool" to many of his contemporaries back then, his abundance of artistic skills gained him early recognition. At age 17, his two first-published paintings (a merry go-round and a barbershop) both won first prizes in a national competition and were reproduced in LIFE magazine. But his career and art education at the Carnegie Institute of Technology were interrupted by his service in World War II.

When the war ended, Pearlstein returned to the Carnegie Institute of Technology's School of Art from Italy (where he been stationed) during the summer of 1947 and rented a barn studio with two fellow students who would go on to play important roles in his life. One was Dorothy Cantor, a talented artist in her own right who later became


his wife in 1950. The other was a somewhat quiet and shy young man from Pittsburgh named Andrew Warhola. (After modifying his name slightly, Andy Warhol went on to become the iconic pop artist of the 20th century.)

Immediately following graduation in 1949, the Pearlsteins and Warhol moved to New York and rented a tenement apartment together on St. Mark's Place on the Lower East Side. The following summer, Pearlstein returned to school on the G.I. bill, earning a degree in art history, and he and Dorothy went on to live in various apartments on the Lower East Side before settling in the Upper West Side in 1963 following the birth of their third child.

The Evolution of Pearlstein

Following his early commercial work of graphic design, Philip's subsequent career built upon his commitment to the realistic representation of landscapes, objects and the human body. A Fullbright Hays Fellowship enabled him to return to Italy for a year to study and paint landscapes, after which he taught at Pratt Institute in Brooklyn and for one year as a visiting critic at Yale University. From 1963-1988, he was professor and then distinguished professor emeritus at Brooklyn College. To this day he remains a prolific painter, completing 6-8 large canvasses per year that are regularly featured in his shows at the Betty Cuningham Gallery in Chelsea.

The Pearlsteins have had their home in Highland Lakes for more than 15 years, and they—along with their three children and two grandchildren—continue to come here to enjoy the tranquility, natural beauty, and company of special friends in our community.

Undertaking A Home Improvement Project General Contractor (part 2 of 6)

Be your own General Contractor: Why not be the GC and hire subcontractors? This can be a good idea if you know what you are doing and have the time to supervise the work and possibly step-in to complete tasks not covered by a sub. Be sure to review all contracts and understand which sub is doing what, when, and where. Get references. A sub that slows down the project may create havoc for everyone else. How will add-ons and change orders be handled? You will need to be available in a timely fashion to answer questions, schedule work and inspections, and pay the subs. Homeowner's insurance may not be adequate, be sure you and everyone involved have insurance.

Hire a General Contractor: If you choose to work with a GC, find a qualified person. Ask friends, check out trucks working in the area, ask your architect. The person doing the work must be skilled, experienced, able to manage resources (people, materials, time, money), and have problem solving capabilities. Talk to them about your project, similar experiences, timing, and get references. Be sure to discuss the type and amount of insurance they carry. Are they available when you want the work done, or can you wait until they are available?

Boat Dock Committee

Members are reminded to put their boats in their assigned location on the new polyethylene docks by July 7. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of your assigned space. About Changes in Your Recorded Deed

In planning changes to your ownership of property that would be reflected in the recorded Deed, contacting the Club Office before you do so for guidance is advisable and will eliminate any misunderstandings.

The Club's By-Laws, in part, define Active Members as those who own property in Highland Lakes. When persons take title to property in Highland Lakes when they do not own other Highland Lakes property at that time, even when they join in the ownership of property with someone who currently owns property in Highland Lakes, they automatically become an active member and are required to pay the Initiation Fee. If you are considering adding anyone to your Deed, a wife, parent, child, friend, etc., please be aware of these By-Law requirements.

Sometimes members form a living or family trust as part of their estate planning. However, even this type of trust is a different, and therefore new, owner of property, and the payment of the Initiation Fee is required.

Pickleball Paddles Soften Sound

The growth of pickleball in Highland Lakes has created opportunities for all of us to learn more about this exciting sport. In this process we have learned that quieter paddles can be used without reducing the fun of the game and the play of the paddles. As a result, HLCC has instituted two new regulations regarding the use of paddles.

The first is that all paddles purchased for use on HLCC pickle ball courts must be selected from the Sun City Grand "Green Zone" paddle list that can be found at this website: http://pball.grandpickleball.org/ paddlerule.pdf. These paddles were tested by Acoustics Group, Inc. and found to be the quietest paddles on the market. The only paddles approved in addition to those on this list are the "Venom" by Pickleball Specialties (http://www.pickleballspecialties.com/) and the "Vortex".

In order that Club members can try some of these "Green Zone" paddles, the Club has purchased five that were recommended by Pickleball Central, one of the leading suppliers of pickleball equipment. These demo paddles are available on Sunday mornings from 9 am -12 pm, and Monday and Tuesday evenings from 6 pm - 8 pm.

The other regulation is that paddles previously purchased by members that are not in the "Green Zone" list will have to be dampened with "quiet pickleball pads" which will be supplied by HLCC.. These pads, when tested by HLCC members, were found to significantly reduce the noise of the ball striking the paddle without affecting the play of the paddle. If you have purchased one or more paddles prior to 1/1/14, please contact Bill Beardsley by email (trustee2@hlcc.org) or phone at (973) 764-7730 to arrange to get the pads provided by the Club.

Club Beach Rules

*Do not enter the water if you are experiencing or recovering from diarrhea or have had any signs or symptoms of a gastrointestinal (stomach) disease in the past seven days.

*All children in diapers must wear plastic pants with snug fitting elastic waist and leg bands. Do not wash out soiled diapers in the bathing water.

*Children should be encouraged to use the restroom before entering the water. Immediately report any "accidents" you observe in the bathing waters to a lifeguard.

*No animals, except for service animals, shall be allowed in the swimming pool, wading pool, hot tub, or spa area, dressing rooms, or other parts of the enclosure.

*Glass containers shall be prohibited in food and drink areas.

*Conduct which endangers the safety and comfort of others shall be prohibited.

*Outdoor bathing shall be prohibited during an electrical storm.

*Persons suspected of being under the influence of drugs or alcohol shall be prohibited from entering the water.

*No motorized vehicles, except emergency and maintenance vehicles shall be permitted in the bathing area during its use.

*No boating, water skiing, sailboating, windsurfing, scuba diving, or surfboarding shall be permitted in the swimming and bathing area while in use.

*Rope drops shall not be permitted except those licensed and inspected by the Department of Community Affairs pursuant to N.J.S.A. 5:3-31 through 55.

Voting Board Adopts Revised Rules for the Storage of Boats

VOTING BOARD

The Voting Board, with considerable input from the volunteers serving on the Boat and Dock Committee, adopted extensive changes on May 16, 2014 to Club Rule 24 that addresses the storage and use of Club lands, boat racks and docks for boat storage. These changes were necessitated by the use of boating facilities by members not in good standing, members who fail to remove their boats from docks and boat racks in the fall, members who leave boats tied up to trees, etc., and those who disregard the boat lottery system for assigned space.

With an investment of nearly \$400,000 in new docks in the past twelve months, these rules also prohibit any modification, drilling, etc. and establish requirements for how boats are to be moored to the new docks.

Rule 24: These Rules, in six parts, constitute the Club's Rules pertaining to the storage of boats, kayaks, windsurfers, etc. on Club lands, boat racks and docks.

A. HOLD HARMLESS: The member agrees to indemnify and hold the Club harmless from any injury, damage or loss resulting from the use and storage of the member's boat anywhere on Club property, including but not limited to lands, docks and boat racks. The member, by keeping their boat on Club lands, docks or boat racks, acknowledges that the Club shall not be responsible for any injury, damage or loss whatsoever resulting from the removal, transport and storage of the boat, and use of the Club's lands, docks and boat racks.

B. IMPROPER STORAGE: Improper storage is defined as storage on lands owned by the Club other than on docks and boat racks, storage anywhere on Club properties without a current membership permit, and storage in violation of Rule 24 (C.), (D.) and/or (E.) below. Boats improperly stored will be removed to storage immediately.

C. STORAGE ON DOCKS and RACKS AFTER OCTOBER 15: All boats must be removed from Club docks not later than October 15 of each year. In alternating years, all boats must be removed from boat racks by October 15, as determined by the Boat and Dock Committee and as published in the Newsette. Boats stored after October 15 in violation of this Rule will be removed to storage immediately.

D. UNAUTHORIZED USE OF SPACE ON ASSIGNED DOCKS: Space on certain Club docks is restricted to assigned use only. These docks are located at Club Park, Comet Row, Eckhart Sailing Center, Beach 3, Beach 4, and such other, future locations as may be authorized by the Voting Board. Docks subject to this assigned space requirement are marked with appropriate signs. Dock space assignments are managed by the Boat and Dock Committee upon receipt of applications from members in good standing and are assigned by the committee through the use of a lottery system and other methods. Boats not authorized by the committee on these docks will be removed to storage immediately.

E. DOCK MODIFICATIONS AND UNCOATED WIRE PROHIBITED: Members may not drill holes in any dock or fasten any device without the authorization of the Boat and Dock Committee. Only ropes, chain and plastic coated wire are authorized to attach a boat to a dock. Uncoated wire is specifically prohibited. Members are responsible for all damages caused by unauthorized drilling or fastening to the dock or excessive wear or chafing caused by the use of unauthorized attachment methods. Boats stored on docks in violation of this Rule will be removed to storage immediately.

F. REMOVAL TO STORAGE, PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS: Boats, kayaks, windsurfers, etc. of members stored in violation of these Rules shall be removed to storage, and will be subject to a special assessment of \$100.00, and a daily storage charge of \$5.00, calculated from the date the boat was removed to storage up to November 15, when a special winter storage fee of \$250.00 will be imposed. After June 15, a disposal fee of \$250.00 will be imposed. Boats may not be retrieved between November 15 and April 15. Members whose boats are identifiable through the boating permit shall be provided notice by regular and certified mail that the boat has been removed to storage. The Club may, in its sole discretion, elect to acquire title to any boat that has been determined to be abandoned, in compliance with the "Abandoned Vessels Disposition Law," N.J.S.A. 12:7C-7 et seq. (Amended September 23, 2009).

Water Safety News

Due to regulations from the NJ State Board of Health, all children in cloth or disposable diapers must wear plastic pants on top of their diapers. This includes Little Swimmers and Swimpers. Disposable swimpants are now available in the diaper aisle in the grocery store. The trim, unisex style can be worn alone or under swimsuits. Keep in mind; however, that the swim diaper must be covered by plastic if using the swimming pants with the plastic pant overlay and remind folks not to rinse a baby's bottom or soiled diaper in our lakes either. We must work to keep our lakes as clean and beautiful as possible. Everyone must help. Keeping our lakes clean and healthy is a priority.

BEACH VISITORS: Please make sure when you pick a spot on the sand that all of your belongings (this includes; chairs, blankets, coolers, umbrellas etc.) are NOT in front of the lifeguard stand. CIGARETTE SMOKERS: Please clear your cigarette butts from the sand at the beaches. Small children crawl on the sand and will pick up everything they can and place it in their mouth. It is not the responsibility of our maintenance staff or the lifeguards to pick up after you. Please help keep our beaches clean!!!

DOG OWNERS TAKE NOTE: Please take note that dogs are prohibited on the beaches both during the day and on off hours. Many have been spotted and we would like to keep our beaches as nice and clean as possible. Thank you.

GARBAGE CANS: After lifeguards are off duty, please make sure that all garbage lids are securely placed back on garbage cans when leaving the beaches for the evening.

SICK CHILDREN: If your child gets sick and vomits in the lake, please get a pail to scoop up whatever you can. Don't

swish it around in the water. You can dump the contents in the garbage, but please drain some of the water before doing so.

BALLS AT THE BEACH: Each beach has an example of the type of ball that is allowed in the water. If you do not have the one we have approved, you will not be permitted to use it. You may borrow one of ours for a short time while you are on the beach. Please return it to the guards when you are done.

RESPECT YOUR LIFEGUARDS: Please listen to the lifeguards. They are there to help keep you and our members safe.

GRILLS ON THE BEACH: Propane grills are ONLY permitted on Beaches 3 & 5 and ONLY in the grassy area by the picnic tables. They are not allowed on any other beaches at any time.



Ahoy sailors! It's time again to think sailing and tube storage. As always, Junior fleet racing sailors have the first right of refusal for the 15 tube storage system at the Eckhart Sailing Center (ESC). JUNIOR SAILORS and/or their parents need to email me to request a tube at 4burufam@ warwick.net or call to reserve a tube for this season. I will confirm active junior sailors with the junior fleet captain, email you the release form to sign/return and assign your tube number. Any remaining tubes not assigned to juniors will be available to the other fleets docked at ESC. Here are the basic rules for review to use the tubes:

1. Do not put wet sails in the tubes. Dry sails only.

2. Junior sailors have first right of refusal due to parent transportation considerations.

3. Lock and combination information must be provided on the form to Club via fleet captains and S. Buruchian

4. No wet items of any kind shall be placed in tube.

5. Only HL racing fleet sailors can utilize tubes.

6. Only non-lakefront members can use this option.

7. Only one set of sails with spars per tube.

8. Storage is only during the sail racing season. No year-round storage.

9. When Club docks go in water and are taken out, so must your sails!

10. Any abuse of the tubes for feits your rights to use them.
