Celebrate Earth Day at the Lake

Join us on Saturday, April 27, to celebrate Earth Day at the Lake, sponsored by the Ecology Committee. This event offers Highland Lakes members a chance to participate in a day that promises to be both informative, fun and fulfilling. This year we will focus on native trees that help us sustain a healthy ecosystem in our beautiful lake community.

The day will begin, as it has for many years, with our semi-annual roadside clean-up led by Barbara Jaggi. This activity brings people of all ages together with one goal in mind...to beautify our roadways and ultimately protect our lakes by picking up litter and debris. Bring your clean-up crew to the Clubhouse at 10 am to identify your clean-up location and pick up gear to assist your efforts.

Afterwards, around 12 noon, organizers are urging all crews, as well as those in our community who were not able to participate in the morning clean-up, to come back to the Clubhouse for an afternoon that will start with lunch and end with some presentations about caring for our tree population. Remember to bring your kids to help with clean-up and participate in craft making from 12 to 2 pm led by Karen Dolci.

At 1 pm, our main presentation will be brought to us by Kevin Rodriguez from Bartlett Tree Experts. Kevin will be talking with us about the importance of native trees to our lake ecosystem, how to identify native, non-native, and invasive trees, along with specific actions we can take in our yards. After the presentation, Kevin will lead us in a demonstration of caring for tree saplings. We are hoping to have tree saplings for attendees to plant in their yards.

Our final activity will be a guided tour of the rain garden located at the Clubhouse. Jason Tribiano from the Conservation Club will be your guide and will focus on trees and shrubs as most plants in the garden probably will not have sprouted yet.

This event is free and open to all Club members with an interest in educating themselves on how best to beautify our yards without negatively impacting our lakes and wildlife. It's a wonderful way to celebrate Earth Day. Please register your intention to attend by emailing us at ecology@hlcc.org so that we will be able to plan accordingly. See you there!

Exciting news! As you may have heard, a dedicated group has been working with members, committees, and multiple voting boards to assess our community's Clubhouse infrastructure needs. The goal was to investigate what improvements we can and should make. All agree that our Clubhouse is our second most important asset, preceded only by our lakes - and it's time for needed upgrades. Our last major Clubhouse improvements were completed over 25 years ago. The Clubhouse houses meetings, parties, dances, crafts, activities, fundraisers, and more throughout the year, and our members make new memories every day at these events. The Clubhouse is showing the wear and tear of its frequent use.

I am thrilled to announce that the planning and evaluation work has come to fruition in what we have dubbed "Clubhouse 2025: Needed Changes for Generations to Come." This plan includes much-needed improvements and additional upgrades that will benefit our members directly. The following fact sheet is an overview of our plan. It is the culmination of years of effort and input from members, special groups of HLCC committees, and architectural consultants who reviewed our existing

At its most recent meeting, your Board of Trustees discussed the initial plan. It approved the most important

step - to bring these conceptual plans to you, the members, for review and input throughout the spring and a community vote on the project this summer.

Our lake community is known far and wide for being the best. The best scientists in the country guide our lake management program, other communities envy our financial approach and admire our varied sports and activities, and our swim team and sailing programs are known for providing the best invitationals and regattas in their categories. Your Board of Trustees believes that you, our members, are why Highland Lakes is "The Best" and deserve an upgraded Clubhouse. It is time to take care of our Clubhouse - our home.

Town hall style meetings and presentations to various groups and committees began in March. We will show the revised detailed drawings and plans throughout the spring, with a community vote scheduled to be held this summer.

I want to express my most sincere thanks to all who have offered valued input, suggestions, and advice and encourage anyone with questions to reach out to me or any board member for more information. The dates have been set for the town hall meetings: Sunday, April 21 at 1 pm and Tuesday, May 21, at 7 pm. The membership will have an opportunity to vote on the plan at a Special Meeting which is scheduled to take place on Sunday, May 26, 2024.

About Changes in your Recorded Deed

In planning changes to your ownership of property that would be reflected in the recorded Deed, contacting the Club Office before you do so for guidance is advisable and will eliminate any misunderstandings.

The Club's By-Laws, in part, define Active Members as those who own property in Highland Lakes. When persons take title to property in Highland Lakes when they do not own other Highland Lakes property at that time, even when they join in the ownership of property with someone who currently owns property in Highland Lakes, they automatically become an active member and are required to pay the Initiation Fee. If you are considering adding anyone to your Deed, a wife, parent, child, friend, etc., please be aware of these By-Law requirements.

Sometimes members form a living or family trust as part of their estate planning. However, even this type of trust is a different, and therefore new, owner of property, and the payment of the Initiation Fee is required.



With the weather beginning to get better, many of us are beginning to get the itch to wet a line. We are fortunate enough to have many different kinds of fish in our lakes. This brings us to the subject of this article.

Due to the possibility of harmful mercury concentrations in some fish from naturally occurring

mercury in the native rock, the NJ Dept of Environmental Protection has provided guidance and recommended limits on the consumption of certain freshwater fish, with stricter guidelines for high-risk individuals.


Dinner at the Clubhouse

salads and maybe a few surprise items. Join us at 6 pm on the lawn for a pre-summer barbeque!






Get Creative for Art Show 2024

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

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


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Yoga and Meditation




