# **How to Pull a Cattail**

Cattail, a reedy, semi-aquatic, perennial grass, grows from creeping rhizomes and wind-dispersed seeds. Stems may reach 10 feet tall, forming dense patches along shorelines, their distinct tops looking like fuzzy cigars. For centuries, humans have used these plants for both construction and as a food source; they also provide habitats for birds and aquatic wildlife. However, in recent years, our Cattail patches have spread at an astonishing rate, encroaching on beaches and blocking dock access.

Sunday morning, September 22, at 8 am, 17 intrepid volunteers showed up at Beach 3 dressed to kill...Cattails. Well, at least pull them up by the roots and stack them on the shore. The crew's goal was to thin out overgrown Cattail patches that have been causing problems for beachgoers and boaters. Thinning out the Cattail overgrowth will improve waterfront access for the memberships' use.

The Cattail Clean Up volunteers waded into the lake to hand pull about a 20-foot section of the lofty plants on Beach 3's shoreline and also along that dock. Next, they moved over to the Shadow Lane dock to pull out Cattails blocking that area. The wet, muddy work was no easy task, as the Cattail plants were tall and heavy, and their root rhizomes large and covered in dense muck. The removed plants were piled up on the shore for maintenance to collect and dispose of them.

# About Changes in your Recorded Deed

In planning changes to your ownership of property that would be reflected in the recorded Deed, contacting the Club Office before you do so for guidance is advisable and will eliminate any misunderstandings.

The Club's By-Laws, in part, define Active Members as those who own property in Highland Lakes. When persons take title to property in Highland Lakes when they do not own other Highland Lakes property at that time, even when they join in the ownership of property with someone who currently owns property in Highland Lakes, they automatically become an active member and are required to pay the Initiation Fee. If you are considering adding anyone to your Deed, a wife, parent, child, friend, etc., please be aware of these By-Law requirements.

Sometimes members form a living or family trust as part of their estate planning. However, even this type of trust is a different, and therefore new, owner of property, and the payment of the Initiation Fee is required.

#### **Office Hours**

The office is available to take your calls from 9 am to 4 pm, Monday to Friday and from 10 am to 1 pm on Saturday. However, it is only open to members from 10 am to 3 pm, Monday to Friday and from 10 am to 1 pm on Saturday. Thank you.

# A Message Regarding Pontoon Boats

#### **Pontoon Boat Owners:**

The Club recently approved a change to the Rules and Regulations. Effective January 1, 2025, the Club shall require mechanically propelled boats desiring use of a Club controlled dock space (i.e., assigned numbered dock space) to be registered with the State of New Jersey in accordance with the New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission (MVC) requirements for all mechanically propelled boats. Proof of registration will be required for mechanically propelled boats (e.g., pontoon boats and other boats with electric motors) to be assigned a dock space next year via the Lottery. In addition, it is highly recommended that members with mechanically propelled boats complete the NJ approved Boating Safety Course and receive a boating safety certificate issued by the MVC. Please note the NJ State Marine Police were recently at the lake and may have already issued tickets for any unregistered boats.

We also ask all pontoon boat owners to be cognizant of how to properly secure their boats to the dock. The docks were a significant investment by the Club, and we want to ensure they remain in good condition. I've noticed a lot of the boats are not properly secured and are causing damage to the docks. Please be sure to tie your boat in such a way that it keeps the front edge of the pontoons from rubbing against the docks. This can be done by using the lines to pull the boat back and away from the dock as opposed to just pulling it sideways away from the stringers.

# Voting Board Adopts 2025 Budget

At its regular meeting on Friday, September 20, the Voting Board adopted the budget for FY 2025. I am happy to report that the budget includes a slight reduction in dues at \$1,400 per cabin and \$895 per lot. The new budget includes an early payment discount for those who pay in full by November 15, 2024, and a 25% discount for qualifying seniors and permanently disabled members. The Treasurer's letter, annual invoice, and the 2025 Assessments and Fees Schedule were mailed at the end of September. Contact the Club office if you don't receive your invoice by October 15, 2024. Please be sure to return the invoice with payment so it is received at the Club office by November 15, 2024.

# New Mandatory Boat Removal Rule

The Board recently approved a new rule for removing boats from Club racks on all lakes. Whereas the Club used to have a policy of having members remove their boats from the racks on alternating years, all boats must now be removed from the Club racks no later than November 15 of each year. This will allow the Club time to perform any necessary maintenance on the racks. Failure to remove any boat from the Club racks by November 15 shall be a Tier 4 offense, and the Club may remove the boat at the owner's expense.

Please also remember that all boats must be removed from the Club docks (numbered dock spaces and unnumbered Freeway docks) no later than October 15 each year.

# **Ecology Corner**

#### It Really Works!

Using vinegar instead of chemicals like Roundup to kill weeds in stone driveways, walkways, and patios is better for our lake's ecology and lake community for several reasons. The photographs in this article show a large patch of green vegetation in my stone driveway before I sprayed it and shows the patch 24 hours after being sprayed with a combination of vinegar, water, salt, and a little bit of dishwashing detergent.

#### **Chemical Environmental Impact**

Vinegar is a natural substance that breaks down quickly and doesn't leave harmful residues in the soil or water. In contrast, chemicals like glyphosate (the active ingredient in Roundup) can persist in the environment, potentially harming non-target plants, animals, and microorganisms.

#### **Water Contamination**

When it rains, chemicals used on driveways and patios are washed into nearby water bodies, such as our lakes and streams. These chemicals can contaminate water sources, affecting aquatic life and the overall health of the ecosystem. In addition, the fact that we all have wells is another reason not to put any contaminants into the soil. Vinegar, on the other hand, poses much less risk to water quality and aquatic organisms.

#### **Health Concerns**

Glyphosate has been associated with potential health risks, including links to cancer in humans and harmful effects on wildlife. Vinegar, while acidic and potentially harmful if ingested in large quantities, is generally much safer for humans, pets, and other animals when used appropriately.

#### **Soil Health**

Chemical herbicides can disrupt the balance of microorganisms in the soil, leading to poorer soil health over time. Vinegar, although it can lower soil pH temporarily, doesn't have the same long-term negative effects on soil biology.

#### Resistance

Overuse of chemical herbicides can lead to the development of resistant weed species, making it harder to control them over time. Vinegar doesn't contribute to this problem, as it works differently and doesn't promote resistance.

By opting for the vinegar solution, you're choosing a more sustainable and eco-friendly alternative to harmful chemicals, that helps protect the local environment, particularly our sensitive lakes' ecosystems.

## Stay Safe on the Trails

#### **Important Safety Reminder About Snakes**

As the crisp fall air draws us outdoors, the hiking season is in full swing. Whether you're exploring familiar trails or discovering new paths, it's crucial to remember that our region is home to wildlife, including rattlesnakes and copperheads. While the beauty of the outdoors is a major draw, staying vigilant while hiking can be the difference between a memorable adventure and a dangerous encounter. The risks posed by snakes are real, but with the right precautions, you can enjoy the trails safely.

Here are some essential safety tips for your next hike:

- Be Prepared: Protective gear, such as Gators, is a must for hiking in areas where rattlesnakes may be present. These cover your lower legs and can help guard against snakebites, especially when traversing narrow or overgrown trails. Remember, rattlesnakes can strike up to half their body length, so keeping your legs protected is key.
- Stay Alert: Always keep an eye on your surroundings. High grass, rocky outcrops, and dense vegetation are common hiding spots for snakes. Being aware of where you step and what's around you will significantly reduce your chances of an unwanted encounter.

#### What to Do in Case of a Snakebite:

- Call 911 immediately for emergency assistance.
- Stay calm and keep still to reduce the spread of venom in your body.
- Avoid walking out of the woods, as movement can quicken the spread of venom.
- Move to a safe distance from the snake and try to note its appearance for identification.
- Remove tight objects like rings, as swelling is likely to occur.



# Teen Council Seeking Interested Participants



# Trunk or Treat and Haunted Trail





# Final Senior Sunfish Races – Finally – Wind!

As the end of our summer season approached, our concern was a repeat of the bobbing in no wind approach, but by the time the races began, we had the season's best wind - a steady course 1 at 7-10 knots! While some of the regular fleet members were observers on the sidelines (you know who you are), we had 10 sailors who took the chance and clearly enjoyed the swift and very competitive races.

Race 1 was neck and neck for first, with Will prevailing over Mark down the middle of the lake on the last leg. Third place changed hands a number of times, with me edging out James, who just caught JW by a nose at the finish. Sixth was a photo finish between David and Roger, and 8th was between Dillon and Allan. One junior, David Young, joined us and sailed admirably with the pack in both races. Congratulations, David!

Race 2 was a season victory lap for JW (more on that later), but Will ran away with the race. The finishes were close and similar to the first race. Notably, Allan had a tremendous season finish with a close 6th that ensured his standing in the challenger division.

For the record, there is no debate with the other fleet captains, it is officially agreed that the senior sunfish dock committee is the BEST dock committee in the fleet. Thanks again to LuAnne and Ellen who had to deal with some heat, long races with no wind, and occasional controversy.
