Springtime Delights Birdwatchers as Flocks Return to Highland Lakes

You can hear birds chirping all year around Highland Lakes, but spring really cranks up the volume. Robins and cardinals pick nest sites and yell challenges at intruders who violate their territories. Ducks and geese chatter along the waterfront, and red-winged blackbirds perch on cattails to sing sweetly.

But for Christine Alber, it was a flash of ivory, a jetblack head, and a splash of vibrant rosy red, that caught her attention — for life.

"I was walking around the lake and I saw a bird. I was like, oh my God, that's so amazing looking! It's so beautiful! I took a picture of it," she says, and went to look it up, thinking, "It must be so rare. And it was a male rose breasted grosbeak, one of the most common songbirds in the northeast! And I thought, are you serious?"

That was 15 years ago, and she was hooked. Alber's grown up living along the big lake here, and inherited her dad's love of hiking on woodland paths. This area is graced with watersheds and preserved wilderness and sits at the nexus of migratory routes that draw all kinds of birds.

"Most people think, you only ever see blue jays and cardinals and robins, that's all that's really around. And it's not true. There's so much variety around you," she explained. "You could just walk around the big lake and, and you'll get literally a ton of birds — everything from the eagles to small warblers."

Alber advises, bring along an illustrated guidebook, like Sibley's, and some decent binoculars. If you're willing to walk it, "We have an access point here in Highland Lakes, to the woods and to the overlook in Vernon. Only Highland Lakes members can park there at the very top of the mountain over Lake One, on Shomokin Road, that gives you access into Wawayanda." There's a trail there called the Highland Lakes Nest Trail. Along one of those trails, Alber spotted a spectacular little bird sporting a neon orange face — the Blackburnian Warbler.

A dedicated birdwatcher, Alber also spends hours online monitoring two eagles nests via remote cameras installed by the State of New Jersey (she won't say precisely where the nests are located.) Folks interested in bald eagles can check out the Duke Farms Eagle Cam at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=w_j90TWXti0 that livestreams a nest in Hillsborough.

For all its rich bird habitat, the Highland Lakes Country Club lacks a formal Birdwatchers Committee but Alber's keen to hatch a local group. Folks can also find experts at the Sussex County Birding Group and Orange County Audubon Society — which can offer info about seasonal migration events, including hawk watches (Mount Peter in Warwick and Sunrise Mountain in Sussex County.)

But you don't need to go that far, Alber says. She delights in a simple walk around the local lakes, and notes you might see an osprey, a great blue heron, a pileated woodpecker or a short-eared owl. Eastern phoebes peep and tufted titmice do a techno-pop rasp. A brilliant scarlet tanager might knock your socks off. Loads of apps can help you identify them all by sight and sound. Be quiet, but mindful — bears are awake, now.

Hungry bears poach birdseed — that's why officials discourage residents from setting up bird feeders. But Alber urges, plant native bushes like wild black cherry, and you'll end up hosting flocks of cedar waxwings.

For Alber, it's all a natural resource to guard, and to cherish: "I've walked all the roads in Highland Lakes, and it's never failed to show me birds."

About Changes in your Recorded Deed

In planning changes to your ownership of property that would be reflected in the recorded Deed, contacting the Club Office before you do so for guidance is advisable and will eliminate any misunderstandings.

The Club's By-Laws, in part, define Active Members as those who own property in Highland Lakes. When persons take title to property in Highland Lakes when they do not own other Highland Lakes property at that time, even when they join in the ownership of property with someone who currently owns property in Highland Lakes, they automatically become an active member and are required to pay the Initiation Fee. If you are considering adding anyone to your Deed, a wife, parent, child, friend, etc., please be aware of these By-Law requirements.

Sometimes members form a living or family trust as part of their estate planning. However, even this type of trust is a different, and therefore new, owner of property, and the payment of the Initiation Fee is required.

Pure, Uncomplicated Joy



Pure, Uncomplicated Joy is a mono print done with acrylic paint. The subject is flowers in a mason jar. What could be simpler or more joyful than that? A mono print is done by painting on a nonabsorbent surface, in this case yupo paper, with acrylic paint. While the paint is still wet, a piece of paper is placed on top and immediately removed, creating a mono print. It is a fast, spontaneous medium resulting in some surprises and interesting textures, and is a lot of fun to do.

It has been accepted into the 36th Annual Skylands Regional Juried Art Exhibition at the Sussex County Arts and Heritage Gallery, 133 Spring Street in Newton. The Exhibition runs from May 16, 2024, to June 13, 2024.

I enjoy being a part of the Highland Lakes Artists Group, a group of artists and creative people who share ideas and inspiration. We meet once a month at the clubhouse. 

Earth Day Celebration - Native Trees

This year's Earth Day event, hosted by the Ecology Committee, again offered members the opportunity to participate in an expanded Earth Day celebration with a roadside clean-up in the morning followed by lunch and a presentation in the afternoon. Members of all ages turned up for the morning clean-up, once again organized by Barbara Jaggi with assistance from a half-dozen volunteers. Vernon Township DPW provided vests, gloves and garbage bags and is scheduled to pick up the litter and garbage collected early this week. At noon, members returned to the Clubhouse for a lunch of sandwiches and wraps with side salads and dessert put together by Melissa Hardin, our new Recreation Manager, with the help of volunteers. There were also Earth Day related arts and crafts available for the children who attended organized by Karen Dolci.

A presentation by Kevin Rodriguez, from Bartlett Tree Experts, on the "Importance of Native Trees in a Lake Ecosystem" followed in the Lake Room. He discussed the many ways trees benefit our community and the importance of native trees as well as the threats to our trees from insects and disease and how best to care for them.

Kevin offered some keys actions we can take in our own yards to improve the tree ecosystem for us and our neighbors. These include:

- 1. Removing Invasive trees carefully
- 2. Planting native trees
- 3. Proper pruning of trees (alleviates need for spraying

- and treatments)
- 4. Mulching around trees but not up the trunk of the tree (mulch volcano)
- 5. Avoiding mechanical damage from landscape equipment
- 6. Protecting against deicing salts that may be necessary in winter
- 7. Taking soil samples so that you know what will thrive in your yard

After his presentation, Kevin gave a demonstration of caring for tree saplings. Three types of saplings (River Birch, Silver Maple, and White Flowering Dogwood) were provided by the Women's Auxiliary for members to take home and plant. Many thanks to Lorrayne and Tom Castiglione for organizing the sapling give-away. The day ended with a tour of the rain garden by Jason Tribiano.

Many thanks to all of the volunteers and staff who came together to make this day so successful. There is a lot of work that goes on behind the scenes to organize and prepare for events like these.

There's more to come! Join us on July 14 for our second annual Lake Appreciation Day. There will be lots to learn and plenty of fun to be had. Please mark your calendars!




