Get the Scoop and Connect with Your Community at the Annual Meeting

Sunday, August 18

Every year, on the third Sunday in August, the Annual Meeting of the membership is held in Highland Lakes. This year's Annual Meeting will occur on August 18, 2024, at 2 pm at the Clubhouse. Article IV of the Club's by-laws, available on the Club's website at hlcc.org, stipulates the rules for the Annual Meeting. The Article states the meeting date, that elections shall occur during the meeting, and that only Active Members in good standing can vote. An exact format is followed at each meeting which involves approving last year's minutes, reports from the Club president, treasurer, and general counsel, discussion of new business, and a public comment section. The Election of officers and trustees follows the portion of the meeting in which the floor is open to the membership. The Annual Meeting procedure is clearly stated in our by-laws, so we know how the meeting will go and can be sure it will be well run. But why else should we attend a two-hour meeting on a Sunday afternoon?

If you want to know what's up in Highland Lakes and get the exclusive scoop, or skinny from those in the know, come to the Annual Meeting. This is your opportunity to gain a deeper understanding of the Club's operations, the people behind the scenes, and the issues they're tackling. Come to learn who the players are and how the Club works.

If you want to participate in one of our largest community events, join the hundreds of members who gather annually to connect with their Association. At the meeting, you will hear from the officers and counsel in person and get the facts first-hand from the people doing the work. This is crucial as it helps us avoid the pitfalls of receiving misinformation on social media, ensuring that we make decisions based on the correct information. You can be an informed member who helps to dispel any negativity or correct any falsehoods that might be spreading online, thereby contributing to a more effective decision-making process within our community.

In addition to getting the facts, seeing and listening to the individuals who hold offices on the Voting Board helps us to learn about them. At the meeting, you can understand their knowledge of the issues and their dedication to Highland Lakes and its members. Remember that all members of the Voting Board are volunteers, and they're your neighbors, too. You can also get a sense of how much time your fellow members who volunteer to serve the community as officers and trustees of the Club sacrifice throughout the year. You're likely to be surprised!

Another important reason to attend the Annual Meeting is the opportunity to use your voice and vote for officers and/or trustees. Your vote is crucial in shaping the future of our community. This year, no officer positions are up for election. Officers are elected for three years; the next



election of officers will occur at the 2025 Annual Meeting. Trustees are also elected for a term of three years. Voting will occur for trustees in Sections 2, 6, 9, 10, and 11 this session. Section trustees are your primary conduit to ask questions, make suggestions, and communicate issues of concern in your geographic section of Highland Lakes to the Voting Board. Use your vote to choose who will represent your section for three years.

Be sure to read the bios of the people running for trustee in this and last week's Newsette to learn about the candidates. Even if you don't have an election in your section this year, you can see how the process works and be prepared for the next one. When asked why she attends the Annual Meeting, Cathy Kenny, a Highland Lakes member for over 30 years, responded, "It is my civic duty to attend the meeting and a chance to have a voice in the community." Voting is a privilege and an opportunity. Let's take advantage of the opportunity and let our voices be heard

A final reason to attend this year's meeting is to seize the chance to connect with your fellow Highland Lakers. Chat with the members in your section and meet your section trustee. Ask questions, present ideas, or voice your concerns during the public comments section of the meeting. Similarly, find out what is on other members' minds as they ask questions or comment during the open part of the meeting. The Board will do its best to answer members' questions; if they don't have an immediate answer, they'll follow up with you.

In the end, whichever reason compels you to mark your calendar for this year's Annual Meeting, know that your attendance is encouraged, welcomed and deeply appreciated. Come, connect with your community of Highland Lakes and leave feeling a sense of belonging that only comes from active participation.

Beach Water Testing Results

Below are the results of the most recent E. coli testing performed at the Club's beaches and swim lanes by Garden State Laboratories, Inc. Weekly tests are required by the State of New Jersey, and results must not exceed 320 organisms per 100 milliliters. All samples conformed to NJ State recreational bathing standards. Testing results are also reported by the lab to the Sussex County Department of Health.







HLCC Community Shines During an Amazing "B" Invitational

On Saturday July 27, the Highland Lakes Swim Team hosted another installment of its annual "B" Invitational swim meet. A beautiful, sunny day was the backdrop for a showcase of how amazing our lake community is. Prior to the arrival of the over 200 swimmers from 8 different teams, and during the entire 5-hour meet, it took nothing short of a herculean effort from a formidable army of volunteers to make the event a success. The remarkable people that make Highland Lakes so special and the spirit of volunteerism were on full display as everyone dove in headfirst to help!

Planning and prepping for the "B" happens several weeks in advance. The concessions team (Louise Staley, Christine Fleming, Bryan Fleming, Cathy Cefaloni, and Joey Cefaloni) plans out what food will be served, orders, and arranges the delivery and receipt of all food and beverages. The "B" Program team (Caitlyn Kutzman) starts soliciting advertisements, sponsorships, and arranges for the creation, printing, and putting together of the program. The entries coordinator, Barry Brantner, aggregates all the teams' entries and finalizes the meet program. The meet's chief judge and chair of officials, Jeanette Emmerich, assembles a team of trained officials (Maureen Cherichella, Eileen Brantner, Christine Fleming, Don Taylor, John Laudenberger, Caitlyn Kutzman, Brian Fisher, and Colleen Orso) who will enforce all USA Swimming rules and regulations along with junior volunteer officials' assistants Megan and Lauren Emmerich. The chair of timers, Lucelia Zamborlini, recruits a team of 36 timers to ensure fair and consistent reporting of results for every event. The officials' luncheon, an event that is highly touted in the Lakeland Swim Conference as setting the standard for swim meet luncheons, is organized by Nicole Puccio who has contributions and donations made by many HL families. The delicious dishes are enjoyed by over 50 of the meet's officials and coaches.

Then in the days leading up to the meet, the rubber really hits the road. Our chair





of facilities, Dennis Dalelio, organizes a facilities team (Tom Howes, Dominick Beninati, Don Taylor, Jonathan Laszloczky, Bret Reiser, Nick Elmo, Ed Mullen, Craig Bernier, Raymond Loughren, and Matt Vradenburg) to raise the marshalling tent, set-up the concessions tent, grill, tables, and other critical meet-related equipment. The concessions team (Christine Fleming, Bryan Fleming, Cathy Cefaloni, Cheryl Hastie, Clayton Hastie, and Matt Vradenburg) gets back at it in the kitchen prepping trays of pasta, meatballs, and breakfast items. Many of such activities happen late on Friday evening and as early as 6 am on Saturday morning.

Once Saturday morning arrives, it's all hands on-deck! The parking team (Rob Wisniewski, Craig Bernier, Randy Staley, Todd Wooten, Ray Mann, Pat Durkin, Steve Bednarick, and HL Maintenance) maneuvers dozens of cars into the Clubhouse parking lot, which would draw the envy of a world Tetris champion. The facilities team prepares the starting and timing systems while the kitchen and grill teams get the coffee percolating and breakfast sandwiches hot and ready to serve. Final heat sheets are printed and sent to the marshalling team (Lynette Prince-Bernier, Ann Studer, Kerri Bednarick, Sophia Contreni, and Eileen Brantner) with the help of junior marshallers (Megan Emmerich, Isabella Cherichella, Ceci Laudenberger, Abigail Klimash, Cody Kutzman, Greycey Steady, and Zoey Levens) who spend their entire morning tirelessly organizing herds of swimmers into their correct events/heats/lanes. After an officials' meeting at 8 am, and a timer's meeting at 8:30 am, all take their spots as the Invitational is opened by the beautiful voice of Jenna Brennan singing, and Farrell Bednarick signing, the national anthem. Our announcers, Sara Werner and Craig Bernier, then announce the first event on the starting blocks and we're off!

The pressure is then on the scoring table (Shane Schwarz, Barry Brantner, Heidi Howes, and Mike Cordes) who ingest the meets results with speed, precision and accuracy to appropriately calculate scores for each event. Those results are then sent up to the awards team (Amy Buchney,

President Ray Zimmerman made the following remarks
on the Lake Community. Due to our new manager
contracting new companies for lake management and
changing treatment schedules, Lake 4 was able to reopen.
The Board has passed rules for long term lake health.

Three-year septic pumping mandates extends the life of your septic and helps the health of our lakes.

Tree Rule Restriction has been a rule of Highland Lakes since 1965 to stop healthy live trees from being taken down. Cutting down healthy trees and clear cutting contributes to runoff into our lakes.

Family Day was well attended and fireworks were wonderful. We have over 100 swimmers on our swim team and 92 seniors in our Senior Club. Our community continues to have a wide variety of activities for children to adults with crafts, ceramics, dances and many other events.

Over 200 volunteers were appreciated at Adult Appreciation for volunteers who contribute a minimum of 20 hours to the community. A big thank-you to all our volunteers.

The Shadow Lane project has been completed for



drainage.

Treasurers Report: Lou lannucci

We are in challenging times with high prices and inflation. We are meeting budget needs due to the General Manager, Dave Martin, saving us money with new vendors, reducing our insurance and negotiating contracts. Expenditures this year: Shadow Lane-\$340,000.

Paved 2.8 miles of roads - \$443,00 Ash Tree Removal - \$163,000.

The Board is starting its budget process for next year, (earliest ever done) and is trying not to raise dues too much. The Board is working together to keep costs down.

Chairman of the Board: Lyle Timpson

In April the Board voted unanimously to adopt a 3-year septic pumping mandate. Here is the background on how the Board arrived at this decision. It took a year and 4 months of discussion.

Our lake water quality is in decline with weeds, scum, algae, and a foul smell. Lake 4 was closed entirely for 2 1/2 years. The Main Lake was closed for 1 1/2 weeks in 2022 because of harmful algae bloom. We as a Board knew nitrogen and phosphorus exacerbate excessive weed growth. We didn't know what was causing excessive amounts of nitrogen and phosphorus. Under the leadership of past President Michael Gelfand, the Board undertook three studies which Princeton Hydro had been urging us to do for years.

A bathymetric study, a hydrologic study and a nutrient load study. In July of 2022 the results of the three studies came in. The findings were disturbing. The studies examined environmental sources of nitrogen and phosphorus in ground water, due to erosion, from geese, septics and density of population to name a few of the categories. The studies estimated impact of each source on each lake. On Lakes 1, 3, 4 and 5 estimated percentage of septic input of nitrogen and phosphorus was 90%. In the Main Lake, it is estimated that septics are 87% responsible for nitrogen and phosphorus.

The report stated; "the modeling results overall show that the loading from septic systems is the largest contributing factor of nutrients to all 5 of our lakes and must be a priority in management efforts. Septic management should be implemented to minimize nutrient loading." Nationwide studies have concluded routine inspections and pumping of septic systems help decrease large scale failures. Pump outs insure long term proper function of septic systems. Last October of 2022, the Board sent the study findings to an independent consultant for peer review to ensure the findings in the study were accurate. It was conducted by Applied Watershed Sciences. Last February it was received. They concurred with

Princeton Hydro's report. They also recommended a full watershed inventory of septic systems is warranted. They stated, "if 1/2 of all the homes in Highland Lakes were used only seasonally septic loads would still be significant to the Highland Lakes water bodies." Septic run off also infiltrates wells that supply drinking and bathing water. We turned to experts for our decisions, the experts recommended pumping of septics every two to three years. The Board passed a \$50 credit last October for pumping septics. We

discussed concerns for residents with limited resources. We are looking to see if a separate 501c3 can be established to address financial issues. Also, our attorney stated grants are available to seniors, people with disabilities, and limited financial resources. These grants are from the NJ Department of Consumer Affairs. People with newer systems still have holding tanks and need to be pumped out.

People living alone or seasonally, referring back to the independent analysis, these conditions will still have significant septic loads. No proposal is perfect for everyone. We turned to the experts. U.S. EPA and lake management services all of the nation recommend septic be pumped every two to three years. Many lakes have had these rules for decades. This Board has implemented many treatments to our lakes; weed harvesting, carp removal and biochar treatments to combat the lakes decline. The success of our efforts will be compromised and limited if we don't address the septic issues. The lakes are our biggest asset and they define our community. They dictate our property values. Our attorney said we can legally implement the 3-year pumping mandate. The community needs to do what is best for the common good.

Legal Report:

Attorney Michelle Corbett-Riveielle, representing Dolan & Dolan for the Annual Meeting, Eileen Born could not attend our meeting today.

PREDFA regulations were adopted with by-law changes on June 16, 2023. Changes are as follows:

- 1. Change of definition of "Member in Good Standing." This is for nominating or running for positions.
- 2. Appointments for vacancies will serve until next election. Not the balance of the term.
- 3. No more than one family member may serve on the Voting Board at one time.
- 4. Change of Article 9. Notice of meetings, change of meetings and availability of minutes.
- 5. Process of nominating positions to Voting Board is amended in Article 12.
- 6. Ballots are required to be anonymous.
- 7. Changes to absentee ballots procedure.
- 8. By-laws to be recorded.

Rules and regulations have been reviewed for clarity. Municipal Services Act Legislation, Kelly Bill

implemented for private communities to get reimbursement from Vernon Township for snow removal. We are being under-reimbursed. We have joint representation with other lake communities to sue Vernon Township. We are in the process of mediation with the town for resolution of reimbursements.

Foreclosure Regulations: Club still maintains our rules that new owners are libel for dues in arrears even if it is a foreclosure.

Floor Open to Members:

Al Colden, Section 1. Please men in the crowd get check-ups for prostate cancer. The Prostate Cancer Authority can counsel men with prostate cancer. Badge checkers need to be respected.

Carl Reinhardt, Section 2. Channel of run-off by Breakneck Road between 108 and 110 that needs to be addressed.

Al Renzo, Section 3. Lives on Lagoon, has brought up issues years ago about the lagoon filling in. He was told it is filling in naturally. He brought proof that was not

the case. It started when an easement and sewer drain was brought into that lake. He stated if the smaller body is getting unhealthy, eventually the bigger body of water would be unhealthy in due time. Can we reverse the process for the lagoon? No wildlife is left in the lagoon. Can we have treatment for the lagoon? He disagrees with tree rule. Trees next to houses need to come down. Ray Zimmerman responded if trees are a hazard that will be taken in account by the Clubhouse. Dave Martin stated if you hire a licensed tree expert and they state a tree needs to be removed, the Clubhouse will not disagree.

Glenn Kamp, Section 7. He is encouraged by the words of Lyle Timpson and Ray Zimmerman. The Board is proactive and listening. Ecology Committee is looking into treatment for the lagoon.

Drew Altman, Section 10. Would love to have a dog park. Would love a garbage can at Beach 4. Ray Zimmerman responded we can look into a spot for a dog park and discuss it. The Club has a policy of "carrying in, carry out" which is why there is no garbage can at Beach 4.

Peter Schundler, Section 2. We need trees. Restrictions are being put on air conditioning in California, could happen to us. Three years ago trees on Lakeside Drive East were clear cut; happy rules are now being enforced.

Judy Norton, Section 3. The Board is creating rules, rather than amending by-laws. It's not a good precedent to set

Marty Puzio, Section 11. Weeds on Rutherford Place and Diggles Road and road on back of Lake 4. Who is responsible to maintain? Dave Martin stated our landscape contractor is responsible, please report to the office. Please have Club ride around once a summer to check the roads for weeds and bushes that obstruct sight. A safety hazard for cars, pedestrians etc.

John Gross, Section 2. ATVs and motorcycles are a problem. Ray Zimmerman stated the Board has doubled the fines for violations. Unfortunately, an accident is waiting to happen.

Jane Parigi, Section 5. We need more lifeguards and we need to increase the pay for lifeguards and WSI positions. All our beaches are not all open. Ray Zimmerman stated there is a shortage of lifeguards everywhere.

Anthony Rossi, Section 5. He installed effluent filters on his septic system. You can have septic companies to do it.



Helps trap solids. Registration for house sitters, what is the rule? Ray Zimmerman stated no problem with house sitters.

Can we get more rules to the community via the internet? Ray Zimmerman stated all rules are on Tops.

Don Sheridan, Section 7. Reeds and lily pads are overpopulating on Beach 3 impacting boating. Ray Zimmerman stated Ecology is looking into it. Fines seem extravagant for certain rules. Ray Zimmerman stated they were set high to get people's attention and go to appeals committee. Not looking to hurt people.

Sue Ross, Section 7. Non-members are using beaches, what are processes by security to check the beaches? Ray Zimmerman stated we are working on better ways to check the beaches after hours. Invasive vines that are growing on small properties the Club owns, can landscapers or conservation Club remove them? Ray Zimmerman stated Ecology Committee can look into it.

Sue Schundler, Section 2. Thank you to the Board for looking after the future, as her grandchildren are 4th generation Highland Lakers.

Bonnie Schwab, Section 9. Can we designate a dog beach? Can not even be in season. Asking for a leashed dog to just dip in the water.

Sam Lewin, Section 7. Rules and By-laws Committee was not contacted about changes.

Swim Team - Record Breakers and Trophy Takers

Week 5

The Highland Lakes Swim Team was busy this week, participating in a total of three swim meets! There's a ton of great swims to cover, so let's get to it.

Wednesday, July 31

First up, the team traveled to Wayne Township to face off with the Wayne Waves in a Week 5 "Crossover" match-up against the red division opponent. With the White Division title already secured, this meet was less about the team result and more about getting swimmers into new events and hunting for "A" times as the season winds down. The meet was competitive, but Wayne had too much strength in depth for Highland Lakes, showing why they're in the upper division of the league.

Highland Lakes breaststrokers won a total of four events, highlighted by a 1-3-4 finish by the 9/10 Boys squad of Cae Laudenberger, Luca Berg, and Benjamin Fahmy. The 13/14 Girls duo of Adrienn Kovacs and Juliet Schwarz went 1-2 in their event to claim big points. By the end of the breaststroke events, Wayne held a sturdy 86-67 lead. Butterfly events were largely one-way traffic, with Wayne taking 7 of the 8 contests. The 9/10 Boys were the lone victors, with Landon Howes, Luca Berg, and Clayton Hastie claiming a 2-3-4 finish. By the end of Butterfly, Wayne was able to extend their lead to a solid 166-106.

Backstroke events were largely the same, with Wayne claiming wins in all but one event. The lone hold outs were the 13/14 Boys duo of Derek Fleming and Braeden Contreni who finished 1-3 to win their event. Wayne's lead extended to a 110-point gap by the end of backstroke. Highland Lakes fared better in the freestyle events, winning three contests while claiming two draws. The 8/U girls team of Maeve Olsen, Anabelle Schwarz, and Margaret Fahmy finished 1-2-4. The 13/14 Boys continued their strong night with a 2-3-4 finish by Vincent Fisher, Braeden Contreni and Logan Cole. Finally the 15/18 Girls team of Abbey Amato, Alexandra Kovacs and Gabriella Cefaloni finished 1-3-4. By the end of the freestyle races, Wayne had claimed the victory with a 354-230 lead. HL took three relay victories from the final eight races. In the end, the final score of 402-270 reflected a strong Wayne Waves team performance.

The Highland Lakes "All-Stars" returned to Wayne on Thursday evening for the annual Coaches Choice meet. Teams are limited to one swimmer per event per age group and a relay for each age group. She also broke the Coaches Choice meet record by nearly two seconds! The new mark stands at 34.57. Next up, no stranger to the record boards, Maeve Olsen claimed a Coaches Choice meet record of her own with a time of 38.45 in the Girls 8/U 50M Freestyle event. Go

It's a chance for the team to put their four fastest girls and four fastest boys into a relay to compete against the league. They battled the team from Fayson Lakes for all four lengths of the relay, ultimately finishing in a close second place. Impressively, however, they shattered both the team record AND the meet record, even if Fayson's win means they're the record holders for the meet. The Team record board bid adieu to the mark set in 2010 by the team of Julia Loughren, Brittany and Lauren Parak, and Jackie Kenny.
