# From the President's Desk

The main business of the Voting Board in September was fiscal. The FY 2015 Operating Fund Budget and Dues and Assessment Schedule were passed. The budgeted expenses for 2015 have decreased, but unfortunately so have revenues, resulting in a 2.2% increase in dues. Why? The budget anticipates only 1700 dues paying cabin owners and 50 dues paying lot owners. Fewer members are staying current on their dues, which adversely affects those who do. Let me remind and assure you that the Club will always get every dollar due to us, plus interest and attorneys' fees, no matter how long it takes, and without compromise.

The new fiscal year also brings in the reorganization for the Trustees, including a new Chair and Vice-Chair. Three trustees are leaving us after a combined 15 years of service to the Club. We thank Steve Amato, outgoing Chairman, Jim Kensek, and Lou Iannucci for their thoughtful input on all Club issues. Their dedication over the years assures us that their service to the Club will continue even though their terms as trustees has ended. We also will be welcoming three new trustees, Lisa Entwhistle, Russ Strube, and Roy Wherry. We thank them for their willingness to serve and look forward to their input.

Squeeze's Glenn Tilbrook at Seckler Stage on Oct. 24

Known best as the co-founding front man of British pop band Squeeze, Glenn Tilbrook brings a stunning array of musical gifts to the table wherever he goes. While Squeeze's success in the U.S. may have never correlated with the band's undeniable catalog of topnotch songs (including hits like "Another Nail in My Heart," "Black Coffee in Bed," "Tempted," and "Pulling Mussels," to name just a few), there's no mistaking the band's place in the pop pantheon, and no overlooking Tilbrook's many abundant talents. all covered, and he's bringing the inimitable goods to Seckler Stage on Oct. 24 for an intimate, solo acoustic performance to close out his North American tour prior to kicking off a tour of England and Scotland in November with longtime Squeeze songwriting partner Chris Difford. Fans here in Highland Lakes can expect Tilbrook to showcase songs off of his fifth solo record, the idiosyncratic Happy Ending, as well as Chestnuts from the Squeeze catalog.

Tilbrook recently sat down with the Newsette to chat about the many hats he wears as a solo artist, the leader of a side-project called the Fluffers, and, of course, the re-united Squeeze.

**HL:** How is your approach to songwriting different as a solo artist? Do you think to yourself, "I'm writing for Glenn" vs. "I'm writing with Chris Difford for Squeeze?"

**Tilbrook:** No, I don't. Although to be fair, before I started doing Happy Ending I knew I didn't want there to be any electric guitars or drums, and that's the first time I approached an album like that. I found that approach focused my mind differently on how the songs would turn out, but for the writing of songs, you just do the best you can at any point. This album was interspersed with writing for Squeeze, as well, so a lot of the material came from the same time period.

**HL:** Do you have a different approach when you're writing by yourself than when you're writing with Chris or someone else? Obviously you're not encumbered by someone's opinion

# Glenn Tilbrook Continued From Page 1

on how you write a melody or a chorus, for instance?

**Tilbrook:** The main difference is that on Happy Ending I wrote all the lyrics, whereas in Squeeze Chris is the main lyricist. I've inherited the way that I write from writing with him, though. I always write lyrics first, but the difference on this record is that I wrote the music on half of the tunes, and the other half I gave to people like Chris Braide, who I've written with a lot, and Chris McNally, and Simon Hansen, who is in Squeeze. So in a way I'm pretending to be Chris Difford.

**HL:** I have always been a fan of the 1950s jazz records where the premise of the record was that two artists "met" to create music together... If you could choose who you'd be thrown into a room with to create music, who would it be, and why?

**Tilbrook:** That's a really good question... I'm sort of doing it now with Chris Difford. But as far as someone I haven't worked with, the person I love most in the world is Kate Tempest (www.katetempest.co.uk/audio). She is a poet first and foremost, she just released her first album, Everybody Down. At certain periods in my life, there have been albums that have been so important to me, that have absolutely shaken up everything I had thought about music. This is the first one I've heard in that category for 12 years... I would love to work with her.

**HL:** What was the one that jumped out at you 12 years ago? **Tilbrook:** The Avalanches' only album, Since I Left You (www.youtube.com/watch?v=gRM1S6Jno8A). And that was for an entirely different reason. It was sonically and musically all based on samples. It's a fantastic album, just

groundbreaking. They released one record, they didn't get sample clearance for a lot of the stuff they used, and they've been bogged down ever since paying back people probably what are extortionist amounts of money for nicking their records... they released that one album, but it's staggering.

**HL:** I vividly remember singing along with you through Squeeze's East Side Story back when I was in high school. Who did you sing along with back before Squeeze became successful, and who makes you sing along today?

**Tilbrook:** At that point, and still now, the Beatles. On my summer holiday, I played all of the Beatles albums, which isn't something I do very often, but I really listened to them as if they were new records. There has not been a better group... they are the group all others must try to become to produce great lasting work. They were of their time, and they moved with the times, properly and quickly. Most other bands' records sound essentially very similar for years and years on end.

**HL:** Do you think Squeeze will be nominated for entry into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame? Do you care?

**Tilbrook:** I've been hearing rumors about it, but it hasn't happened yet. I received an Ivor Novello award for outstanding contribution to British music in 2008, and it was the first award I've ever received. I still maintain that you have to have your own sense of purpose and drive so that awards aren't necessary, but when I got that award I tell you it felt very nice, it's a mark of respect from contemporaries so that's always pleasant.



## Family Day, 2014

Boken had a time of 39.40 and S. Zimmerman, L. McNulty, P. McNulty and R. Zimmerman came in with a time of 39.16.

Pat Eckhart did an excellent job in running this race and the triathlon, which started after the quadrathalon was done. The team of N. Berutti, B. Stoekel and E. Loughren finished in first place with a time of 5.8. Coming in second was J. Tze, J. Tze and K.Gunning at 5.41 and third was R. Wisniewski, G. Wisniewski and J. Boken at 6.03. Special thanks to Pete and Nicole for their help and to all of the lifeguards who were there.

Over the past few years that I have been doing these races, I have always admired the sportsmanship of the contestants in these races. The children and young adults have always been very dedicated, open to something new, and determined to finish no matter what. #### Boat Removal Notice from Boat Docks and Racks

#### Remove boats from all docks by October 15

Notice to Boaters: All boats on Club docks <u>must be</u> <u>removed by October 15</u>. Any boat removed by the Club may subject the member to an assessment and storage fees in accordance with the revised rules adopted by the Voting Board. Any boat that cannot be identified through a Club permit, NJ registration, or hull identification number will be declared abandoned and disposed of in accordance with New Jersey law.

The Boat and Dock Committee will again inspect and repair boat racks this fall. The program requires the removal of all boats stored on boat racks on the western side of Highland Lakes by October 15, 2014. Once the racks and area are clear, maintenance and landscaping can be performed late in the fall and in the early spring.

As we all know, many boats appear abandoned or otherwise unused. These boats are taking up valuable space that could be better used by members interested in boating. Furthermore, clearing these racks of abandoned/unused boats avoids the expense of adding additional boat racks, and taking over more land. Lastly, it eliminates the excuse that members have that there is "no rack space and storing my boat on the ground is the only choice I have."

All freeways on the lakes west of the main lake are affected by this notice in addition to the following locations

where boats are stored on racks:

- Lake 5 Pocasset Road Beach 7 area
- Lake 1 Lakeside Drive Beach 1 area
- Main Lake western shore areas as follows:
- Club Park
- Comet Row
- Eckhart Sailing Center
- Freeway at Winetka Road
- Freeway at Wiscasset Road
- Freeway at Oneota Road
- Freeway at stream crossing south of Oneota Road
- Freeway south of Ocala Road
- Freeway north of Monadnock Road
- Freeway at Lakeside Drive East near spillway


All boats stored at these locations must be removed by October 15. Please contact the Boat and Dock committee or the Club if you anticipate any difficulty in removal of your boat.

Once again we will be conducting a lottery in the spring for these spaces. Please remember to submit a completed 2015 boat dock application to be included in the lottery by March 15, 2015 in order to have an assigned boat slip by the drawing in April. No members, including **grandfathered** members, are exempt from completing a form each and every year.

## Senior Luncheon and Meeting





A few weeks after submitting your application David Zuidema's office will contact you directly to schedule an appointment. Their number is 1-888-901-7392, but to get the discount, you must submit your application form to the club office. If you have a standard, easily accessible, 1,000 gallon tank the discounted price will be \$150 plus NJ sales tax. To obtain this price you (or your personally named representative):


- 1. Must be available to meet with the pumper at your house during normal business hours
- 2. Must know where your tank is located
- 3. Must not require digging services by the pumper to access the tank lid. (Extra charges will apply for any digging services)
- 4. Must be prepared to pay the driver directly upon successful completion of the job.

Note: There may be additional charges for pumping tanks that are difficult to locate or hard to pump due to steep or rough terrain near your tank. Also, if it is recommended by the driver that your septic system is in need of any repairs, those repairs would not be included in the discounted pumping price. When the driver arrives, and before any pumping begins, we recommend that you discuss your specific situation with the driver.

We feel certain that David's people will treat you fairly and honestly; however, in the unlikely event that you have any concerns, please feel free to contact me directly at 973 764-6869. Based on the pleasant experiences of those who participated last year, I do not expect many phone calls.

Thanks again for helping to keep our lakes clean.




