At the October 17, 2014 regular Voting Board meeting the trustees elected Brian Morton as their Chairman, and Jim Boss as their Vice Chairman. Our thanks and congratulations to them for accepting these positions.

The Voting Board approved two motions this month. The first motion accepted the Proposal from TilCon of New Jersey for road paving and related work on Shawondasee Road, Acquanonk Road, Onteora Road, Kewaunee Road, Aniwa Road, Aqueduct Road and Biglow Lane in the amount of \$190,477. We thank the Road Committee for their efforts and recommendations. The second motion authorized Our Lady of Fatima Church to conduct a "Walk for the Hungry" which was on October 19, 2014 around the Main Lake for the benefit of Harvest House.

# Staying Safe in Bear Country

Black bear getting creative

Most Highland Lakers have seen their share of black bears during the past few years. Typically, we're able to live together peacefully, avoiding each other whenever possible, and grudgingly picking up the spilled garbage when we haven't secured it correctly. A tragic encounter in September between a bear and a young hiker in West Milford's Apshawa Preserve, however, reminds us how important it is to think about how to safely live with our local wildlife.

For the most part, guidelines for bear safety focus on using common sense. The most important advice from the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) focuses on keeping food away from bears. Yogi Bear's nemesis Ranger Smith knew this, and frequently repeated his refrain: "Please, don't feed the bears!" The DEP expands on that, and makes the following recommendations:

- Practice safety with outdoor trash, using bear-safe receptacles, not putting trash on the curb until the morning of pick-up, and washing receptacles regularly to get rid of odors.
- Pet food attracts bears as much as people food. Don't store pet food outdoors, and bring in outdoor feeding containers after they've been used.
- Clean outdoor grills and utensils thoroughly after each



sealed containers so the odor does not reach bears.

Recently, bears have gone beyond seeking food in outdoor areas, and have gone inside local houses. The DEP suggests that residents keep windows and doors closed when you are cooking or out of your home to prevent this from happening. If a bear does enter your home, it is likely to be frightened if it begins to feel trapped. Open as many doors as possible to help it find its way out, and make sure that there is a clear escape route.

If you find yourself face-to-face (or nose-to-snout) with a bear, the most important thing to do is find a safe way to get yourself out of the situation. Black bears tend to be intimidated by loud noises, so try banging pots, using an air horn, or yelling. You should also back away slowly and avoid direct eye contact with the bear. A bear will react to running by giving chase, so do not run away from the bear. Parents should make sure that children know how to avoid bear encounters, and may want to come up with a Family Bear Plan. ## Club Thrives Through New Ideas

During the public comment section at our most recent board meeting several members expressed concern about the concert series that was begun this year. Some members suggested that the series was never discussed at board meetings prior to its implementation. Another wondered if the series was permitted just because it was a board member who first conceived of the idea. There was concern expressed about the way that the board had allocated money to buy the equipment and general displeasure about the installation of that equipment in the clubhouse. Several members were upset that these events are open to the public.

Discussions about the concert series, just like all decisions made by the board, began at a board workshop last fall. They continued openly throughout the year as steps were taken to implement the series. News of our progress was shared with the membership repeatedly in the Newsette starting with the Presidents Column in December 2013 (other articles and announcements appeared in February, March, May, two issues in July, three in August and again in last month's edition.)

The whole idea of the concert series was initially conceived by members Louise Staley, Randy Staley, and Michael Gelfand. They all share a common background in the music industry, and had been talking about how great it would be to have critically acclaimed musicians and comedians on tour in and around the New York metropolitan area perform at our clubhouse. Michael, who was chairman of the Board of Trustees at the time, started presenting their idea to the board with the central goal being that it would draw people into Club activities who don't ordinarily participate – the crowd between the ages of 20 and 50 who are busy juggling the responsibilities of raising kids, holding down a job and maintaining a home.

Michael went on to explain that Louise had been—and continues to be—the longstanding booking agent for CBGB, a world famous NYC music venue and iconic brand, and that she was willing to lend her talents and industry relationships toward developing the series. Being within reasonable driving distance of several metropolitan areas put Highland Lakes in the position of being a viable venue destination for performers who are on tour in nearby Hartford, Manhattan, and Philadelphia, he explained, as long as we had the sound equipment needed to support acts of this caliber.

Discussions that first night last October led to a presentation the following month at our board workshop from Randy, Louise's husband, who had been a professional musician and recording engineer for many years. He was able to explain to the board what would be needed to get this idea off the ground, and both he and Michael tried to roughly estimate what type of investment the Club would need to make in the equipment to bring their idea to life. This led to a full discussion where board members were

free to ask questions and weigh the potential pros and cons openly. Prior to the next board meeting, Randy and Michael painstakingly researched and auditioned the itemized list of equipment they needed and solicited competitive bids from potential vendors. In November the concert series was unanimously approved by the board. (Michael abstained from voting.) At the January, 2014 board meeting, Randy and Michael presented the budget request, and after careful deliberation, the voting board voted unanimously (except for Michael's abstention) to allocate the funds needed to purchase the equipment. Through many subsequent months the group worked closely with our general manager Jack McLaughlin to gear up.

The series kicked off back in early July with a soft-launch to test drive the new gear when we welcomed the Chris McNally Project to the Seckler Stage. Since then Club members have enjoyed performances from Chris Harford's Band of Changes, the Avalon Jazz Band, and most recently, Glenn Tilbrook.

Each new act brings music lovers from throughout the community to our clubhouse to enjoy a wonderful night of music. Tickets are first made available to Club members at a discounted rate and then as the show date comes closer, ticket sales are open to the general public. If still available, tickets are sold to the general public in order to supplement the cost of paying artists. As the series takes hold, funds originally spent to purchase the sound equipment will be replenished, and what we as a community are left with is another fantastic activity for people to come out and enjoy for a fraction of what it would cost to see these very same acts at city showcases.

Over the years our community has thrived on new ideas that are brought to fruition by a group of interested and dedicated members. Way back when, that is how the swim team got started, how our sports program blossomed, and how functions like Family Day, the Goodwill Fund and the Goodwill Fund Community Yard Sale, Sunday breakfasts and Lakeside Café became a part of our community fabric. The refurbishing of our freeways is another example of how ideas from Club members take hold and shape a new reality for all of us to enjoy. Had it not been for Barry Abrams, a devoted trustee who spoke up at a meeting about his interest in beautifying the public areas around the lake, the benches that have been installed and the clean-ups that have taken place might never have gotten started. Barry's legacy lives on through the efforts of others in our community who took hold of the idea and continued Barry's vision and dedication. That's the beauty of community -working together to build upon fresh ideas keeps a place vibrant and moving forward. Check the Club's website for new concerts as talent is booked and if you haven't done so already, sign up for e-blasts from the Club to receive notices of upcoming events.

## Septic Tank Pumping Discount Program

#### **Continues in 2014**

The Ecology Committee of Highland Lakes is happy to announce that our very successful and popular group pumping discount program offered by David Zuidema will continue in 2014. If this is the year to get your septic system pumped, please complete the following registration form and return it to the club office at your convenience. We suggest pumping your tank every three years. This simple and inexpensive action on your part will not only help protect our lake watershed, but will increase the life of your septic system.

A few weeks after submitting your application David Zuidema's office will contact you directly to schedule an appointment. Their number is 1-888-901-7392, but to get the discount, you must submit your application form to the club office. If you have a standard, easily accessible, 1,000 gallon tank the discounted price will be \$150 plus NJ sales tax. To obtain this price you (or your personally named representative):

- 1. Must be available to meet with the pumper at your house during normal business hours
- 2. Must know where your tank is located
- 3. Must not require digging services by the pumper to access the tank lid. (Extra charges will apply for any digging services)
- 4. Must be prepared to pay the driver directly upon successful completion of the job.

Note: There may be additional charges for pumping tanks that are difficult to locate or hard to pump due to steep or rough terrain near your tank. Also, if it is recommended by the driver that your septic system is in need of any repairs, those repairs would not be included in the discounted pumping price. When the driver arrives, and before any pumping begins, we recommend that you discuss your specific situation with the driver.

We feel certain that David's people will treat you fairly and honestly; however, in the unlikely event that you have any concerns, please feel free to contact me directly at 973 764-6869. Based on the pleasant experiences of those who participated last year, I do not expect many phone calls.



## Brush Removal Along Roadways

During Security's patrols, certain properties have not trimmed the bushes and trees that are growing into the roadways, and that impairs pedestrian and vehicle safety. Motorists, walkers, and bicyclists are unable to have a clear line of sight due to these conditions. Notices are now being delivered by Highland Lakes Security to property owners requesting their cooperation in cutting and trimming back excess vegetation.

Work crews from Highland Lakes have begun trimming and brush removal along Club roadways and at intersections. Failure to trim vegetation and brush along your property lines leaves the Club with no choice but to trim as necessary. Due to limited resources, our efforts are not designed to landscape along the roadway, but to prevent our return for a few years by completely removing the vegetation encroaching into the Club's right-of-way.

Brush removal is an expense of the Club that can be reduced through the efforts of homeowners who remove and trim their bushes and trees along their property lines. Your cooperation in maintaining the vegetation along your property adjoining Club roadways is appreciated.

## **An Important Notice to Our Members**

#### **Vehicles will be towed during Snow and Ice Operations!**

As a result of some difficulties in past winters, the Voting Board adopted a revision to its rules governing parking on the private roads of Highland Lakes Country Club and Community Association during snow and ice operations. All members are urged to become familiar with the Rule below. It will be strictly enforced.

#### Rule No. 16 of the Club's Rules and Regulations, adopted April 22, 1994:

Whenever snow has fallen or roads become covered with ice and the accumulation is such that it covers the roadway, an emergency shall exist and no vehicle shall be parked on any roadway or portion thereof. This parking prohibition shall remain in effect after the precipitation has ceased until the roads have been plowed and/or sanded sufficiently and to the extent that parking will not interfere with the normal flow of traffic

Any unattended vehicle in violation of this Rule will be deemed to be parked without the consent of the Club and may be summonsed and towed in accordance with N.J.S.A. 39:4-56.6.

Your cooperation is needed to make the winter as easy as possible on your neighbors and the Club. Thank you.
